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## 'Hounds Beat Aspermont; To Play Rule Friday Night

In a game marred by an injury to one of their first-string players, the Knox City Greyhounds defeated the Aspermont Hornets last Thursday night, 26-0, in their first district game of the season.

Carl Bradley, Greyhound guard, received a broken leg in the contest. Carl is the son of Mr. and Mrs. "Banty" Bradley. He has been moved from the hospital to his home west of town.

The win left the 'Hounds with an unblemished record for the season thus far, and according to an area newspaper, Knox City is the

only un-tied, undefeated Class B team in West Central Texas. Part of the thanks for this distinction go to the Rochester Steers, who cut down the Lueders Pirates Friday night, 33-24, to ruin the Pirates' perfect record. The Steers themselves have been beaten only once—to Class A Munday in the first game of the season.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Greyhounds will play Rule on the Bobcats' home field. The game is expected to be a tough one for the 'Hounds, since it will be on the occasion of the annual Rule homecoming, and the Bobcats, reported to be greatly improved since the first of the season, will be out to win.

But the Greyhounds, too, will be on the field to win. Since the 'Hounds began playing 11-man football they have suffered worse defeats at the hands of Rule than any other team—37-0 in 1952, 41-0 in 1953 and 38-0 in 1954. This time the Bobcats will face a team with more experience and power.

In last week's game Quarterback Don Corley passed for three of the Greyhound tallies and scored the other on a six-yard keeper play. He also passed to End Bob Driver for both extra points.

Corley hit Ross Lankford for 17 yards and the first touchdown in the second quarter. In the same period he kept for the second marker and passed to Driver for the extra point. The next two touchdowns were on passes to Driver, with the plays covering 42 and 41 yards.

## Booster Club Elects Officers

From now on, Knox City school athletes will know their fans are behind them, whether they win, lose or tie. These were the sentiments expressed by a group of about thirty men who met in the school library Monday night to organize the "Greyhound Boosters," a club to support the Knox City school athletic program.

C. E. Williams was elected president of the club. Sammy B. White was named vice-president, and Don Poe secretary-treasurer.

The group voted to support the entire athletic program of the school, rather than just football. Regular meetings will be held each Monday night during the football season, and the club will then decide on other meeting dates.

Dues were set at \$1.00 per year, with all men in the community eligible for membership. William named Lee Smith, Bud Carver and E. H. Tankersley as a membership committee, but all charter members will participate in a membership drive to be conducted next week. Membership goal is 250.

Other committees appointed included a program committee composed of Jeff Graham, Otis Cash and Chad Wilson. During the football season, plans are to show a football film at each meeting, and to have a discussion of the previous week's game by the coaches, in addition to a short business session. The meetings will begin at 7:30 and should last about one hour, the president said.

It was pointed out that the object of the organization is to benefit the school's athletic program over a period of years—rather than to just support a winning team. Members were urged to attend as many athletic events as possible, to encourage the athletes when the occasion arises, and to stand ready to help the teams in any way possible.

All prospective members were urged to be at the Knox City-Rule game in Rule tomorrow (Friday) night and form a line of Boosters through which the Greyhounds will enter the field. Charter members will have membership cards and can accept new members at the game or any day next week.

"This club has the whole-hearted approval of the coaches and other school officials," Williams said. "They believe it will benefit not only the athletic program but the entire school. Their club will stand behind our athletes not just this year but every year—and not just when we win but also when we lose."

### SMALL GRAINS VARIETY TESTS PLANTED IN COUNTY

Two small grains variety tests have been planted in the county, W. J. Bryan, county agent, stated this week. The tests were put out so that farmers can observe them during the growing season for both grazing value and grain yields. The new wheat variety, "Concho," which is showing great promise, is included in each test, Bryan said.

Each test has seven varieties of wheat, two of barley and three of oats. The tests are planted next to a road and each variety has its name by row so that farmers and ranchers can identify each one when looking at the tests.

One test is located on the Ted Russell farm, about two miles west of Vera, and the other is on the W. C. Taylor farm, one and a half miles south of Truscott. Varieties included in each test are: Wheat—Westar, Concho, Wichita, Triumph, Crockett, Comanche, and Quana; Barley—Harbine and Cordova; and Oats—Mustang, New Nortext and Alamo.

## F.H.A Irrigation Loan Requirements Are Eased

Farmers Home Administration construction requirements for irrigation wells in Knox and Haskell counties and adjacent areas where gravel packing is necessary have been revised, it was announced this week.

The revision is in accordance with information developed during the Knox County Committee meeting of the FHA, held in Seymour October 24. Present for the meet-

ing were Congressman Frank Ikard, L. D. Smith and Wm. McNair of the state office.

The following specifications were agreed upon:

1. Well diameters should be in accordance with local practice.
  2. Surface casing will be used, extending from one foot above ground surface to the top of the water bearing formation. This casing may be corrugated culvert pipe.
  3. Permanent casing to be set, centered in temporary casing, after cleaning out. Centering guides should be at bottom.
  4. Perforations in permanent casing to be such as to retain 1/4" gravel, and shall be not less than 10 in each row. Each perforation to be 6" long and rows to be separated 4" apart and staggered. All permanent casing in water bearing formation to be perforated as above.
  5. Fill space between casings with "pea gravel" graded to pass a 3-8" mesh and be retained on 1/4" mesh.
  6. Develop and test well and pour concrete block for casing and pump support. Place two graveling tubes through concrete at opposite sides of casing. Add all necessary gravel while developing and testing.
  7. Casing sizes and weight per foot will be in accordance with local usage, except that sheet metal or "stove pipe" casing will not be acceptable.

## Highway Patrolman Speaks at Meeting Of Woman's Clubs

Members of the 1946 Study Club and the Knox City Study Club met together Tuesday, Nov. 1, for a safety program. Guest speaker for the day was Highway Patrolman D. L. Cooper, who is district safety officer for the Texas Highway Patrol.

Mr. Cooper gave a very informative talk on safety in automobiles. He said that Knox County's safety record was improving. In 1954 from January to September there were 51 accidents and one person killed. For the same period in 1955 there have been only 30 accidents but two have been killed.

He emphasized the fact that highway accidents are the greatest menace in America today, pointing out that from 1900 until 1953 one million persons had been killed by automobiles. By comparison he said that there had not been a million American casualties in all the wars fought by our United States.

He stressed driving training programs in our schools, explaining that drivers between the ages of 18 and 25 had the highest accident rating. He said that statistics proved women were better drivers than men, which brought a round of applause from the audience.

Mr. Cooper said that if the children of America were taught to fear automobiles and use the same caution that they were taught to exert in the use of firearms that our traffic safety problem would virtually be ended in another generation.

Patrolman Cooper was introduced by Mrs. C. G. Markward. A business meeting was held by the Knox City Study Club members preceding the program. Mrs. Joe Averitt presided.

The 1946 Study Club held a short business meeting following the program. The president appointed a committee of Mmes. Clyde E. Williams, Dan Steakley and Sam Clonts to study the club's community achievement project.

The next meeting of the two clubs will be a joint Bible Day program Thursday, Nov. 10, presented by Rev. Bryan Bryant.

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## New Chevrolets On Display Friday

With two new nine-passenger station wagons and two new four-door sedans, Chevrolet is presenting in 1956 the largest and most versatile line-up of passenger cars in its history, Dan Steakley, local dealer, said this week.

The new models will go display at Steakley Chevrolet and elsewhere over the nation tomorrow (Friday).

The total of 19 bodies in three series is five more than were offered at the start of production in the 1955 model year and nearly twice the number available 10 years ago.

Particularly outstanding are the four-door sport sedans introduced in both the Bel Air and the Two-Ten series.

This model has a lower silhouette than the conventional four-door sedan and the windshield is the same low height as the sport coupe which it resembles in exterior trim.

Sweeping advances in durability, safety and power, paced by a new 205-horsepower 78 engine, headline the engineering achievements in the 1956 models.

The horsepower boost, giving added zip for passing and pulling out of tight spots, runs the gamut of Chevrolet's line of passenger car engines, beginning with a 140-horsepower six featuring an 8-to-1 compression ratio. The engine, available with standard, overdrive or Powerglide transmission, replaces 123 and 136-horsepower sixes in the 1955 line.

The 1956 line offers a choice of three V8s, including a 162-horsepower engine designed for Powerglide.

The 205-horsepower Super Turbo-Fire V8, hiked from 180-horsepower last year, has a new Chevrolet compression ratio high of 9.25 to 1.

Steakley invited everyone in the area to visit his showrooms Friday and inspect the new models.
