State Treasurer Hatcher Reports

W. Gregory Hatcher Reports \$114,449,875.23 Received 1930 and \$110,075,667.12 Received During the Six Months of His Term of Office

At Austin, December 15th—State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher, has delivered to the Governor, the official report, required by law, of the transactions of the Treasury Department for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1930. This report also contains a recapitulation of the receipts and disbursements of the Treasury Department during the six months of Hatcher's administration, and recommendations made by him for keeping State on a cash basis, and reorganizing State funds.

Briefly summarized, the report shows total receipts in all funds for the year amounting to the sum of \$114,449,875.23. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1930, amounting to \$57,224,882.35. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1929, amounting to \$52,824,882.35. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1928, amounting to \$49,000,000.00.

General Revenue receipts amounted to the sum of \$40,261,777.17; about 2 1/2 million dollars more than for 1929. Total receipts for the six year period ending August 31, 1930, amounting to \$227,193,903. Disbursements in the six months ending August 31, 1930, amounting to \$110,075,667.12. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1929, amounting to \$105,224,882.35. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1928, amounting to \$100,000,000.00.

State Highway fund receipts amounted to the sum of \$3,336,450.00. Disbursements for the six months ending August 31, 1930, amounting to \$3,336,450.00. This fund is invested in United States Government bonds which are registered and kept in the vaults of the treasury.


