## Officer Explains Safety Proposals To Local Lions

Highway Patrolman D. L. Cooper, district safety officer for the Wichita Falls District of the State Highway Patrol, discussed "A Seven-Point Program for a Safer Texas" at the Wednesday meeting of the Knox City Lions Club.

Cooper, along with Highway Patrolmen Bill Jones and George Garrett of Seymour, was introduced by C. H. Keck. Keck and L. C. Teague represented the club at a recent meeting in Wichita Falls, when the 7-point program was outlined.

In pointing up the traffic congestion problem facing the nation, Officer Cooper said there are presently 60 million vehicles in the United States, and if all were moving bumper-to-bumper they would extend 200,000 miles. In Texas alone, he said, there are three and a half million vehicles and four million licensed drivers. This figures 66 vehicles for every mile of paved road in Texas, he added.

In ten years, the speaker continued, there will be 82 million vehicles and 90 million licensed drivers in the nation. "We must do something about the increasing traffic problem," he said. "In Texas last year there were 2,547 traffic deaths—and we're going to beat that this year."

The 7-point program is sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, the Texas Police Association, the State Bar Association and other organizations. It will be presented to the legislature during the next session, and Cooper suggested that Texans contact their legislators and express approval of the program.

The speaker briefly outlined the program as follows: 1. Establish county-wide traffic court systems throughout the state. This would make traffic courts more uniform than the present system of justice of the

The Knox City girls' team lost in the first round of the Aspermont tourney, bowing to Girard 30-27. Playing on the consolation side of the bracket, they lost to Guthrie Saturday, 57-41.

## Potato Growers Being Organized

Organization of a Potato Growers Association in this area is almost complete, S. N. Reed said this week, and 200 acres will be planted.

Preparation of land is being rushed, since it needs to be prepared and fertilized with super phosphate now, listed later and the beds watered by January 5 in order to be ready for planting by mid-February, Mr. Reed said.

Jack Renfro of Hereford, who is cooperating with local growers, listed several pointers necessary for successful potato growing. They are as follows:

1. Land should be plowed 6 to 8 inches deep so that it forms a good muleh.
2. The land should be leveled with a slight grade for good drainage.
3. Broadcast 45 percent Phosphate fertilizer at the rate of 160 pounds per acre. Follow the fertilizer application with the bedding operation.
4. The ground should be bedded (or listed) with a 3 bottom lister with 38 inch beds. The rows must be as straight as possible with uniform beds.
5. The ground should be pre-watered before January 5, 1957 in order to be in desirable condition for planting by February 15, 1957.

## City Builds Dog Pound

The city has completed construction of a dog pound near the sewage disposal plant, and will begin impounding stray dogs, it was announced this week.

Dogs picked up will be kept 72 hours, City Secretary O. L. Knight said. If a dog's owner reclaims it, there will be a \$1.00 pound fee.

There has been increasing number of complaints, city officials said, about stray dogs with no apparent owners, and with some of the dogs running in packs. The city will try to pick up only these homeless strays.

"These patients are counting on you to give this call for Christmas gifts your usual excellent response," Mrs. T. S. Edwards, chairman of the local club's committee, said.

Boxes for the collection of gifts will be placed in Knox City stores this week. Gifts are not to be wrapped, since they will be sorted and wrapped separately for each patient. There are 3,000 patients who need gifts, Mrs. Edwards said.

Other members of the committee are Mrs. E. P. Reese and Mrs. W. J. Morris. Gifts should be put in the collection boxes not later than Dec. 20.

Suggested items for men and women are combs, brushes, sox, scarves, ties, cigarettes, pipes, shaving cream, after-shave lotion, bath powder, shampoo, fishing equipment, costume jewelry, cosmetics, cologne, hose, handbags, ribbons, bobby pins, deodorants, underwear, compact, flowers for hair or any wearing apparel.

## County Gets Slight Cut In 1957 Cotton Acreage

Knox County farmers have received official notice of their 1957 farm acreage allotments for cotton. The notices were mailed recently by the Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Total acreage allotted to the county for next year is 59,852.5 acres, compared to 60,481 acres in 1956.

Acreage allotments for all cotton farms in the county were determined by the ASC committee in accordance with the law and the regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. The total county allotment was distributed among farms on which cotton

was planted in any one of the past three years, with a small acreage reserved for special uses.

Farmers who do not intend to operate a farm for which a 1957 cotton allotment is established should immediately return the official notice to the County ASC office so that it can be sent to the person who will operate the farm next year. Cotton allotments are established for specific farms and may not be transferred by the operator or other producer from one farm to another.

Any changes in the land to be included in the farm for which the allotment is made should be reported to the ASC committee. Farm operators are asked to check with the committee on any other question about the farm on which the allotment is established.

## Wind Erosion Control Practices Approved For Knox County

Funds have been made available for assisting farmers and ranchers in carrying out emergency wind erosion control practices in Knox County, according to H. M. Partridge, chairman of the Knox County ASC Committee.

Applications will be taken at the county office in Knox City beginning Friday, December 21, 1956.

## ELECTRICAL DEMONSTRATION DAY SCHEDULED FOR 4-H CLUBBERS

More than 200 4-H Club boys and girls, adult leaders, county agents and home demonstration agents from 22 West Texas counties, including Knox county, will be in Quanah December 15 for an Electrical Demonstration Day to be held at Quanah High School, Guy Glenn, local manager for West Texas Utilities Co., said this week.

The school is being sponsored by the utilities company and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. J. C. Randel of Quanah, WTU district manager, will serve as host for the utilities company.

J. L. (Curly) Hays, WTU farm and ranch advisor, will open the program at 9:30 with introductions and group assignments, following the registration of delegates. The boys and girls will be divided into two groups. At 10:15 the two groups of boys will see electrical demonstrations by W. L. Ulich, agriculture engineer, Extension Service of Texas A & M College; and Bob Jaska, research associate of the Agricultural Department of Texas A & M. At 11:00 the speakers will change groups.

The two groups of girls will attend demonstrations on home lighting given by E. V. Price of Quanah, WTU Lighting Advisor for the company; Betty Chowning, WTU home economist, will give a demonstration on cooking with small appliances.

At noon the group will be guests of WTU for lunch to be served at the school cafeteria.

Following the lunch, Dan J. Castles, WTU service department, will present a program on adequate wiring in homes.

The afternoon session will be held in the auditorium where four electrical demonstrations will be presented by 4-H Club teams.

Assisting with the day's program will be R. E. Kennedy, manager of WTU's public service department; Bill Sayles, of the industrial section of the public service department; and Don Purdy, WTU merchandise sales department.

Attending the school from each county will be two representa-

tive boys and two representative girls, the county agent and county home demonstration agent, who have been invited to attend by J. G. Simmons, District Extension Agent, and Miss Fern Hodge, District Home Demonstration Agent, both of Vernon.

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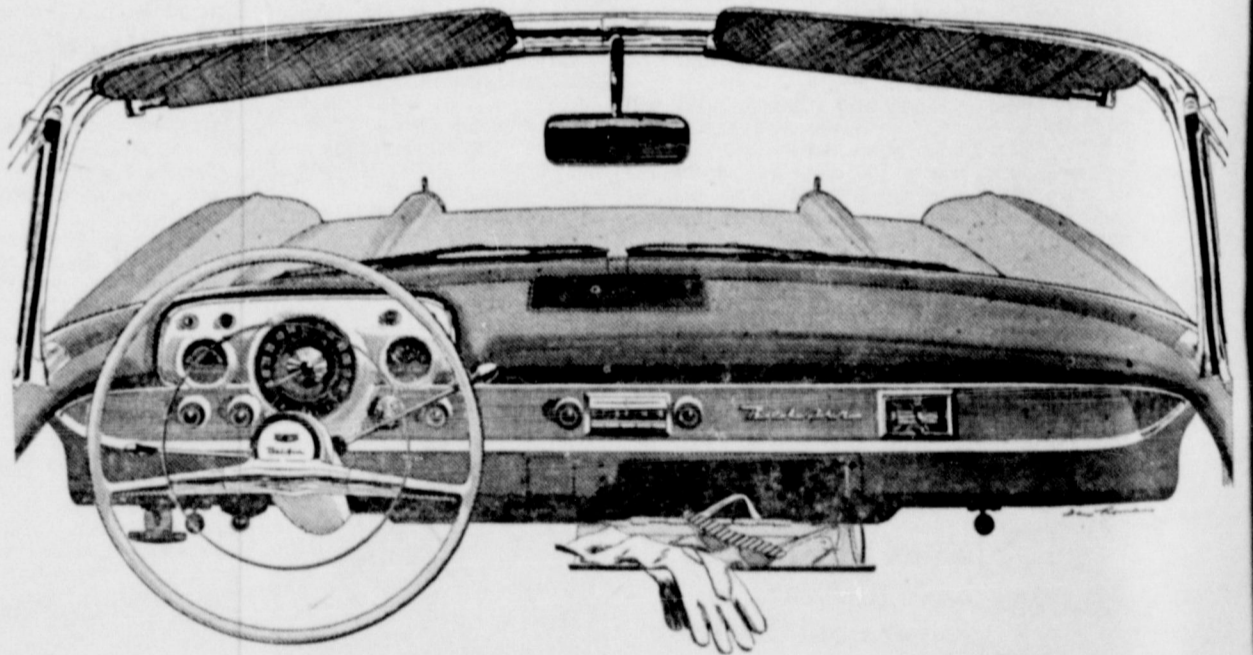

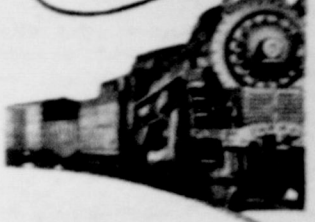

**Improved Fertilizers Being Developed**

COLLEGE STATION. — Fertilizers are a lot better than they used to be, but more improved fertilizer materials can be expected in the future, reports M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist.

Higher analysis fertilizers containing more nutrients and less bulky inert matter, and soluble or liquid fertilizers—all now on

the market—have reduced the weight and bulk and made both storage and application of fertilizer materials cheaper and easier for farmers and home gardeners. Industrial and State-Federal research now being carried out will undoubtedly lead to further improvements, says Thornton. One of these improvements will be the development of slower acting or less soluble forms of chemical fertilizer that will not leach out of the soil so rapidly. This will mean that enough fertilizer can be applied in one operation to meet the demands of a long-season crop, thus eliminating the need for repeated applications throughout the season. It will reduce present heavy losses of nitrogen through leaching. It will also prevent excessive pot-

ash consumption, as in alfalfa and certain in many parts of the country. 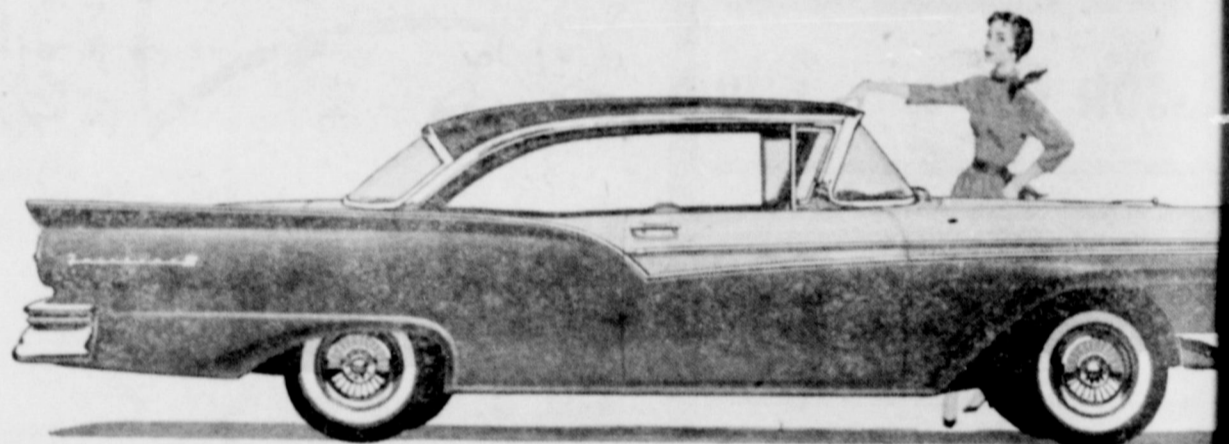

drew a salute in Austin this week.

The Texas Railroads adopted a resolution lauding the diligence and good judgment with which the drivers protect the lives of Texas children.

Pointing out that the school bus drivers' record is seldom accorded the recognition it is due and that it is a wonderful example for other persons using the highways, the resolution set out that a bus is listed in an accident report only on an average of once in every 410,000 miles. That is a distance equal to 16 times around the world at the equator.

That record has held for the last five years, during which school buses have traveled 410,000,000 (million) miles in transporting children to and from school.

They annually travel 82,000,000 (million) miles, a distance equal to 3,280 times around the earth at the equator.

It was also noted that in more than half of the accidents listed the bus actually was not involved in the collision; that cars and trucks were hit either behind the school buses or in going around them.

The Texas law requires that when school buses are loading or discharging passengers all vehicles approaching from either direction come to a full stop.

DALLAS.—For his conspicuous service in poultry marketing, F. Z. Beanblossom, College Station, has been named "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" by The Progressive Farmer magazine.

Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Extension Service, Texas A & M College System, has made big contributions to the poultry in-

dustry since he began working in Texas shortly after World War II. Seeing the greatest need was for improvement in poultry marketing, Beanblossom began working to improve quality. He talked with farmers, poultry dealers, hatchery men, poultry breeders, feed salesmen and processors explaining that "consumers will buy quality products."

One result of his promotional work was in the field of graded eggs. Ten years ago, there were practically no eggs sold in Texas on a graded basis. In 1955 over 40 million dozen were sold on a graded basis and Texas egg producers were paid over 2 million dollars more for their product.

Beanblossom has sold the idea of quality from the farm to the table. He has pushed chicken of tomorrow contests for better broilers, processors for cleanliness and attractiveness of dressed turkeys and broilers, restaurants to serve more eggs and poultry meat, truckers to be more careful in handling, feed men for better feed, handlers for more efficiency in their operations, etc. But whatever his job, you can be sure of one thing—he's trying to help Texans sell more Texas poultry.

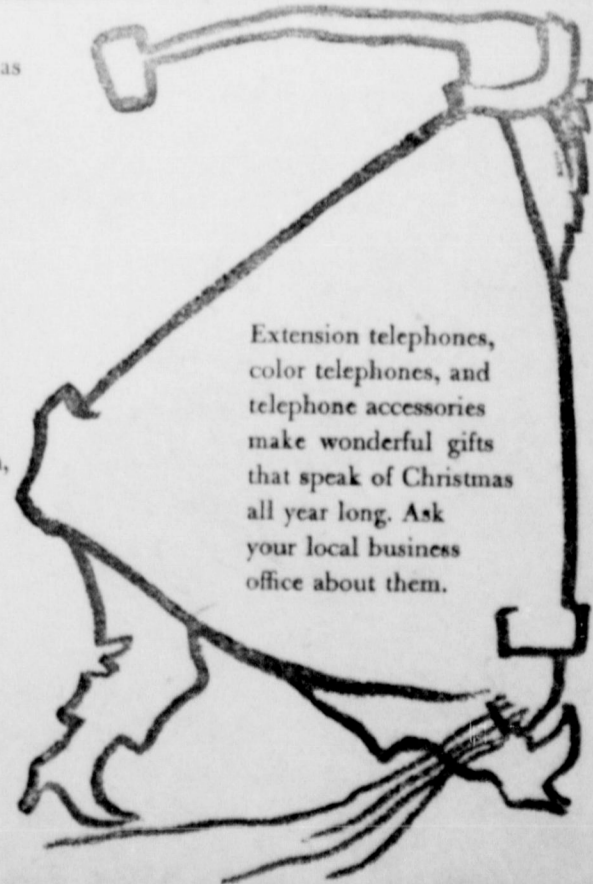

peace courts.  
2. Amend the Gilmer-Aiken school law to provide for driver education in all high schools. This would cost about \$35 per student, and tests in other states have proven that driver education helps reduce accidents.  
3. Ban the sale of fireworks in Texas. Fireworks cause many deaths and injuries annually, and their sale is allowed only in the 13 Southern states.  
4. Enact legislation providing for chemical tests in all instances of suspected driving while intoxicated. Such tests would not only aid in prosecuting drunken drivers, but would protect the innocent.  
5. Direct the legislative council to make a thorough study of our traffic laws, some of which are antiquated. Make Texas traffic laws uniform with those of other states.  
6. Make juveniles amendable for their acts of traffic law violation, on the premise that if a boy or girl is big enough physically and mentally to drive, they are big enough to answer for law violations.  
7. Provide a monetary increase for personnel of the Highway Patrol, and increase the number of patrolmen. To properly police the highways Texas should have a minimum of 1,200 patrolmen, according to safety experts.

**Patrol Captain Gives Accident Report**  
Texas Highway Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls district investigated four traffic accidents in Knox County during November, according to Capt. K. B. Hallmark, commanding officer of the district.  
No one was killed in the accidents, but one person was injured and property damage totaled \$1,542.  
Patrolmen contacted a total of 2,810 traffic law violators in the district during the month, Capt. Hallmark added. Of this number 780 were arrested while 2,030 received warnings.  
Excessive speed was the leading cause of arrest, with improper passing second and driving on the wrong side of the road ranking third.  
Counties included in the Wichita Falls district are Archer, Baylar, Clay, Cottle, Hardeman, King, Knox, Montague, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young.

**Agriculture Research In Texas Summarized In Extension Bulletin**  
COLLEGE STATION. — Results of systematic agricultural research in Texas during the past 68 years are summarized in a pamphlet issued by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station entitled "Agricultural Research in Texas Since 1888."  
Representatives of the then existing Texas agricultural organizations helped select the first seven experimental projects undertaken shortly after the station was created in 1888.  
From these original seven studies, investigations underway have expanded by 1956 into about 375 formal research projects and a number of short-time exploratory tests, all grouped into 25 research programs.  
Research results are summarized in three main sections. The first shows accomplishments under the seven original projects;

the second covers the from 1888 to 1924, and the longest section is main contributions to knowledge by the station in the 1930's.
