Invitation Basketball Tournament To Get Underway Here Tonight

Greyhounds Win Play-off Series for Dist. 12-B Title

The Knox City Greyhounds—underdogs all the way—out-hustled the O'Brien Bulldogs Wednesday night to win their second game of the three game play-off to decide the conference championship.

O'Brien had won the district double round robin, defeating the Greyhounds twice, and were highly favored to win the play-off series.

All three of the games, which were played in the Stamford gym, were thrilling, hard-fought contests from start to finish. In the first game, last Friday night, the 'Hounds nosed out the favorites, 32-30. At the end of the first quarter O'Brien led 9-6, and at half time Knox City was in the lead, 16-11. O'Brien pulled ahead again and at the end of the third period held a 27-21 advantage. Wayne Hutchinson of O'Brien was high-point man of the game with 11 points, followed by Knox City's Jerry Wilson with 8.

Monday night, the Bulldogs evened the series with a 47-40 victory over the 'Hounds. The winners were ahead all through the game, but a last-quarter rally by the 'Hounds whittled the lead to 7 points. Guy Robinson of Knox City was high man with 18 points while Hutchinson scored 16 for O'Brien.

Wednesday, Knox City's victory was again by two points, with the final score 40-38. The Bulldogs held a slim lead at the end of each quarter, with the score at the beginning of the last period 34-31 in their favor. In the final quarter the lead changed several times, and with the score tied in the final three seconds, Guy Thomas Robinson dropped in two free throws to give the 'Hounds their two-point lead. O'Brien quickly sank a field goal, but official time had run out.

With the victory, the 'Hounds won the right to represent the district in the regional tournament at Canyon. Their first game will probably be next Friday in the Field House at West Texas State College.

According to Supt. Harold Barnett, the Knox City athletic fund netted \$112.12 from the three games at Stamford. Net from the first game was \$24.97, from the second \$38.20, and from the third \$48.95.

One of the better games of the tournament is expected at 3:00 p. m. Saturday when the winner of the Rule-Woodson game meets the winner of the O'Brien-Weinert game.

Finals will begin with the girls' consolation at 6:30 p. m. Saturday, followed by the boys' consolation at 7:30, girls' championship at 8:30, and boys' championship at 9:30.

Supreme Court Refuses To Review School Case

The State Supreme Court Wednesday turned down the Knox City School District's request for a rehearing of the Munday vs. Knox City school land case, making Munday the winner in the latest round.

The case involved about 16,000 acres of land in the old Sunset school district. The land was ordered annexed to the Knox City district after three petitions were presented to the county board.

Munday, seeking an injunction to recover the land, lost in both the district court and the Court of Civil Appeals, but the Supreme Court reversed the decisions of the lower courts.

The Supreme Court ruled that the three petitions were one transaction, and violated a statute prohibiting one district from taking more than 10 per cent of another district at one time.

Mr. O'Pry, a native of Georgia who moved to Haskell county in 1906, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Friday.

Gnadt has some \$800 worth of equipment, all specially designed for juggling, that he uses in his program.

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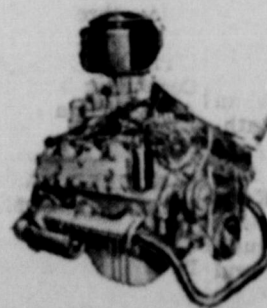

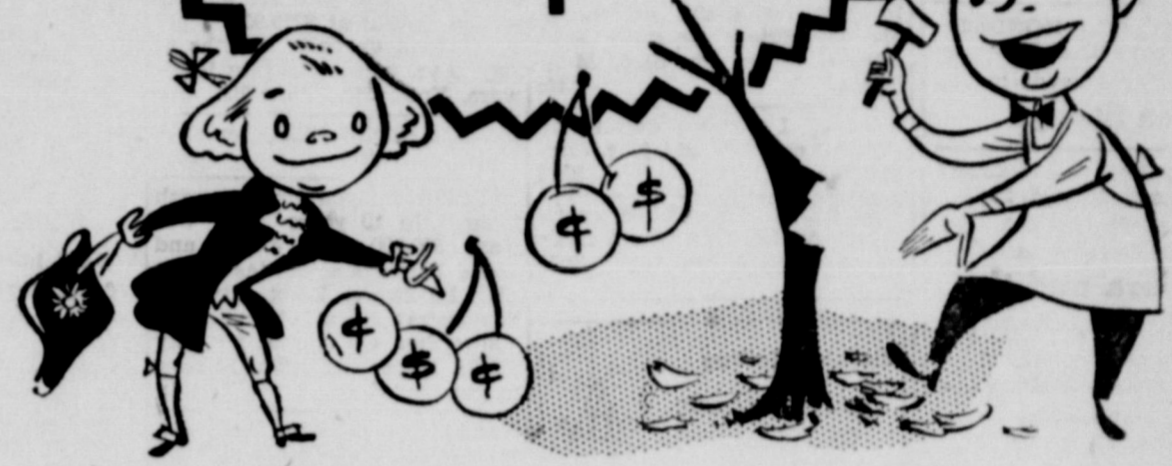
