## "Painless" Taxes Really Hurt

During recent months I heard a growing chorus against the so-called "painless" taxes.

That is the term used to describe those taxes levied directly; but are hidden in the cost of food, shelter, and other necessities. The theory is that what the average citizen doesn't know about the costs of government won't hurt him—and that it won't hurt the officials who fix those costs, either.

But unfortunately for the theory, such taxes are beginning to attain a high degree of visibility. For a while they were discernible only in the rising cost of living. Now they have come more clearly into the light. A recently published analysis of Federal income sources tells the story much as follows:

In 1932, direct taxes (on income, corporations, etc.) produced 58 1/2 per cent of our Federal revenue, while indirect taxes (baked into your bread and woven into your clothes) produced 41 1/2 per cent—approximately \$782,900,000.

In 1933, direct taxes produced only 42 per cent of our revenue, while indirect taxes climbed to 58 per cent—approximately \$1,091,000,000.

In 1934, direct taxes produced 34 per cent of our Federal income, while indirect taxes soared to 66 per cent—approximately \$1,974,100,000.

In 1935, the proportion of hidden taxes dropped a bit. Direct taxes produced 36 1/2 per cent, while indirect taxes accounted for 63 1/2 per cent. But the total of invisible taxes continued to soar. It rose to approximately \$2,234,100,000.

Who paid those taxes hidden in the cost of living? The rich? To a minor degree. But the overwhelming share was paid by that huge majority of average citizens who labor to buy food and clothes and shelter for themselves and their families. And the larger the family, the higher the bill.

To whom, then, are hidden taxes "painless"? To no one, it would seem. And certainly not to the great body of American workers and earners who continue to pay them in the form of rising prices for almost everything they buy.

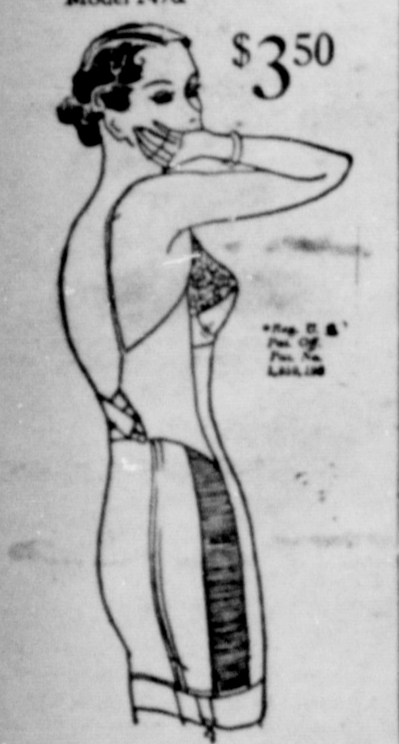

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## BIBLE CHRONOLOGY OF GENESIS FIVE

By J. A. Wilson

Perhaps the array of figures in the genealogy of the generations before the Great Deluge recorded in the fifth chapter of Genesis have confused others as it once did me. I have arranged herein the mathematical account of the inspired record, giving the date of birth, length of life and year of departure of the pre-deluge Patriarchs from Adam to Noah. I believe the figures will be found wholly accurate when applied to the Bible account.

In the Scofield Bible the chronological date of the beginning of the present world including man, is set at 400 B. C., the Noachic ministry and account of the flood is 2448 B. C., a difference of only 1556 years. But let us bear in mind that the call came to Noah in his 500th year, that he reached 100 years or more without a single convert, not even his father and grandfather who were still living. The flood came in the 600th year of Noah, 1556 years from the beginning.

"And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul." Gen. 2-7.

Adam was created in the year 0, lived 930 years, died in the year 930.

Both was born in the year 130, lived 912 years, died in the year 1042.

Noah was born in the year 215, lived 905 years, died in the year 1125.

Cainan was born in the year 325, lived 910 years, died in the year 1235.

Mahalal was born in the year 295, lived 895 years, died in the year 1290.

Jared was born in the year 466, lived 962 years, died in the year 1422.

Enoch was born in the year 622, lived 365 years, was translated in the year 987.

Methuselah was born in the year 687, lived 969 years, died in the year the flood came, 1656.

Lamech was born in the year 874, lived 777 years, died in the year 1651, five years before the flood came.

Noah was born in the year 1056 according to Genesis 7-11, he was 500 years old when the flood came, therefore the Great Deluge came in the year of the world, 1656. Lamech, the last of the Patriarchs except Methuselah had been dead five years, the record shows that Methuselah lived into the year of the flood, Genesis 7-11 says the flood began on the 17th day of the second month, Genesis 5-27 records the death of Methuselah, therefore he died before the 17th day of the second month of the year of the world, 1656.
