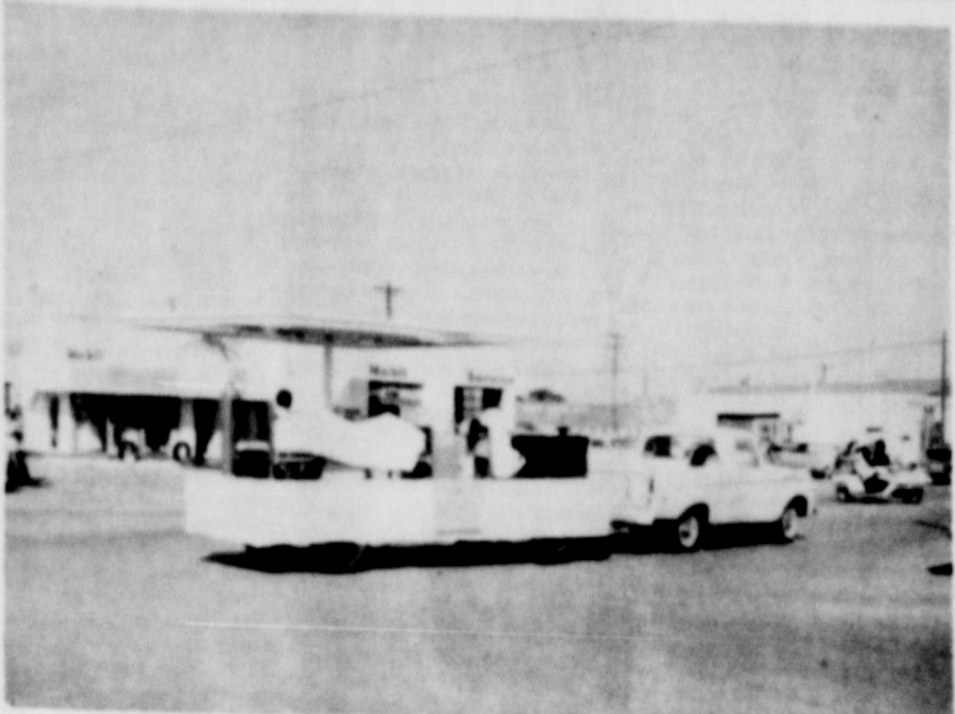

The annual Arts, Crafts, and Hobby Show will be held Saturday, October 21, beginning at 10 a.m. There will be three divisions for the show including Children (through elementary grades), Youth (Junior High through High School) and Adult. All collections must be suitable for display. Anyone desiring to sell exhibited work may do so with the stipulation they do not have the price displayed on the item before judging, and that it may not be removed from the premises until after the show. Show building will be open from 9 to 5 Thursday, October 19 and 9 until 10:00 a.m. Friday, October 20. No entries will be accepted after that time. Judging will be at 2:00 p.m. Friday. Entry blanks may be returned to the Chamber office, or brought with entry.

Junk Cars No Longer Allowed On City Street

In a regular meeting of the City Council Monday night, an ordinance was passed prohibiting the parking of junk vehicles on city streets. Any vehicle without current registration tags or which is not in operable condition is considered in this category, officials said. Action was taken on the matter because of the increasing number of old vehicles left parked on city streets in recent months. City officials said that many times the parked vehicles create a traffic hazard as well as being dangerous when a driver's vision is restricted as he approaches an intersection. Several residents have complained that the old vehicles are "eye sores" to the town. Other routine business matters were attended to before the meeting was adjourned.

Fund Started For Rocky Strickland

A fund to help defray hospital expenses for Rocky Strickland was established recently at the Citizens State Bank by Betty Bolton, manager of the Dairy Mart. The Knox City Greyhounds outtraced the Throckmorton Greyhounds Friday night at Throckmorton 21-19. The K. C. Hounds had to come from behind three times in order to win. Good defense on the part of K. C. on Throck's try for extra points and the true toe of Joey Swain proved to be the difference. K. C. received the opening kickoff and on first down from their own 30 a long pass went incomplete. Gary Carver moved thru a big hole for 16 yds. Three more plays produced nothing and we punted. Throck went to work on their own 15. Rob Harrison and Roy Posey combined on the first play and stopped the runner for a 1 yd loss. Phillip Newton tackled the next ball carrier and after an incomplete pass they punted. On first down for K. C. a hard rush was put on by Throck and a Swain pass was intercepted and returned to K. C.'s 45 yd line. 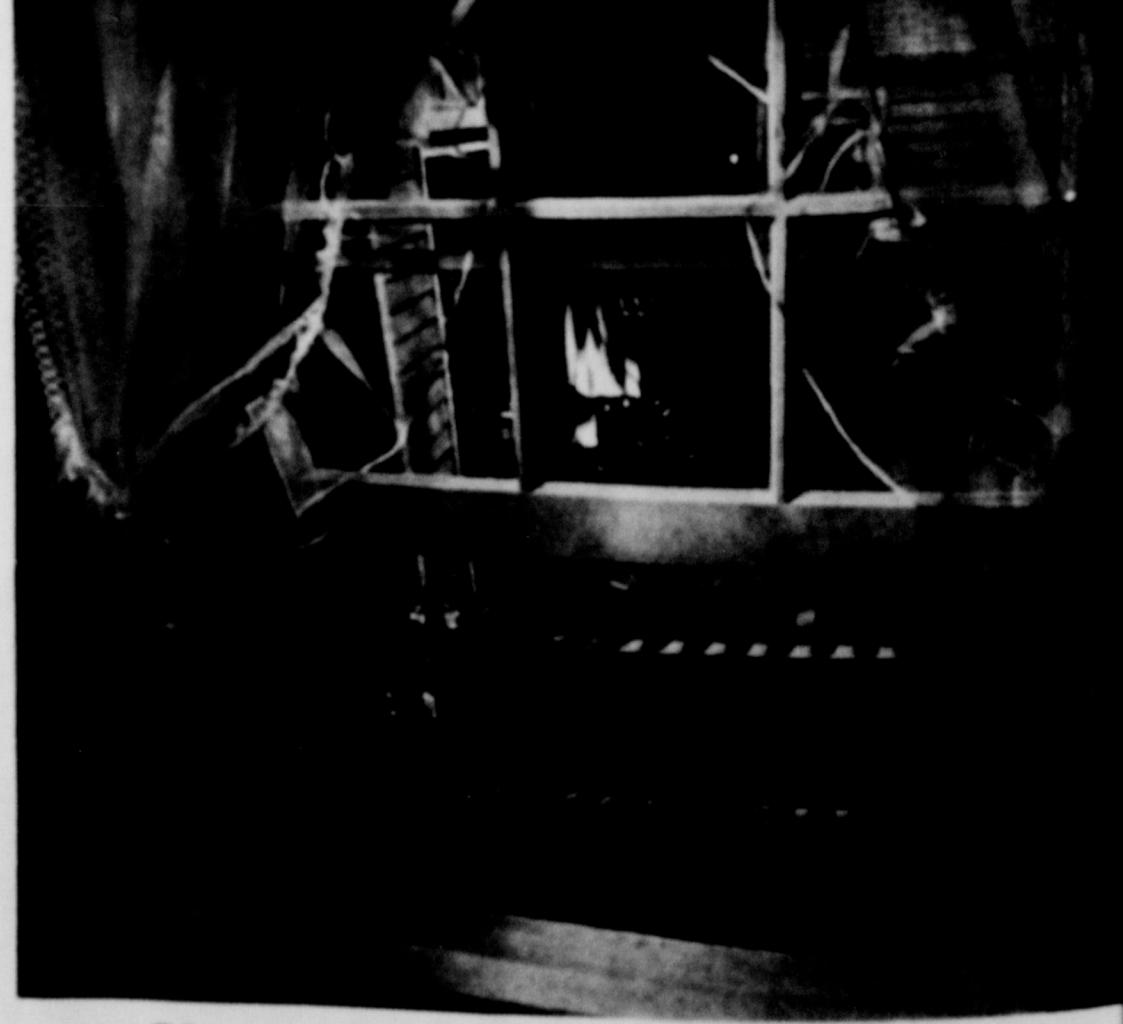

We have an open date this week but we're all backing the Hounds for the Paducah and especially the Munday game. We're behind you all the way!

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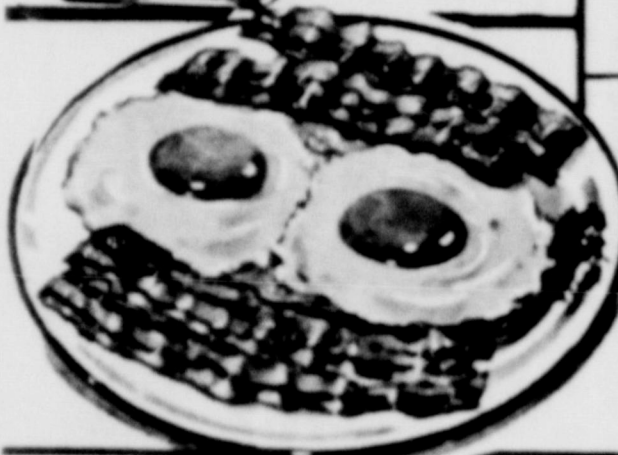
