James and Pam Johnson Named 4-H Gold Star Award Winners

James and Pam Johnson, Oplin 4-H'ers and son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Johnson of Oplin, have been selected to receive the 1968 4-H Gold Star Award, according to Jerry L. Lackey, County Agricultural Agent. This award is the highest honor a 4-H'er can receive on a local level, and recognizes the two as being Callahan County's "outstanding 4-H'ers for 1968."

Lackey stated that this is the first time since 4-H was begun in Callahan County that this award went to members of the same family. It is extremely rare across Texas for a family to be so honored.

The requirement for qualifying for the award are: (1) that the recipient must have been in 4-H at least 3 years; (2) that they be carrying a project the current year; (3) that they have an outstanding record in leadership and project achievement the current year.

Lackey stated that the two 4-H'ers will be honored at the Callahan County Gold Star Banquet to be held in November, and will also be honored along with Gold Star winners in the other 19 counties of Extension District 8 at the annual District Gold Star Banquet, to be held on Tarleton campus in Stephenville in November.

Pam Johnson is 13 years old and has been in 4-H for four years. Her projects have included clothing, foods, swine, poultry and sheep. She has participated in the Callahan County Dress Review three years, receiving a 3rd, 2nd and a blue ribbon in this activity. She has received the County Medal of Achievement in clothing and

home economics.

Pam has received 2 ribbons higher than 5th place exhibiting her swine projects at the local, County and area shows. She has received the County Swine Award for superior achievement, and has received a 1st and 2nd place ribbon exhibiting turkeys at area shows.

Pam has served as reporter and treasurer of the Oplin 4-H Club, and as delegate to the Callahan County 4-H Council.

James Johnson is 15 years old and has been in 4-H four years. His main project has been swine, but he has also been active in sheep, beef cattle, rabbits, poultry, livestock judging and leadership. James has had 65 head of hogs as his project, has received numerous ribbons exhibiting these hogs at the local, County and area shows. He has received the County Medal of Achievement in swine.

James also received 5 ribbons exhibiting lambs, won Champion pen of turkeys at the West Texas Fair and has received the County Medal of Achievement in agriculture. James also received a 3rd place award with his record book of swine, entered in competition with the County winners in Extension District 8.

James has served as treasurer and president of the Oplin 4-H Club and as delegate to the Callahan County 4-H Council.

AUSTIN — A blue-ribbon governor's committee has recommended a monumental 10-year plan for improving Texas public school education that will triple costs and require a \$300 to \$400 million tax bill next year.

The 15-member panel said its plan would uplift schools out of "mediocracy" and "inefficiency."

Highlights of the report include recommendations for more and better-paid teachers, free kindergartens, expanded free education for adults, required consolidation of small school districts, additional benefits for teachers and encouragement of educational innovations and experimentation.

Committee, named by Gov. John Connally and authorized by the 1965 Legislature, also urged programs to point up the cultural heritage of minority groups and to encourage human dignity.

Altogether the proposals of this committee on Public School Education would increase local, state and federal school costs in Texas from \$840 million to \$2.1 billion at the end of 10 years. Under the plan about four per cent of the state's income would have to go to schools. Some \$503 million more would be required, bulk from state sources, for 1970-71.

Committee recommended simplification in the complex formula to figure local school district costs, to provide that the local districts' 20 to 25 per cent share would be based on taxable property values. Local share, of course, would go up along with the state's. School building would remain a local responsibility.

Key recommendations include: Increasing basic allotments from \$23 to \$50 per pupil, plus additions for transportation, materials and vocational teachers.

Providing "basic foundation program" to replace 20-year-old minimum foundation program.

Adding 18,000 teachers, even though enrollment may decrease slightly (by about 22,000). This

would provide a pupil-teacher ratio of 21 to one instead of 24 to one.

Increasing teacher pay from \$4,734 minimum to \$5,400 in 1969-70 and \$6,300 the following year. Maximum pay would go up from \$6,912 to \$8,800 by 1970-71, as covered by state guarantee.

Incorporating 17 step pay scale in 1971-72. This would provide \$3,000 for teacher aides and go up to \$28,657 for administrators.

Requiring districts with fewer than 2,600 average daily attendance in 12 grades to consolidate by June 1, 1972. (Some exceptions would be allowed for remote countywide districts, special districts and schools on military bases). Redistricting recommendations will be provided in six weeks, committee said.

Encouraging districts with more than 50,000 enrollments to decentralize into community systems with incentive payments of \$10 a student.

Abolishing county school superintendents as terms expire. Creating free public kindergartens for five year olds by 1980, summer programs with priority for the poor and free adult courses for those over 18 who have not finished high school.

Offering wider selection of textbooks and materials and extra teachers and aides for districts with large numbers of low-income families. Replacing 20 regional education service centers with fewer regional branch offices of Texas Education Agency.

Districting of the 21-member Board of Education to conform with 23 present congressional districts.

Establishing new program for 25,000 students teachers and another for interns in school administration.

Setting up variety of teacher benefits including continuing contracts, professional consultation, teacher aides for every 100 students, and 10 free hours a week for teachers to grade

PROJECT FIND TO SERVE AREA SENIOR CITIZENS

Project FIND is a Community Action Program designed to locate and serve the elderly who are friendless, isolated, needy and disabled. The project encourages and organizes the elderly to give expression to their needs and aspirations, and facilitate their involvement in social action and self-help programs. Leadership talents are sought out, trained and channeled into service on behalf of the community. Employment opportunities will be created and provided for elderly residents of the community for parttime jobs and unpaid volunteer services from those who wish to help with the program.

When appropriate, the project will refer individuals to existing health, welfare, employment, housing, legal aid, recreation or other services. FIND will also take responsibility for expediting such referrals and for facilitating the relationship between the older person and the agency providing the service.

Project FIND is a pilot program designed to serve senior citizens 60 years or older. The project is composed of a 16-county area in central Texas which has a percentage of 20.3% of the population 65 years old or older. This 16-county area roughly represents 32,675 or more, the majority of which are spinsters or widows, many of whom are living alone. This area has the highest percentage of old people of any section of the State of Texas.

Mrs. Maureen Romero, Project FIND Director, will be in charge of four coordinators and several aides. She will work under the Hill Country Community Action Agency, Fred Whittenburg, Director in San Saba serving as the prime sponsor for FIND Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., A. E. Lamb, Director in Coleman and Brownwood and the Community Council of Comal and Blanco Counties, Max

Winkler, Director, in New Braunfels will be delegate agencies for the program. The 16-county area and coordinators include the following: A. H. Floyd - Coleman, Concho, Runnels and McCulloch; Mrs. Gordon Griffin Jr. - Brown, Comanche, Eastland and Callahan; Mrs. Mildred Anderson - Mills, Erath, Hamilton and Bosque; and John Myers - San Saba, Llano, Mason and Blanco.

Rare Tropical Night-Blooming Plant In Bob Joy Back Yard

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Joy, 621 West 3rd in Baird, displays a very unusual plant in their back yard, known as the Night Blooming Cereus. The plant only blooms at night between the hours of 11 p. m. and midnight. It is not seen too many times by the human eye.

Since the cereus is a tropical plant, the Joys keep this plant in the cellar during the cold months. The plant will bloom only during the warm season and may bloom three to four times during the summer. The

plant in the Joy back yard is tied to a large tree trunk and is over seven feet tall. It receives only part of the day sunshine.

The bloom in the photo above was forced about one half open and the picture was taken at 9 p. m. It is egg-shell in color and odorless. The bloom will open one time and wilt by the next morning.

The cereus is described in the dictionary as a large genus of a plant of the cactus family, chiefly tropical, but found growing from California, to Chile.

Through several species producing large tubular nocturnal blossoms have the name, night blooming cereus, this name is specially applied to cereus grandiflorus, which is extensively cultivated for its beautiful, short lived flowers.

Cereus giganteus, native to Arizona, New Mexico and Texas, has a columnar trunk which often rises to a height of sixty feet.

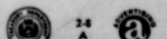
