Despite the cold north wind and sand that hit Shotwell Stadium in Abilene Saturday night shortly after the kick-off for the bi-district game between Knox City and Jim Ned, over 2,000 fans were on hand to watch the Indians. from Jim Ned hand the Greyhounds their first defeat of the season, 28-12.

Winning the flip, Jim Ned chose to defend the north goal. The Hound eccived and controlled the sall the first quarter driving to Jim Ned's 20 when a 15-yard penalty proved costly and denied the Hounds the chance to score

Jim Ned scored early in the second quarter when they went 72 yards in six plays with Johnny Quinney going the final 20 yards and kicking the extra point.

The Hounds ran three plays and punted and the Indians got the ball back and didn't relinquish it until nearly the half. Jim Ned drove from its own nine to the 35 and Ricky McClure punted 23 yards. The ball was fumbled and Tommy New pounced on the pigskin for the Indians at the Hound 43.

This time, it took the Indians eight plays to get in. The big gainer was a 20 yard scamper by Quinney and he again added the extra point, ending the first half, 14-0. The Hounds took the wind in the second half, but didn't get to use it to the best advan-

The historical background of Thanksgiving Day reminds us that initiative is one of the vital keys to success.


