Former Resident Receives Recognition For Air Force Work

Mrs. Rowena B. Lutts, chief of the Administration Branch of the Maintenance Administration and Property Office, Kelly Air Force Base, San Antonio, recently received a superior accomplishment pay increase for "superior work performance well over and beyond the normal requirements of her position."

Mrs. Lutts, the former Rowena Boyd, is a sister of Russell Boyd and a former resident of this community.

The award was presented to Mrs. Lutts for her work performance from Aug. 1, 1950, to Aug. 21, 1951, the time the recommendation was initiated.

During that period, Mrs. Lutts was chief of the Administration unit. In addition to her normal duties she performed the extremely vital duties of Unit Security Classification Officer for Office, Director of Maintenance; Office Chief, Maintenance Shops Sub-Division, and Administration and Property Office.

Deadline Nears For Applying for Sears Program Pigs

It was announced today that March 22 is the deadline for submitting applications for the eight registered sow pigs and the one boar pig (Duroc) to be awarded to Knox County 4-H members for the 1952-53 Sears Swine Program.

Awards will be made on judging of letters entitled "Why I Want a Pig", and ability of the boy to care for the animal. Letters may be mailed to Bill Pallemyer, County Agent, Benjamin, Texas, or turned in at the 4-H meetings to be held the week of March 16-22.

To be eligible to win a pig, the boy must be a Knox County 4-H member, and agree to show the animal in the county Sears Show, and the district show if eligible. He will also agree to give one sow pig back to the program in 1953, and if through neglect the animal dies, he will pay \$15.00 to replace the registered animal in the following year's program. All animals but the one sow pig that the boy must return are his to dispose of as he sees fit. Three pigs of the litter are to be fed for the county show, but the boy may dispose of these after the show if he wishes.

Prizes are set aside for heavy litters at 56 days of age, and placings in the county show to be held at Munday in September. Any 4-H member who has not raised a litter of pigs in the Sears program is eligible to apply for a registered sow pig, and any boy who has not owned the Sears boar pig is eligible to apply for the boar.
