'Hounds Defeat Weinert; To Play Goree Friday Nite

The Knox City Greyhounds got over a big hurdle on the road to the district championship last week when they defeated the strong Weinert team 27 to 12.

The 'Hounds scored only once in the first half—on a 40-yard run by Jerry Wilson in the first quarter—and at half-time the score was tied, 6-6.

In the third quarter, Wallace May scored on a 45-yard end run. In the fourth, the 'Hounds tallied again on a pass from Robinson to Jones, who lateraled off to Wilson. The last TD was scored by May on a screen pass.

The 'Hounds showed up better on defense than in previous games this season, with May and John Ed Smith doing an effective job of stopping Weinert's Owens.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the 'Hounds will play the Goree Wildcats on the local field, and school officials urged fans to continue giving the team the splendid support evidenced so far this season.

For the Goree game, the boys will be suited out in new "skin-tight" uniforms, with grey breeches, red jerseys and white numerals.

Telephone Company Officials Promise Better Local Service

Better telephone service for Knox City and O'Brien residents was promised by officials of the Southwestern Associated Telephone Company at a meeting held Tuesday in the directors room at the bank.

The meeting was arranged by a Lions Club committee headed by Roy Baker, in an attempt to obtain more efficient service.

Representing the company were Ray Redd of Dallas, general commercial superintendent, and Mr. Blackney. A number of local business men met with the officials.

Mr. Redd explained that the present unit in Knox City is filled to capacity, and no new telephones can be added until new equipment is installed. He added that the equipment in Knox City is new, and just as good as the equipment in larger cities, but that the equipment is overtaxed.

A completely new unit is expected to be installed by April of 1952, Mr. Redd said, explaining that a larger building and a larger unit, which can be expanded, is the only solution to Knox City's problem.

He also promised that some plan will be worked out so that repairs to the present system will be made the day following "out-of-order" notices, at the latest.

Extension of the Katz Strawn sand field of northeastern Stonewall County into southeastern King County was indicated this week by a show encountered in Cary & Christopher No. 1 Mrs. J. T. Orsborn, in the J. T. Orsborn survey.

The well, almost a mile from the nearest producer, topped a sand at 5063 feet and drilled the formation to 5100 feet. On a two-hour drillstem test, recovery was 3,000 feet of free oil and no water. Pipe was set on top of the formation and cemented, and operators have drilled plug and are swabbing.

Considerable acreage in the area is under lease to Continental Oil Co., Deep Rock Oil Corporation and others, and a successful completion is expected to spur further drilling in the area.

A gauge of 157.32 barrels of 38.9 gravity oil in four hours has been filed for Skelly Oil Co. No. 5 Roy Day, in the Katz field 13 miles west of Knox City. Casing was set on this well at 5137 feet, and production is through 88 perforations at 4841-4863 feet.

The Sid Katz No. 3 Underwood gauged 152.49 barrels of 37.6 gravity oil in 15 hours, through 1-2 inch choke. Production is from 96 perforations at 4816-28 feet.

Pipe was set at 5070 feet on the Katz No. 2 Ed Lewis, with bottom of the hole at 5090, and operators are waiting on swabbing unit. This will be Katz' first producer in the lower (3rd) Strawn sand.

Katz No. 2 W. D. Lewis is below 4105 feet.

T. P. Coal & Oil Co. State C-3, a directional hole, is drilling below 3856 feet.

Frank Wood Drilling Co. is rigging up for the Katz No. 6 Lorentzen.

The Thomas D. Humphrey and Humble Oil Co. No. 1 Beatrice B. Armstrong, a wildcat about 5 miles southwest of town, is in the Mississippian, with no shows encountered. It is reported that the rig will be moved from this location to the Horace Coon, Jr., No. 1 C. C. Hutchinson, 330 feet from the north and east lines of section 22, block 14, H & TC survey.

In the North Knox City field, the Stanolind No. 2 Verhalen, an offset one location north of the No. 1 producer, is below 1,000 feet.

Stanolind's No. 1 Myrtle White, a mile east of town, is drilling below 3500 feet.

Fair Foundation of Tyler has staked location for the No. 1 Geo. T. Hardberger, 150 feet out of the southeast corner of the Hardberger tract about 2 miles north of town. It is reported that the rig will be moved from the Sunray No. 1 Snelson to this location.

Perkins and Cullum have abandoned the No. 1 Mrs. Josie Hester. Bottom of the hole was 5012 feet.

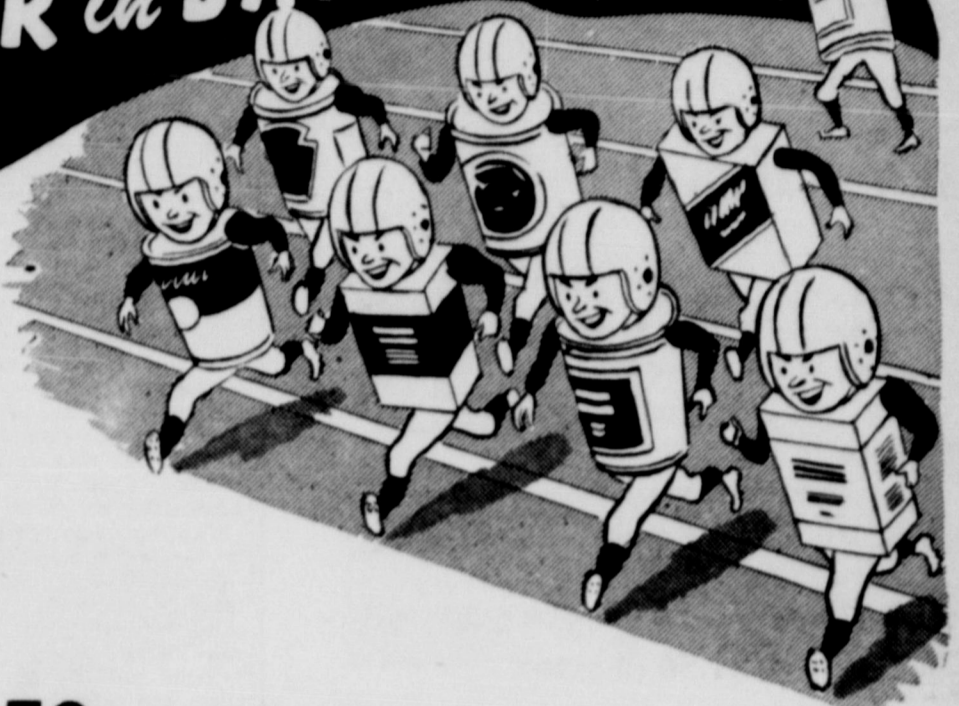

There came on to be considered a petition signed by 25 persons asking that an election be ordered upon the proposition hereinafter set forth, and

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees that said petition is signed by at least twenty resident, qualified, property taxpaying voters of said School District, who own taxable property in said District, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and is otherwise in conformity with law, the Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted, and said election as prayed for should be ordered:

Therefore, be it Ordered by the Board of Trustees of Knox City Independent School District:

That an election be held in said School District on the 27th day of October, 1951, which date is sufficient to allow posting notice of said election for 10 days prior thereto and which date is also within thirty days from the date of this order, at which election, in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said

School District for their action thereupon:

Proposition

Shall the Board of Trustees of Knox City Independent School District have the power to levy and collect an ad valorem tax on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation of all taxable property in said district, for the maintenance of the public free schools in said Knox City Independent School District of and at the rate of not to exceed \$1.50 on the one hundred (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property in said district, such tax, if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1952, and annually thereafter unless it be discontinued as provided by law.

That said election shall be held at the following places in said School District, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) At American Legion Building in Knox City, Texas, in said School District, with G. D. McCarty as Presiding Judge, and E. L. Park and A. E. Propps, Clerks.

Following the ACC game, the Indians will go on the war path again, making a road trip to Sherman to meet the Austin College Kangaroos.

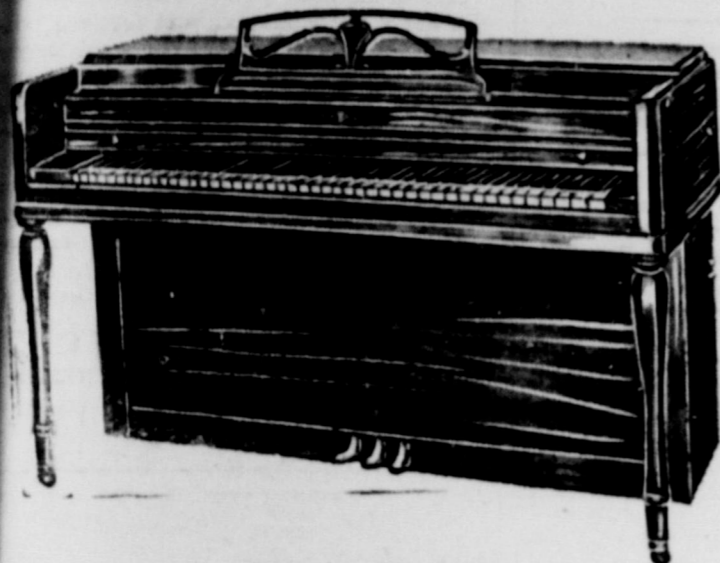

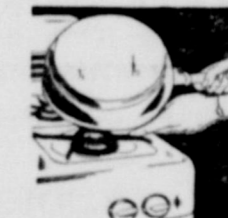

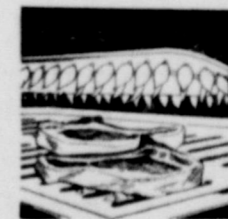
