Knox City Leads in M.O.D. Contributions

Knox City again led the county in March of Dimes contributions. Mrs. L. A. Parker, county campaign director, announced Tuesday after final tabulations were made. S. E. Park, Sr., served as local chairman.

Citizens here gave a total of \$1,426.20, while the county total was \$3,639.47. Mrs. Parker said this was considered very successful, in view of the fact that an emergency fund drive was held last summer.

Knox City's Red Cross quota was reached by 4:00 p. m. Tuesday, the first day of the drive, according to E. R. Carpenter, local chairman.

The chairman, who made the personal solicitations himself, expressed his appreciation for the enthusiastic cooperation he received. Knox City's quota was \$600, and by 4 o'clock \$605.50 had been collected, as well as a number of pledges. Carpenter said a number of businessmen were out when he called, so the total contribution is expected to exceed the quota by at least \$200.

Knox County 4-H'ers Make Good Showing at Wichita Falls

Knox County 4-H boys and girls made a very good showing in the Wichita Falls Junior Beef Show last week, according to County Agent W. J. Bryan.

Honors brought home by the group included Champion Junior Steer, second place group of five steers from a county, fourth place Hereford heifer and fifth place steer judging team.

The show got off to a nerve-racking start Wednesday morning, Bryan said, when judges Walter Rice and Jack Borlan of Ft. Worth took out a third of the steers in sifting from the 90 entries down to the 60 steers that would remain in the show and sale. Knox and Baylor counties were the only two counties out of the 26 eligible who had ten steers entered and did not have any steers sifted out of the show.

In the beef heifer show Wednesday afternoon Bobby Idol's heifer placed fourth in the Junior division for registered Herefords.

Judging of the steers was on Thursday morning and the highlight of the show for the Knox County group was when the steer fed by Donnie Ryder of Benjamin was selected as champion Junior steer of the show.

In the group classes the Knox County entries were selected as the second best group of five steers in the show.

Thursday afternoon the Knox County 4-H judging team placed fifth, competing with 36 4-H and FFA teams from Texas and Oklahoma. Boys on the team were John Reneau, Donnie Ryder, Charles Todd and Samuel Garrett. John was the high scoring boy on the team with 199 points out of a possible 250.

The sale was held Friday morning with Knox County steers bringing from 30 to 55 cents a pound. The ten clubbers brought back more than \$4,000 in prizes and sales on their steers.

Refreshments were served and a visiting hour was enjoyed.

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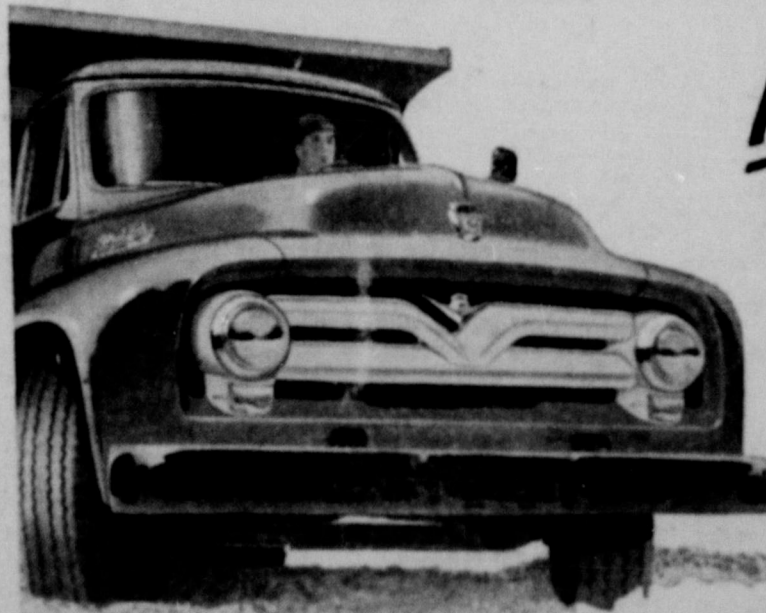
