The official government in Hanoi has refused to publish official lists of captured servicemen, or to allow them to correspond with their families. Several organizations and some military publications believe that a deluge of protest letters addressed to various embassies and newspapers might sway the attitude in Hanoi. It is suggested that these letters should be non-political, without malice, simply stating that the writer wants to protest the lack of communication between our prisoners and their families, and the lack of proper food and medical treatment.

A letter of this type should be written on airmail paper and envelope, which will weigh approximately 1/2 ounce. The amount of postage necessary is listed with each enclosed address.

I ask that you consider this matter for a future editorial. Surely our military friends would recognize our letter writing as compassion in action, Since these letters can do no harm, is it not worth the chance that they might do some good? Thank you very much.

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Path To Legislature Was **Challenge To Bill Heatly**

It may have been slow hitchhiking that landed Bill Heatly in the Texas Legislature.

It may have been an angry reply to a college president, or perhaps just a friendly question by a stranger at a lunch counter.

However he came to be in the legislature, the country lawyer from Paducah, who would rather be a country lawyer than anything he can think of, has been recognized as one of the leaders of the legislature for most of the 16 years since he was first elected.

He is completing his fifth term as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee. Never before had anyone held the chairmanship more than three terms, but, then, Bill Heatly has a way of getting things done.

Appointments to the appropriations committee generally go to veteran members of the legislature but Heatly was appointed in his freshman year, Except for the 1961-62 term he has been on the appropriations committee since. In his second term he was chairman of the State Affairs Committee, the most important policy - making group in the House. This is another appointment generally reserved for an old hand.

When the legislature created the Legislative Audit Committee in 1959, Heatly was named to that committee and has been a member since, except for the 1961-62 term. This committee is made up of the lieutenant governor, speaker of the House, two senators and two representatives, it is authorized to check on expenditures of all state agencies to determine whether the intent of the legislature is being followed in daily operations.

How did the country lawyer come so quickly to such prominence?

Perhaps it was because of a decision he made when he was first elected in 1954.

"I felt that to serve my district best it was vital that I become involved in the larger issues of state government and that I become acquainted with the broader state problems and try to help to solve them." he

But, about that hitchhiking. That was along in Septemof 1931 and young Heatly Jr.) had set out from the family farm in Limestone County - east of Waco - to go to Lubbock to enroll in Texas Tech. Not that he could afford to go to college but he had a Fomise of sorts from Pete Cawthon, then head football coach at Tech.

In the spring of 1930 one of the first coaching clinics in the nation was held at Texas Tech, and the coach at Mart took Heatly along as one of the players, (The fall before, Bill had quarterbacked the Mart High School team to 15 straight victories and a regional championship.)

"If you can get here, come to school this fall," Cawthon said.

It was 15 months later that Bill decided to go to Tech.

"I packed my clothes in a 'please don't rain' suffcase and started hitchhiking to Lubbock, The first day I got as far as Decatur, I got a room at the hotel for 75 cents and went down to the coffee shop and ordered the merchants lunch for 25 cents.

"A man sat down beside me and asked if I had come to Decatur to go to college,

What college?" I asked. "Decatur Baptist College," replied the stranger, who was the football coach at the col-

Heatly attended Decatur Baptist College and was quarterback of the football team. Then he moved to Baylor University where he was graduated from law school in 1936.

The confrontation with a college president was at Baylor when Heatly turned up with no money, for his final year of law school.

Enrollment procedures called for a student having his enrollment card stamped by the cashier before he signed up for classes, unless the card was signed by the president of the

Heatly went to see the president, Pat Neff, former governor of Texas.

"Why don't your parents mortgage the farm and raise oney so you can finish

college," Neff asked. Heatly was infuriated. "If that's the way it is, I I left when I came here," he

Then he added

"But if I can stay in school nine more months - and do 12 months work, which I am eligible to do - I will have the same initials after my name that you have after yours."

Today, Heatly says that it seemed like 10 minutes that the former governor sat and looked at him, Then he signed the

Heatly graduated the next spring. He had completed a six-year course in five years.

He was employed as an attorney in Dallas and Beaumont and then opened his law office in Wichita Falls, where he also was in the oil business, operating a drilling rig.
