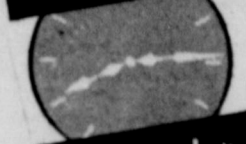

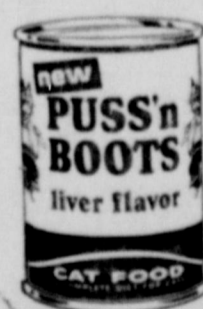

## Highway Patrol Investigates Five Accidents In Feb., Damage Is \$1,560.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highway in Knox County during the month of February, according to Sergeant Frank Jirek, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,560.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1967 shows a total of 8 accidents resulting in no persons killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,170.00.

Only one month remains for approximately 2,000,000 vehicles registered in Texas to secure the 1967 Safety Inspection Sticker.

The period set by law for securing the 1967 sticker ends at midnight, April 15, 1967, and there can be no extension of that deadline.

The Sergeant stated, "Any motorist whose vehicle bearing Texas license plates that does not display the 1967 inspection sticker after April 15 is subject to arrest by any Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, City Policeman or any officer of the Department of Public Safety and upon conviction will be subject to a fine not to exceed \$200."

## March Is Cancer Education Month; Have Check-Up, Give To This Cause

Nothing shows more forcefully how far out of perspective values of human life have become than the need for the American Cancer Society's five-year educational program to drastically reduce unnecessary deaths from cancer. The Society has selected six sites of cancer, representing over 60 per cent of all cancer cases and some 48 per cent of all cancer deaths, for special educational emphasis.

These sites of cancer—uterus, breast, lung, colon and rectum, oral cavity and skin—accounted for nearly 150,000 deaths in 1966, many of them due to lack of personal responsibility and personal vigilance.

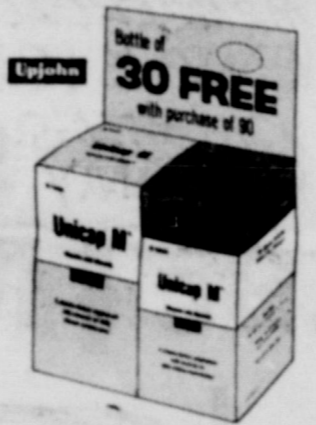
Take three samples: lung cancer took more than 50,000 lives last year; most lung cancers are caused by cigarette smoking. (Despite intensive warnings more than half of all teen-agers ignore the scientifically proved dangers to their health and become regular cigarette smokers by the time they are 18.) Skin cancer took nearly 5,000 lives; most skin cancers are caused by too frequent over-exposure to direct sunlight. Uterine cancer took the lives of about 14,000 women; yet, due to the Pap test, it should be possible to detect this cancer at a stage when the chances of cure are virtually 100 per cent.

Need for intensified and broadened instruction about cancer is in itself a harsh tragedy. People just do not behave as they should. Motivating people to take proper action can be difficult and frustrating, as it has been to the American Cancer Society. How difficult it is, is shockingly apparent in the five-year educational goals fixed by the Society. The goals are minimal, far below ideal, but goals, based on hard experience, that the Society believes can be achieved.

We urge our readers to learn cancer's warning signals, act on them; have an annual health checkup, and contribute to the very important work of the American Cancer Society.

## HOME DEMONSTRATION NEWS

### HOME DEMO NEWS

Dr. John E. Larson, Horticultural Vegetables, with the Agricultural Extension Service explained the use of mulches for home garden production in a meeting at Benjamin on March 1.

He discussed the use of organic and plastic mulches applied directly over the garden soil to conserve moisture and to reduce weed growth. He also told of a method of producing tomatoes used by Mrs. Robinson at Troy, Texas in which no irrigation is required.

She chooses her growing site and then makes the bed. First step is to put a sheet of clear plastic on the ground. A 1-foot high frame of boards is placed on the plastic and filled with redwood shavings. (Other kinds of shavings or sawdust will do. Width of frame isn't so important but plastic should be 3 inches wider than the frame.)

I'd suggest it be at least 2 feet wide for plants to be staked and pruned.) For each plant, a gallon sized hole is made in the shavings down to the plastic and a hole punched in the plastic. This cavity is then filled with a good rich soil and plants are set. Moisture rises through the hole in the plastic, supplying the plants' needs so they never need extra watering. The plastic and shavings also prevent weeds.

One modification of Mrs. Robinson's method which has proved satisfactory is as follows:

1. Fertilize and till the soil in manner of good garden procedure before construction of a bed.
2. Make a small mound of soil about four inches in height on top of the tilled area where each plant is to grow.
3. Lay plastic, any type, on top of the tilled area and cut a four to five-inch diameter hole in the plastic at each mound of soil.
4. Construct a frame about four to eight inches in height over the plastic and fill with sawdust or other organic material.
5. Transplant or seed vegetables in each mound of soil.

Or, Lawson says that most vegetables can be grown in the sawdust-plastic mulch frames in which the soil under the frame is cooled causing the condensation of moisture to water plants.

Dr. Lawson also discussed soil preparation and sterilization, vegetable varieties, and answered a number of questions. Those attending were from Knox City, Munday, Benjamin, Truscott, Gilliland, Crowell, and Seymour.




