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County Turnout Light For Special Election

Knox County's voter turnout for Tuesday's special election on the ten Texas Constitutional amendments was extremely light as was also noted in neighboring counties. With approximately 2,700 registered voters in Knox County, only 306 persons made it to the polls. Total vote in Haskell County was 230, Kent County 89,

Baylor County 273, Stonewall County 88, and Jones County 760.

Knox County voters varied from the state voting trend Tuesday, casting the following: Amendment 1, Legislative pay, annual sessions for 123, against 183; Amendment 2, Homestead protection for 242, against 61; Amendment 3, Homestead exemption for 212, against 94; Amendment 4, Conservation districts for 133, against 154; Amendment 5, Coastal seawall bonds for 180, against 114; Amendment 6, District courts jurisdiction for 42, against 250; Amendment 7, Increase vets' land fund for 167, against 134; Amendment 8, Broaden ad valorem tax for 123, against 169; Amendment 9, Water tax exemption for 147, against 149.

Statewide, only Amendments 1 and 8 were turned down.

Mr. McElroy, 78, died Friday in Nichols Hospital in Plainview.

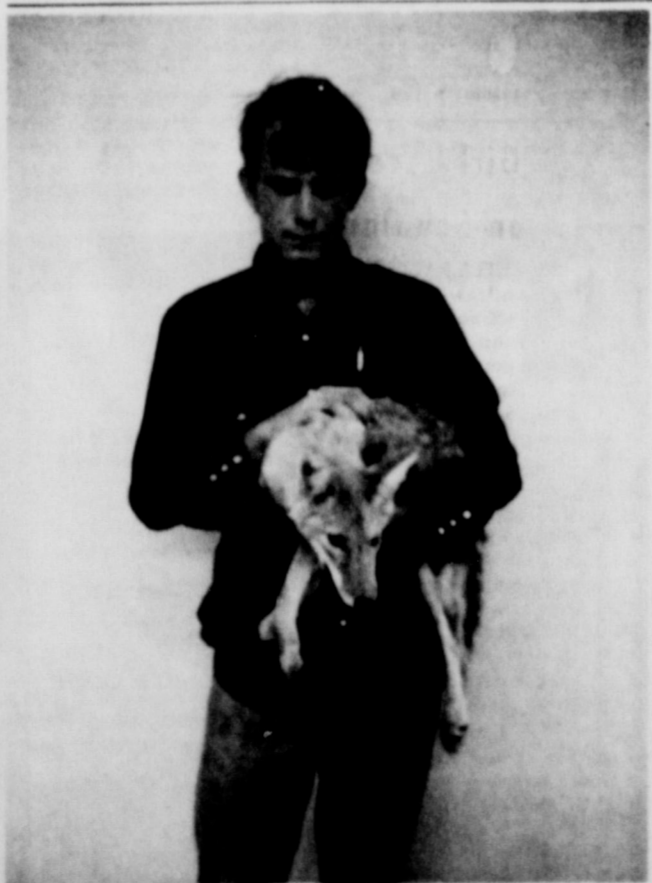

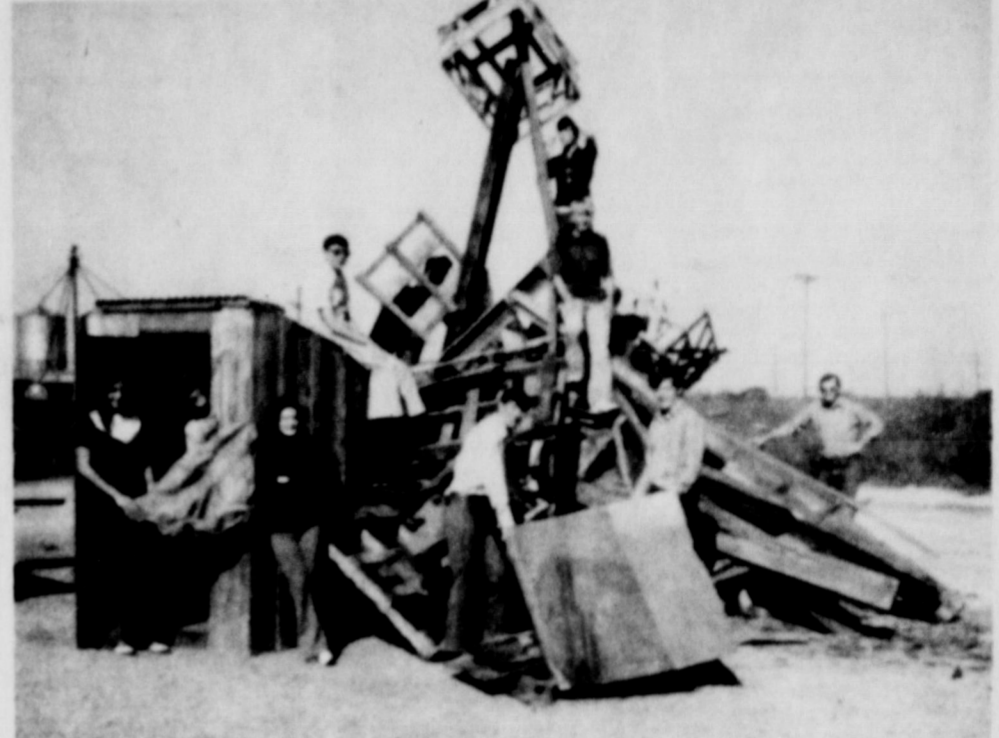
Sunday Open House In O'Brien Will Honor Juan Garcias

After a highly successful game last Friday night against the Munday Moguls, the Hounds are getting set this week to cross swords in a tilt with the number one ranked Class A team in Texas, the Holiday Eagles, on the Eagles' home field at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

The Eagles have been scored on in only one game this season. Crowell did the honors last Friday when they fell to Holiday 20-10.

For the second year in a row and for the fifth time in 20 years, the Knox City Greyhounds defeated the Munday Moguls in a 63-0 mauling in Munday last Friday night.

Knox City racked up 345 yards rushing and 147 yards passing while Munday had a minus two yards rushing and no completed passes.

The Hounds hit the scoreboard three times in the first quarter, once in the second, twice in the third quarter, and three times in the fourth for a total of nine touchdowns.

The Benjamin Mustangs returned from Hobbs victorious Friday night by defeating the Panthers 58-13. The Mustangs' record is now 7-0 for the season and 5-0 in district play.

The Mustangs' defense held the Panthers on their first possession of the game and then the Mustang offense went to work. Keith Conner turned a second and 15 situation into a 69-yard touchdown for Benjamin. Jimmie Pierce added the PAT. Again the Mustangs held as Jimmie Pierce intercepted a Panther pass. the Mustangs capitalized once more before the half, when Ricky Stamps caught a 21-yard touchdown pass from Bryan Bumpas. The PAT by Jimmie Pierce was good. At the half the score was 28-7.

At the opening of the second half, the Mustangs gained possession of their own kick off and two plays later Bryan Bumpas broke 38 yards up the middle for another Mustang TD. Jimmie Pierce added the PAT. The remainder of the third quarter saw no score with both teams playing strong defense. However, in the opening minutes of the fourth quarter Noel Hamilton hit Kenneth Groves for the Mustangs' sixth TD. Jimmie Pierce once more added two. When the Panthers gained possession of the ball, they started a drive that ended when Joe Bob Martinez passed to Oscar Garcia for a 15-yard TD. The PAT failed. Benjamin once again scored when Terry Cartwright ran it in from 3 yards out. The PAT by Pierce was good. The Mustang kick-off went deep into Panther territory. On the energy front, Hightower introduced the only piece of legislation that would have provided more oil during the next five to ten years.

Hightower served one term (1953-54) in the Texas House of Representatives before he was appointed and then re-elected twice as District Attorney of the 46th Judicial District.

He was president of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and was named "Outstanding District Attorney of Texas" for 1959. Hightower was appointed by Governor Price Daniel to the Texas Law Enforcement Commission in 1957 and has served as vice president of the Texas Junior Bar Association.

He was vice chairman of the Board of Regents of Midwestern University and is currently serving as a member of the Board of Trustees of Baylor University.

A navy veteran of World War

II, Hightower earned his BA and LLB degrees from Baylor and received an honorary LLD degree from Howard Payne College.

Long active in church and fraternal and civic organizations, Hightower was a member of the board of directors of the Baptist Standard and the Human Wel-

fare Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. He served last year as Grand Master of Masons in Texas.

A native of Memphis where his mother still lives, Hightower is married to the former Colleen Ward of Tulsa. They have three daughters: Ann, Amy, and Alison.

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Two Events To Honor Sen. Jack Hightower

Two appreciation events honoring Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon are scheduled this month in Plainview and Wichita Falls.

Mayor John Stoneham of Plainview announced today that Governor Doph Briscoe will attend a steak dinner for Hightower there on Thursday, November 15.

U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Jr. will be a special guest, according to committee chairman Rhea Howard, at a reception for Hightower in Wichita Falls on Friday, November 30. (Plainview's dinner will be in the Hale County Agriculture Center, starting at 7 p.m. The Wichita Falls reception will be at Midwestern University's Clark Center from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.)

Hightower was elected President Pro Tem of the Senate in 1971 and served as Governor for a day in April that year. Farm And Ranch News By Herman Collier

Governor Doph Briscoe asked for a vast expanded rural development program and launched a campaign to make Texas No. 1 in agricultural production during the Governor's Conference on Rural Development here October 23.

More than 2,000 community and organization leaders were on hand for the conference, first of its kind in the state.

Six major speakers discussed various aspects of the conference theme, "Planning Today for Tomorrow's Balanced Growth," and community leaders reviewed the state's rural resources and outlined ways to

utilize these resources more fully for a better Texas.

"We will make every possible resource available to help people in rural areas achieve maximum support for a more abundant life," Briscoe said in his keynote address on "Planning for a Rural-Urban Balance."

Briscoe emphasized that loss of people from rural areas has created many dilemmas in the cities, and said that high priority must be given to rural development and job opportunities, orderly development of natural resources, improvement of services and facilities, better rural labor market service, more emphasis on vocational training, improved health service and adequate housing.

"Agriculture alone cannot solve the problems of rural Texas, but can be a great factor in the solution," Briscoe declared. "You have done a magnificent job in the past in making agriculture great in Texas, so let's make it even better."

Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that Texas appears to have the necessary resources to achieve the goal of becoming No. 1 in agriculture.

"Among the state's advantages are available land resources plus the technological and knowledge reserve from agricultural research for expanding production of all phases of the livestock industry; food and feed grains for domestic and export; cotton and other natural fibers; fresh and processed vegetables, fruits and nuts; soybeans and sunflowers; sugarcane; mariculture, and expanding processing industries near production areas.

"The increasing economic momentum of Texas agriculture is another favorable factor, with the percentage change for the state's agricultural income from 1968 through 1972 a whopping 48 percent, compared to an upward change for Iowa of 36 percent and for California of 28 percent during the same period.

"Based on both gross and net income projections through 1980 on trend and potential, our goal appears to be realistic. To become No. 1 will require total cooperation and mutual support of all agencies and groups and each segment of the agricultural industry," Hutchison said.

Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White said, "Texas should become No. 1 in the quality of life, agricultural opportunity and profits, as well as agricultural production." He recommended a state program similar to the Veterans Land Board to assure funds for young people getting into full-time agriculture, improved water resources, a do-it-yourself rural development program and recreation development in rural areas.

We were able to stick to our game plan, and everyone got plenty of action, both on defense and offense. Offensively, we were able to move the ball readily on both sides with Huff, Flye, Bloxham, and Hacker all carrying for over 300 yards. Huff lead with 106 yards and was followed by Hacker with 88 yards, Flye with 67 yards, and Bloxham with 66 yards. 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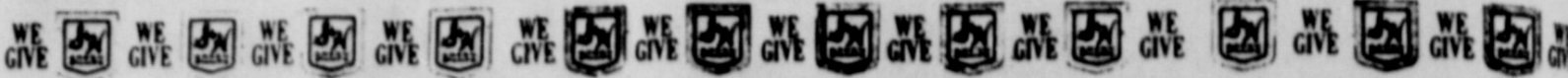

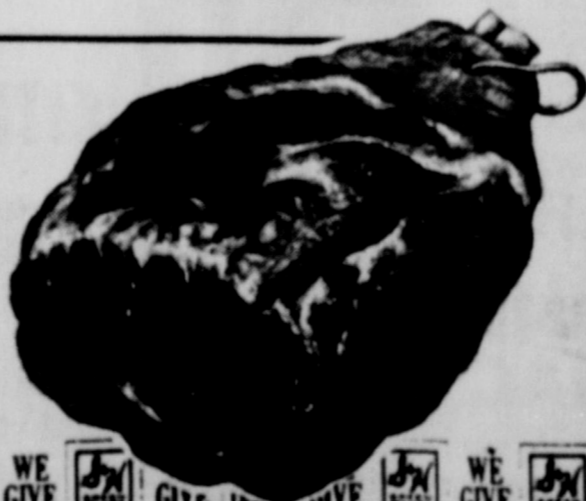
