COUNTY AGENT GIVES TIPS ON GARDENING

County Agent W. C. Pallmeyer this week offered Knox Countians the following tips on "How to Get More Food and Fun From Your Garden":

1. Plan the garden in advance.
2. Keep it small.
3. Make a succession of plantings (for top quality over a longer period of time).
4. Plant a variety of kinds of vegetables. (12 to 15 kinds as a minimum).
5. Have the right kind of tools: A spade or spading fork, hoe, rake, yardstick, ball of twine and two stakes, a dibble, a trowel, dust gun or sprayer, garden hose, and wheelhoe or garden push plow.
6. Have these materials on hand: Fertilizer, Insecticides (all-purpose garden dust or spray), Seed Treating Chemicals, Inoculation for Beans and Peas.
7. Plant adapted kinds and varieties (Contact your county Agent).
8. Use good soil management: 1. Plenty of organic matter or compost; 2. Supplemental commercial fertilizer; 3. Supplemental irrigation; 4. Mulches to reduce moisture loss, reduce soil temperature and help control weeds; 5. Rotation of kind of crops in garden.
9. Harvest at peak of maturity.

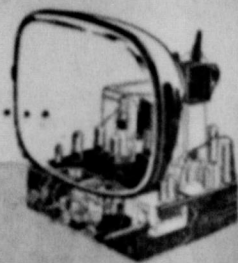

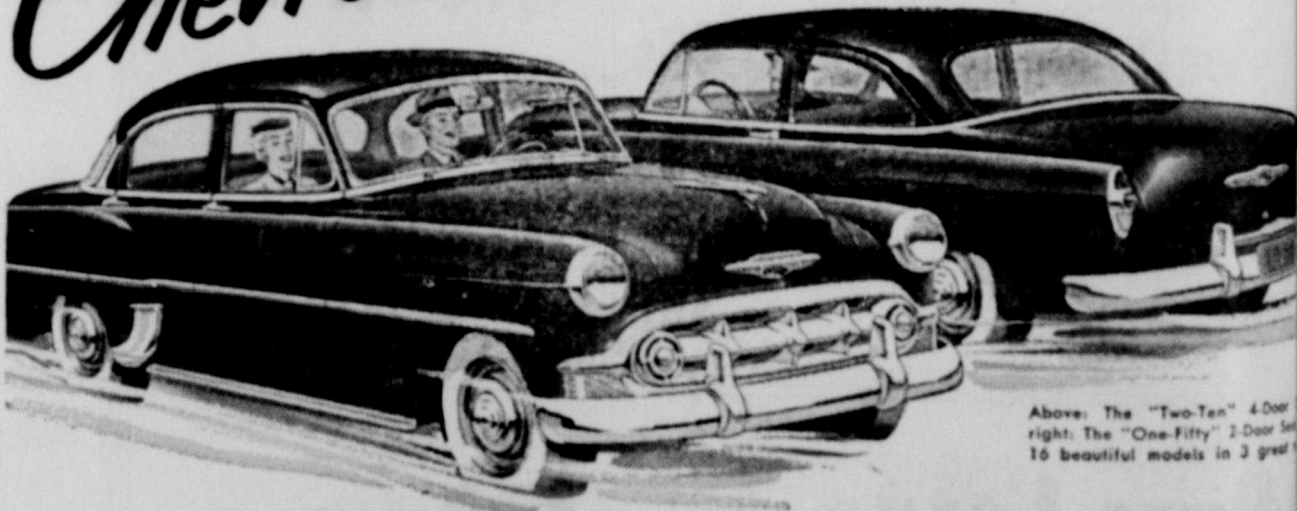
