## Tech Plans Study On Produce In Knox County

LUBBOCK — Like Jack's legendary beanstalk, the vegetable industry in Texas has been described in some circles as "an overnight success."

Whether or not the description is appropriate might be debatable. But the value of production on the High Plains alone jumped from \$15 million in 1966 to \$45 million a year later, according to officials at Texas Tech.

The industry, however, has problems in production and marketing. And Tech has undertaken a new research project to seek out some answers. Co-operating are growers and businessmen of Munday, in Knox County.

Three vegetable specialists and a marketing specialist work in the program in Tech's Department of Park Administration, Horticulture and Entomology.

Joe D. Tidwell, agronomist specializing in vegetable production is stationed in Munday to conduct field tests, make observations and consult with growers.

Wilfred Hoelscher, research assistant in agricultural economics, is collecting data and analyzing marketing problems.

Consultants Robert R. Reed, program chairman, and Dr. George Tereshkevich help direct the Munday tests, assist with evaluations and conduct

## Rochester Woman Attains High Score On Nursing Test

Results of an examination conducted recently by the State Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners indicated that Mrs. Dora Brown McWhorter of Rochester, a graduate of the Stamford Memorial Hospital School of Vocational Nursing made a standard score of 729 on the National League for Nursing State Board Test Pool Examination. A score of 815 is the highest standard score possible, the state average is 455 and the Stamford school average is 544.

Whorter for attaining the highest score on the examination is Mrs. Anna Carlisen, a graduate of Wharton County Junior College School of Vocational Nursing.

Mrs. McWhorter and her husband, Ray have lived and farmed around Rochester for the past 35 years. They are the parents of four children, two sons and two daughters, all of whom are married.

Lieb reports that Great Plains Conservation Program contracts with Lee G. Patterson, T. W. Greenwood, Mrs. Georgia Maples and James Albus were recently certified for funds. Contracts have been prepared by R. E. Massey, Mrs. Mary Homer, E. E. Cure, L. D. Welch, Collis Michels and Clelan Russell. These contracts will be certified as funds are available.

According to Lieb, cost sharing under the 1968 Agricultural Conservation Program may not be paid for a practice that is not substantially completed by Dec. 31, 1968. Producers who have begun practices, should take action to complete them by this date.

Researchers will consider varietal needs for light, water, planting dates, planting distances, seeding rates and temperatures.
