Researchers will consider varietal needs for light, water, planting dates, planting distances, seeding rates and temperatures.

FIVE CROPS INVOLVED

Initial production research involves variety testing, dates of planting and adaptability studies with Irish potatoes, onions, cabbage, cantaloupes and cucumbers.

Other aspects to be considered are harvesting and handling costs, including the training of the specialized labor necessary for vegetable production.


