A good while ago, our friend, Rufus Biggs of the Stephenville Empire-Tribune, got to thinking about "the good old days," with the following result: Cotton production in the old days was a simple matter of calculation—forty acres was good for fifty or twenty bales some times more. Taxes were low, living expenses at a minimum and a good buggy horse would sell for more than \$100. A span of mules, sixteen hands high would easily sell for four and five hundred dollars.

Everybody went to church on those days; prayer meeting was an event rather than a formality. A political rally attracted crowds from far and near while an ice cream supper was tops in attendance. School and church picnics would ordinarily bring out one hundred per cent co-operation, while a "badger" fight created a sensation. The man who worked all Spring and Summer—as they did at the turn of the century—would see a place for diversion after he laid his crop by. He would either go to see his relatives in East Texas, hunt up a camp meeting where horse feed and the ropes were supplied, or take off on a fishing trip.

If he had been provided with modern-day attractions such as movies he more than likely would have been far more contented to spend few hours listening to Clark Gable than he would have driving a spavined team back to Hunt County for a visit with his wife's kindfolks. Many other comparisons could be drawn, of course. Yet oldsters marvel at the progress that has been made and as well as they like to think of the "good old days" it would be a hard matter to get a single one of them to agree for a return of those halcyon days.

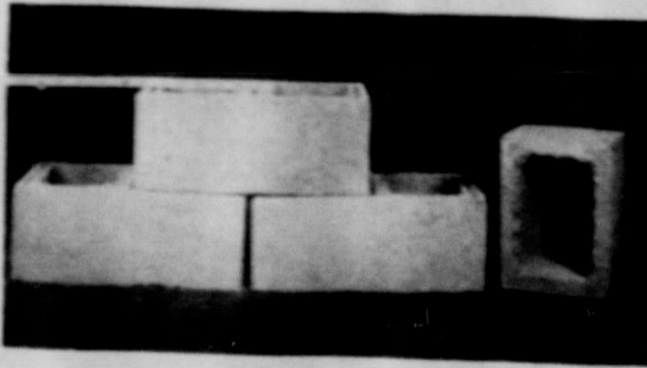

**Culling Poultry
Will Greatly Aid
Grain Shortages**

Culling of poultry flocks will do a large share of the grain conservation job, and these lazy fat hens you cull are very good for canning, says Gwendolyn Jones, food preservation specialist for the A. & M. College Extension Service.

These loafer hens have meatiness and flavor that you won't find in younger birds, Miss Jones continues. And canned chicken is good as chicken pot, chicken salad, and chicken a la king.

The following tips may prove helpful in canning the culls from your flock: Miss Jones recommends boning before the chicken is canned. She says that both glass jars and tin cans make satisfactory containers.

But when it comes to processing the chicken, the only safe method is to use the steam

pressure canner. No alternate choice is recommended.

If you've never canned chicken before—or if you'd like to have laboratory tested directions to follow—you'll find them in the Extension Service publication B-88. Copies can be obtained from your county home demonstration agent, or by writing the Extension Service, A & M College.

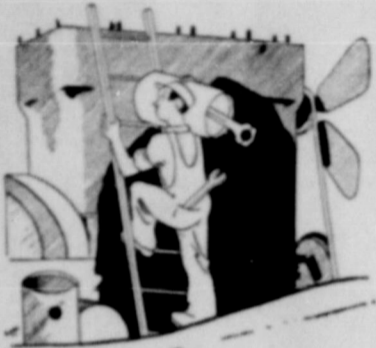

HEALTH LETTER

Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health," Dr. Cox said, "that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of especial importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor pointed out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places includes the employing of rat proof design in buildings, the use of ratproof materials in construction, employing ratproof methods of construction and installation, and providing for periodic inspection of buildings to insure permanent safety. This program will force the rat out into the open where its destruction may be accomplished.

Of equal importance as a control measure is the elimination of all food supplies. This consists of storing all foods in ratproof buildings or in ratproof containers, the proper storage and disposal of garbage, and careful feeding of stock to prevent waste feed from being picked up by the rats.
