Austin—A contract for highway construction in the Childress district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

This work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Knox County.

Ivan Dement, Inc. of Amarillo was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and two course surface treatment on 7.6 miles of State Highway 283 in Knox County. Low bid was \$923,486.57.

The project extends from 7.6 miles north of Benjamin to Benjamin, Alvin Alexander of Munday is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 200 working days.

Bulldogs Advance To State Playoff Friday

The O'Brien Bulldogs pushed into the State Championship matchup of Texas 6-man football with a 78-28 victory over the Marathon Mustangs in Lakeview Stadium in San Angelo Friday December 1.

O'Brien took first possession on the 25 yard line and drove 55 yards for a T. D. in eight plays as Louis Conn ran 6 yards. O'Brien took their next possession on an interception by Danny Del Hiero.

Four plays and 66 yards later Louis Conn hit Arly Watson for a 6 yard touchdown. Rayland Hayes converted to make it 14-0. O'Brien recovered the ensuing kickoff and two plays later Danny Del Hiero hit Arly Watson for a 52 yard touchdown.

Hayes converted to make it 22-0. Two plays later Marathon countered making it 22-6. O'Brien scored on the next possession as Louis Conn scampered 23 yards behind good blocking to up the Bulldogs lead to 34-6. Marathon scored again as the quarter ended making the first quarter score 34-6.

In the second quarter Del Hiero followed good downfield blocking for a 44 yard touchdown to make it 40-6. Marathon then bounced back to make it 40-22. Rayland Hayes scored next for the Bulldogs on a 24 yard run and Del Hiero converted to make it 48-22. Louis Conn then took a 15 yard touchdown pass from Del Hiero and Del Hiero converted to make it 56-22 as the first half ended.

Marathon scored first in the second half to make it 56-28. O'Brien began to move as Louis

Conn followed blocking for a 35 yard touchdown and Del Hiero converted to make it 64-28. Del Hiero then scored on a 4 yard run and converted to push the score to 72-28. The game came to an end as Del Hiero followed blocking for a 25 yard touchdown bringing the final score to 78-28. Leading the defensive charge
