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Knox City First Methodist Church Receives Merit Award At Fort Worth

Sixteen awards of merit in the 1966 "Texas Architecture" competition were announced in Fort Worth at a luncheon last Friday as a highlight of the 27th annual meeting of the Texas Society of Architects.

Knox City came in for a great share of that limelight in its distinction of site and location of one of the Buildings capturing one of the prized awards.

The First Methodist Church of Knox City was named among the winning projects entered in the state competition.

The church was designed by James Wiley and Enslie Oglesby of Dallas.

Mr. and Mrs. Sam E. Clonts of Knox City and the Rev. and Mrs. Jarrell H. Sharp of Big Spring were invited to Fort Worth to receive the award presented to the local church.

Mr. Clonts served as chairman of the building committee and the Rev. Mr. Sharp was pastor of the church at the time it was built.

The winners, selected by a panel of three out-of-state judges, were chosen from more than 309 entries from architectural firms from throughout the state, and will be eligible for competition sponsored by the National Association of Architects.

Photographs of winning entries were shown at the luncheon as certificates were presented to the winning architects by George S. Sowden of Fort Worth, TSA president. Albert S. Komatsu of Fort Worth was chairman of the 1966 competition.

Knox City's winning construction was the only church listed among the sixteen winners and was the only small town winning for a building serving its community.

1966 Commodity Diverted Acres May Be Grazed November 1, 1966 In County

Farmers who diverted acreage under the 1966 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs now may graze this acreage without losing program benefits, Arnold J. Navratil, Chairman Knox Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has announced.

The starting date for such grazing was Nov. 1, 1966, marking the end of the 6-month period during which the no-grazing provision was in effect under the diversion programs.

The chairman stressed, however, that this program relaxation regarding use of the acreage applies only to grazing the acres diverted from commodity production. Hay on such acres still may not be harvested.

Land diverted under the Conservation Reserve Program and Cropland Adjustment Program may not be grazed or harvested through the whole year.

Knox County farms participating in the 1966 commodity diversion programs number about 625.

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3rd Annual Thanksgiving Turkey Shoot Set By O'Brien Fire Dept.

FOR THURS NOVEMBER 19 O'Brien's Volunteer Fire Dept. will hold its Third Annual Thanksgiving Turkey Shoot on Saturday, November 19, it was announced this week by Fire Chief John Lippard.

Encouraged by the outstanding success of the first two annual shoots, which were conducted in 1964 and 1965, the O'Brien Volunteers have planned a "bigger and better" competition for 1966. Shooting will begin at 8 a. m. and continue throughout the day.

The 22 caliber rifle and pistol competition will again be conducted in the O'Brien Theater building, so weather will be no factor. The firemen were hampered by cold winds during their first year's competition, but moved indoors last year with excellent results.

The original rules for the competition will be in effect, with several innovations being added

to improve the shoot. Peep sights will again be barred from use in the regular competition, but special cards will be fired by those who desire to try their skill with peep sights or scopes.

The competition is open to everyone, according to Lippard. "A rank amateur has as much chance of winning as does a professional marksman. Several children won turkeys in previous years, some without even as much as hitting the target. On the other hand, there is a place for expert riflemen, too, because we will have special matches for those who want some stiff competition. We're hoping the professional and the amateur, men, women and children, will come out and support the Fire Department in this endeavor and that all will have a fine time," Lippard said.

Proceeds from the shoot will be used to purchase much needed fire fighting equipment. The first

Hansen, an honorable mention all-stater in 1965, is the tall linebacker who roams the field from his middle-line backer spot in the Bulldog defense. And, as you will see if you watch just him wherever the ball goes, that's where Hansen is. His 70 tackles and 51 assists in the Bulldogs' first five games seem to back this up.

Not one to shirk a challenge, Hansen seems to respond to the pressure situation also. In the two toughest ballgames the Bulldogs have played to date, the Bel Air and Artesia games, Big Stan was at his best.

Against Bel Air, Hansen made 19 tackles and was in on 12 more. For the Artesia contest, he personally accounted for 16 tackles and got a hand on 9 other ones. In fact, he was in the Artesian's hair so often, the whole team was after him before the game was over. Which is the kind of football Stan likes to play.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Jansen of Dona Ana, Stan is an ardent advocate of what Head Coach Ed Boykin call "afterburner football."

"Stan doesn't know what dummy practice is," Coach Boykin says. "He likes to go hard all the time and anything else is strange to him. And we never try to correct him about it because that attitude has been strangely coaching for the rest of the team lately."

The Bulldogs face the biggest team on their schedule in the Hobbs Eagles Friday. But Stan Hansen is one of those rare types who isn't intimidated by anything the other team has to offer.

"Shoot, if it wasn't tough, it wouldn't be any fun," he said Tuesday.

The principal speaker will be the State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon. Awards winner and special guests will be admitted free. All other interested 4-H members and adults may obtain tickets from 4-H Council members in their communities. Everyone is welcome but it is urged that tickets be purchased before the night of the program.

A new Agricultural Extension Service publication containing recommendations for chemical weed control in vegetables grown in the irrigated areas of Texas is now available to the public. Chemical Weed Control in Texas for Irrigated Vegetables—1966-67 is the new revised copy of the 1965 guide and is now available in your county agent's office. The publication, compiled by Thomas D. Longbrake, Extension vegetable specialist, Texas A&M University, deals with herbicide residues in the soil, soil preparation and cultivation, and recommended herbicide treatments. The mentioned herbicides should be used to supplement rather than replace good cultural practices including proper seedbed preparation, use of weed free vegetable seeds, and timely cultivation. Purpose of the publication is to give the producer the latest information on these herbicides to prevent the growth of weeds around irrigation canals, waste places and in the field to avoid further weed seed contamination.

Tom Brewster, son of Mr. and Mrs. K. B. Wooley, Benjamin was a member of the Oklahoma State University Meats Judging Team that placed first at the American Royal Livestock Show, Kansas City recently. Cotton Class Office Opens In Munday

The Munday Cotton Classing Office of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, opened for the season Monday, October 31, with A. D. Peebles, in charge.

Lateness of the crop delayed the opening of the office nearly a month this season compared to last season when it opened on October 4.

Beginning this week and continuing through the harvest season, the local Cotton Division office will issue weekly news releases on cotton quality and prices for the area served by the Munday Cotton Classing office.

Classing for the week ending Nov. 4, totaled 4,384 samples. Consumer and marketing service statistics for the week show about 10 percent of the cotton in the white grades, over 80 percent in the light spotted grades, and about 3 percent in the spotted grades. Leading grades were Middling light Spotted and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted with about 40 percent each.

Staple lengths for the same period showed approximately the following ranges: 29-32, 18 percent, 15-16, 56 percent, 31-32, 16 percent and 1 inch and longer 10 percent.

Micronaire readings for the week indicate about two-thirds of the domestic and foreign markets for U.S. cotton has resulted in the largest cotton carryover on record—16.5 million bales on August 1, 1966.

In order for cotton growers of this area to get information on the legislation, an educational meeting will be held on November 16, beginning at 2:00 p.m. in the Stamford High School Auditorium.

A team of specialists from the Texas Agri Extension Service will be on hand to explain details and answer questions relating to the proposed program.

The Stamford meeting is being held for the purpose of presenting information of assistance to cotton producers in making their decision on whether or not to accept the program.

Knox Lions Hear About Local Book
