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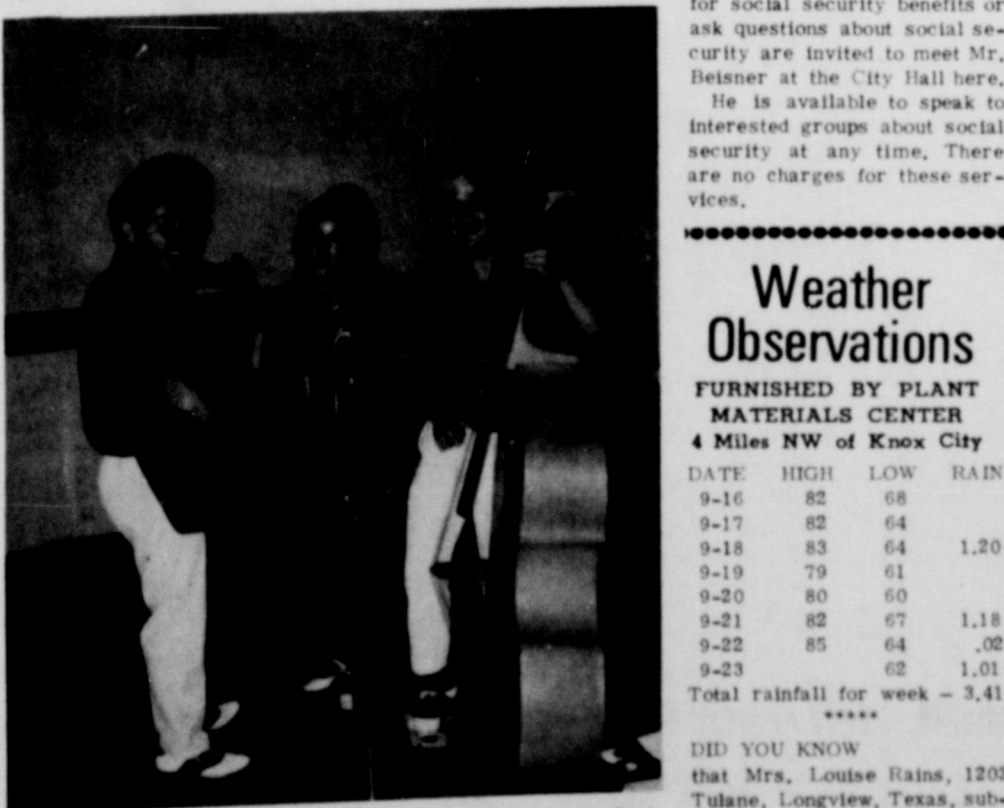

KC Hounds Lose To Bobcats 17-8

The Knox City Greyhounds were defeated by the Rule Bobcats by a score of 17-8 last Friday night at Greyhound stadium. Scoring began in the first quarter when Rule's Winston May returned a Greyhound punt for 40 yards. The extra point was kicked by fullback Jimmy Lisle making the score 7-0.

Early in the second quarter the Bobcats took the ball over on the Greyhound 35 after a punt return fumble. They were stopped short of the first down and kicked a 35-yard field goal putting the score at 10-0.

With time running out in the first half, the Greyhounds scored on a 40-yard pass from quarterback Mike Newton to end Rogers Lankford. The extra point was a two point effort with a pass from Newton to Lieb. At halftime the score stood at 10-8 in favor of the Bobcats.

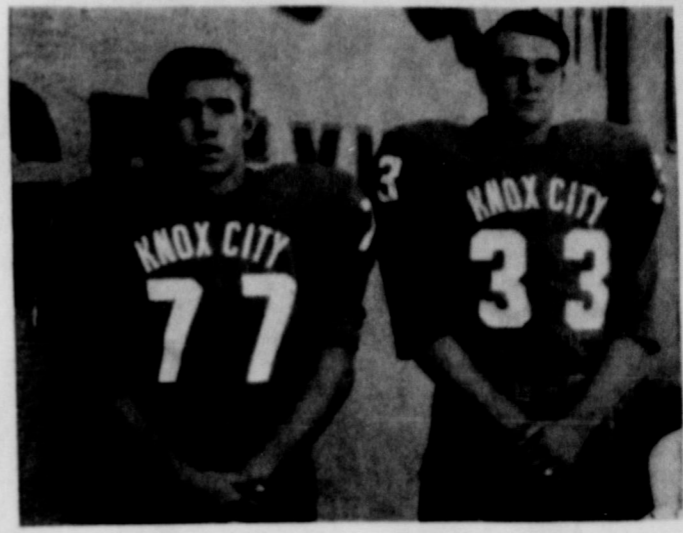
On the opening kick-off of the second half, Bobcat Jimmy Lisle returned for a 65-yard score to make it 16-8. May kicked the extra point to tally 17 points for his team.

The 'Hounds were able to move the ball in the air but seemed to bog down on the big plays. They scored twice and were called back both times for being offside. Nevertheless they drove right back down to the Bobcats' one-yard line for a second down but on the third down, Knox City fumbled and Rule took over.

Statistics for the game were as follows: First downs - Knox City 6, Rule 7; Yards rushing - Knox City 48, Rule 129; Yards passing - Knox City 240, Rule 32; Passes completed - Knox City 10-24, Rule - 5-9; Passes intercepted - Knox City 2, Rule 1; Fumbles lost - Knox City 3, Rule 1; Penalties - Knox City 27, Rule 133; Punts - Knox City 7-35.5, Rule 6-32.

Coach Hibbitts informed the Herald that the Knox City Greyhounds will again play host this Friday night at 8 o'clock when they meet the Valley View Warriors on the home field. The visiting team boasts a good offense and a solid defense with a veteran line and some fast backs.

Mr. Hutchinson died in the Knox County Hospital here Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. He had been in ill health for the past four years.

Born May 15, 1906 in Bryantsville, Kentucky, he came to Knox County in 1924. He married Opal Branton July 26, 1929 in Knox City. A retired farmer, Mr. Hutchinson owned and operated the Hospital Cafe here with his wife.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church and the Masonic Lodge. He was also a Shriner, a member of the Commandery at Haskell, and Past Worthy Patron of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Wayne of Knox City and W. Meeting Of R-PEP Is Open To Public; To Be Held In Munday

The annual meeting of the Area Committee of the Rolling Plains Economic Program (R-PEP) will be held in Munday on September 30 at 2:00 P.M. in the High School Auditorium in Munday according to Jim Humphreys, Chairman.

Although this is a committee meeting, it has been opened up

to the public because of the nature of the program, the main theme of which is "How can each farmer in the Rolling Plains increase his net income?"

With this in mind, the executive committee of R-PEP has asked ten commodity or special interest groups to make a brief report to the annual meeting on what they think their potential is in the Rolling Plains agricultural income. These reports will be very brief and to the point. The speakers will then form a panel moderated by J. L. Hill to answer questions following the reports.

There will also be several agricultural displays and exhibits which should be of interest to farmers and ranchers in the Rolling Plains.

Humphreys said, "Following this meeting very definite plans of action will be initiated to begin programs and activities to realize the income potential stressed by these reports." He further stated that "We are all interested in hearing what these speakers have to say so we can formulate programs and get to work on them. We feel that we can increase agricultural income in this area several million dollars by working together and making the best use of what we have to work with. This is the whole objective of this program. With this in mind, we hope that each farmer, rancher and agribusiness man can make the meeting on September 30."

had come to visit me after my surgery and my younger sister remained with me for a few days. When the doctor said I could ride, we drove in our car. Pat left a few days earlier and found a place for us to stay. We arrived on August 28th. My sister lives about 100 miles from here.

We find that the work is already over and Pat has had to leave, gone back to Oklahoma to work.

So here I sit in a strange town and must stay at least 6 weeks or for 30 or more cobalt treatments, as a precaution, to make sure they get all the cancer cells killed (I hope). It was what they call a very radical operation. I've gotten my strength back pretty good, but it'll take a long time to get back full use of my right arm. It's a job to just sit here and write, but I must exercise my arm to build strength in other muscles to compensate for the ones which were removed.

We are only 20 miles from Mason City where I go for my cobalt treatment and once begun, it is important to stay with the series. Right now I have no idea how many more treatments I'll have to have, as I waited too long to have the operation and the cancer had gone so deep.

I would dearly love to hear from some of my friends, as I may have to be here until the middle of October, maybe longer, but I hope not.

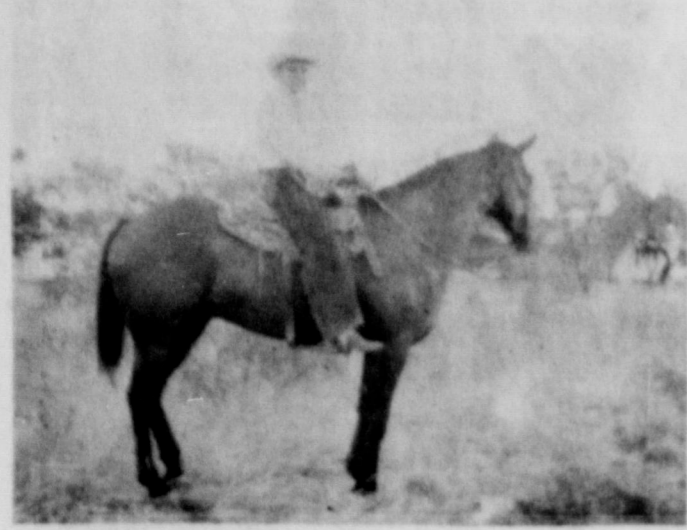

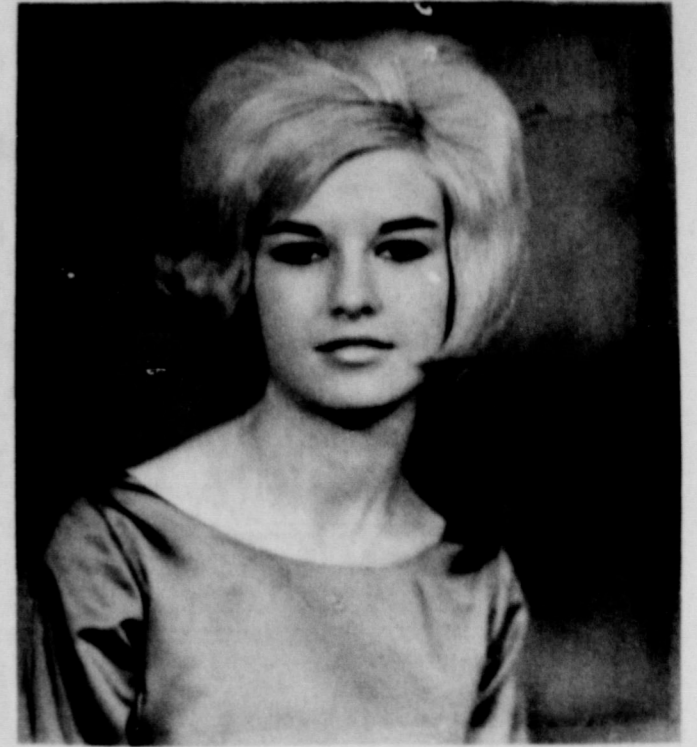
