County Grain Tour Slated July 30

The Knox County grain sorghum variety demonstration tour will be conducted Monday morning, July 30, beginning at 8:30 a.m. according to Marvin Zeissel Crops and Fertility subcommittee chairman.

Three irrigated and one dryland demonstration will be included in the tour which will start with the five variety David Albus demonstration on the A.H. Word farm four miles north and 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

The second stop will be Zeissel Brothers' nine variety dryland demonstration on their home place near Rhineland. The third stop will be Zeissel Brothers' seven irrigated demonstration. The last stop will be the Gene and Larry Thompson 14 variety demonstration just southeast of Knox Prairie Seed, Inc. at Munday.

Seeds from 14 commercial companies including 28 varieties are represented in these four demonstrations established by the producers cooperating with County Extension Herman H. Collier.

Three area Extension specialists are to be on hand for comments on varieties, grain sorghum insects and diseases. They are Dr. Robert W. Berry, plant pathologist of Lubbock, Emory P. Boring, entomologist, and Dr. Dale A. Lovelace, agronomist of Vernon.

Producers, business representatives and all interested persons are invited to attend.

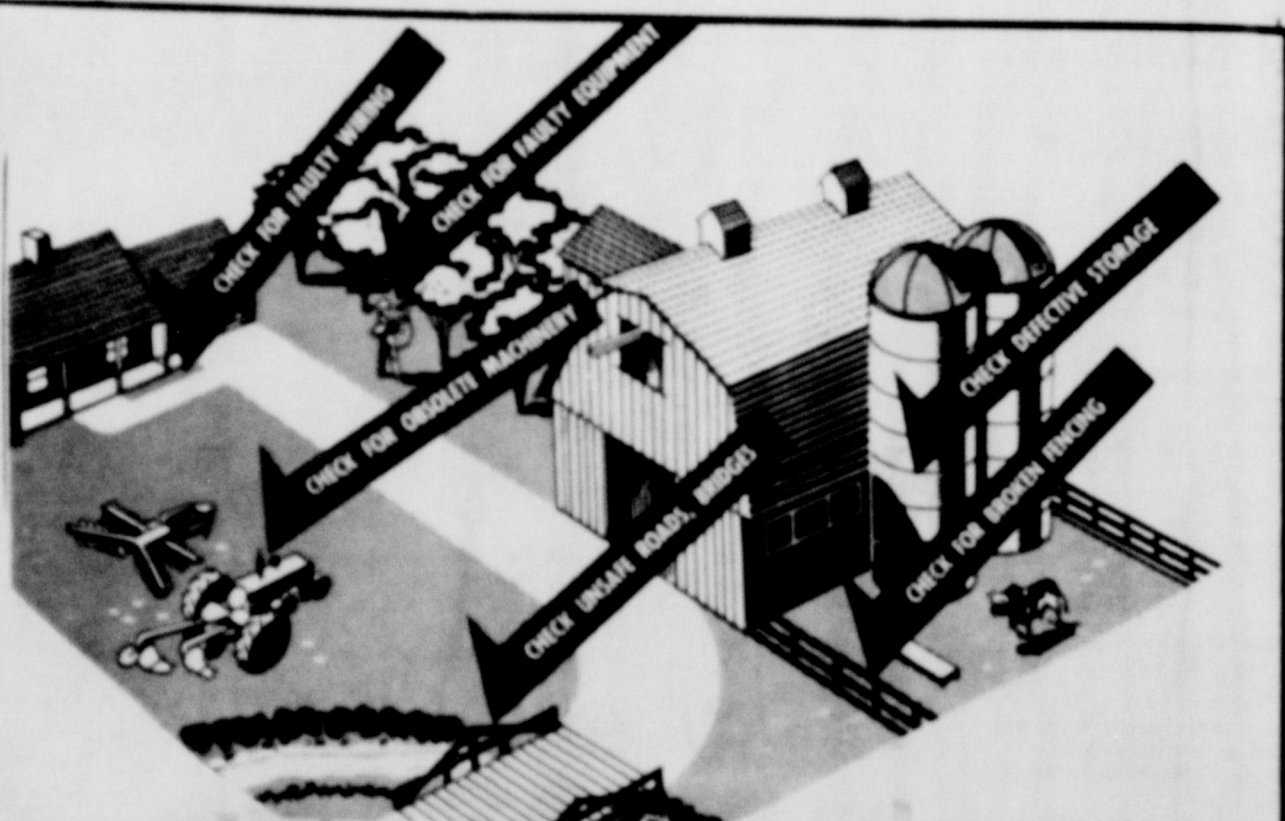

Mrs. Willie Brantley is spending a few days in Bryant and from there to Caldwell and to Dallas and on to Six Flags and then home (Oh Boy).

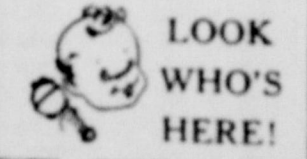
