WAS POLICE CHIEF

Alvin R. Roberts, former Knox City resident, who is the son of Mrs. Anna Belle Roberts of Knox City, died at 6 a. m. Tuesday, August 23 in the Hale Center Hospital of encephalitis. He had been ill for about one week.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Thursday, August 25, in the First Baptist Church of Tullia with the Rev. D. R. Phillee, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church officiating. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery, Tullia.

Mr. Roberts was supervisor of Parks and Recreation for the City of Tullia at the time of his death.

A graduate of Knox City High School, Mr. Roberts returned from World War II to Knox City in 1945 and was employed by a grocery store here and then was later employed for four years at West Texas Utilities Co. He also was Chief of Police of Knox City before moving to Kress in 1957. He later moved to Tullia where he joined the police official staff as a patrolman and became assistant chief and then chief of police there. He also formerly worked in law-enforcement as chief of police at Tule Lake.

He was born August 8, 1921 at Hamlin. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and of Calvary Baptist Church, Tullia.

\$242,100 Budget Adopted For Knox City Ind. School

A total operating budget of \$242,100 was adopted for the 1966-67 school year for Knox City Independent School District on Tuesday night, August 23 in a meeting held for the purpose of a budget hearing.

Instruction will account for the major expenditure of \$153,224.

The next highest expenditure is classified in the category of debt service and will total \$32,312.

The tax rate was set at \$1.90, representing an increase of .10 on a valuation of \$6,599,535. Of that, \$1.45 will be for operation and .45 will be spent on debt service.

The estimated income from local taxes amounts to \$119,123 and it is expected that another \$121,187 will come from state sources.

The budget for this year's school term is slightly less than last year's due to decrease in Title I funds and a cut in debt service. Also the maintenance estimate is not quite as high as the previous year.

Last year's budget of \$249,074 was approximately \$6,000 more than the present budget. The overall tax valuation is expected to be about \$70,000 less this year, attributed mainly to the decrease in oil.

Although the school lost one teacher this year, due to last year's decreased enrollment, it is expected that this year's enrollment will show an increase.

Farm And Ranch News ---

When cutting hay, cure and bale it as quickly as possible. By curing and baling almost immediately, you keep most of the leaves, color and nutrients — and conserve the quality.

The moisture content of hay plants when cut ranges from about 60 to 80 per cent. They must be dried to 12-18 percent for safe storage.

Curing time for large-stemmed hay plants such as alfalfa and Sudan may be reduced by one-third to one-half with a hay conditioner. Hay should be put through a conditioner no more than 15 to 20 minutes after it's cut.

Some people also use a conditioner on Bermudagrass hay because the fluffing action causes faster drying.

Hay Conditioners are two general types; one cracks the stems of plants lengthwise, while the

other type crimps the stems at close intervals. Conditioning hay permits moisture to evaporate quickly from the stems. This means less exposure of the hay to sun, wind, dew, and possible rain.

Hay quality is often lost by baling hay too wet. This results in excess heating or moulding. Hay allowed to dry too long is lower in nutrients than hay baled at the proper time.

Timing is important — don't wait too long, but don't bail too wet for highest quality hay.

LEARN TO SWIM — Join an organized swimming class. If you can already swim, learn to swim better. Here are some rules for swimming safety. Don't swim if you are chilled, overheated, over-tired, don't swim during a storm, never swim alone, choose a safe place for your swimming, never dive into strange waters, be accompanied by a boat if you are going to swing a long distance, know your ability and don't try to show off.

LEARN LIFESAVING TECHNIQUES — You can save a life even if you can't swim. Reach out from shore and pull the victim slowly to safety. If he is out of arm's reach or too far out to use a rescue pole, then use a life preserver tied to the end of a rope. Throw it beyond the victim and draw it to him so he can grasp it. If a boat is available, row to him and extend an oar. Maneuver the boat so the victim can grasp the stern, then row to safety. Learn mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. It saves lives. Many things can be used to keep a drowning person afloat — a spare tire, any piece of wood or anything else that will float. Get it to the drowning person as fast as possible.

Last Year Traffic Death Compared To This Year For Knox County

There were 4 traffic deaths in Knox County as compared to the past 3-year average of three deaths, according to Sgt. Frank Jircik of the Texas Highway Patrol for this area.

The Sgt. stated that 115 counties had more deaths in 1965 than the previous three year average. One hundred nineteen counties had less deaths in 1965 than the previous three year average. Twenty counties had the same number of deaths in 1965 as the previous 3-year average.

The largest increase in the number of deaths in 1965 over the previous 3-year average was 68 in Dallas County. The largest decrease in the number of deaths in 1965 from the previous 3-year average was 12 in McLennan County.

The 1965 death total for the

state was 3,028, an increase of 22 deaths over the 1964 all-time high of 3,006 deaths. The Sgt. added, "With this increase in traffic deaths, it is a challenge which every responsible citizen must accept to do his best to reduce the traffic deaths on our streets and highways."

No Wheat Diversion In '67 Says Char'm

Wheat farmers were reminded today that no diversion program will be in effect for the 1967 wheat crop. Wheat program participants will be able to qualify for domestic marketing certificates and price-support loans.

Arnold J. Navratil, chairman, Knox County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said that it is particularly important for farmers with small wheat allotments to remember that diversion payments are no longer available. Many of these farmers have been diverting all or a part of their wheat allotment acres for payment in recent years, however, no income can be derived from the wheat program in 1967 unless the crop is planted.

Mr. Navratil pointed out that wheat growers participating in the 1967 wheat program will again be guaranteed full parity on the part of their wheat crop which is allocated for domestic use. For each participating farm, this will be the projected production on 40 per cent of the wheat

allotment.

The domestic marketing certificates, available on this "domestic" wheat, will be valued at the difference between full parity as of July 1, 1967, and the \$1.25 loan value announced for the 1967 crop. (The certificate value for the 1966 crop is \$1.32 per bushel). The regular price-support loan will be available on all the wheat produced on a participating farm (except extra wheat produced under the "excess wheat" option).

The increased national wheat allotment acreage for the 1967 crop is expected to increase wheat-producer income by from \$75 million to \$100 million (because of increased marketings) in 1967. Complete details of the 1967 wheat program have not yet been determined or announced, but eligibility to participate in the program undoubtedly will include filing an application indicating performance intentions under the program. The sign-up for the 1966 wheat program was held in the early months of 1966.

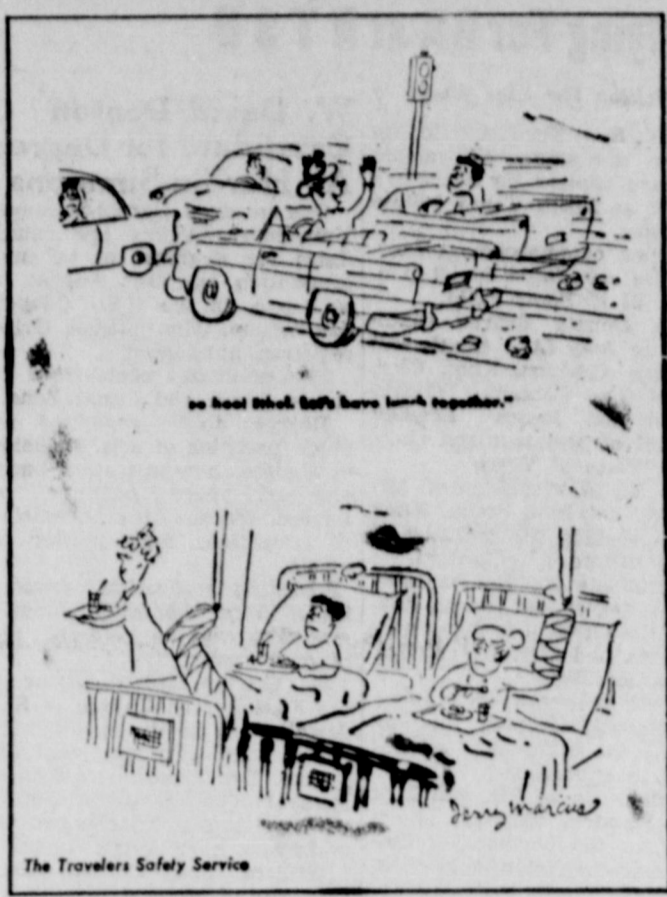

INDUSTRIAL FOUNDATIONS

... to finance industrial growth

Competition between states and cities to improve their competitive abilities to attract new payrolls has increased the forming of Industrial Foundations in Texas. Many industries want and need someone else to own the land, brick and mortar, keeping their money available for plant operations. Industrial Foundations indicate the interest and desire of a community for new industry. Local citizens who participate usually figure that they get a return on their money in a Foundation by having an additional payroll circulating in their community.

- **PURPOSE** — is to give a community a corporate entity to assist industry to create jobs within the community — can be an existing industry as well as a new one. Foundations usually assist industry that cannot or will not use normal commercial financial institutions.
- **EXTENT OF ACTIVITIES** — usually are to acquire and develop industrial property . . . construct buildings for lease . . . provide funds for training workers . . . purchase machinery and equipment . . . prepare promotional material and prospecting expenses and any other function that would give the community a **competitive advantage** for a new payroll.
- **ORGANIZATION** — is usually by a group of businessmen who are interested in the economic growth and development of their community. A local **attorney** should prepare the application for the charter and by-laws in order to conform to state laws and internal revenue service regulations. The **local bankers'** support is very helpful in forming an Industrial Foundation.
- **TYPE** — of Industrial Foundations vary — profit or non-profit — stock or contributions — the type a town needs depends upon the attitude and characteristics of the local people and its competitive position with other towns to attract new manufacturing payrolls. In most cases, Industrial Foundations are only used to assist industries where labor cost is a big factor in the operation, as the payroll provided is the important thing to the economy of the community.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements, for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting on electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law.

"The Court of Criminal Appeals and the Judges thereof shall have the power to issue the writ of habeas corpus, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, issue such writs as may be necessary to enforce its own jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have power upon affidavit or otherwise to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the exercise of its jurisdiction. The Court of Criminal Appeals

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the words printed on the ballot.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

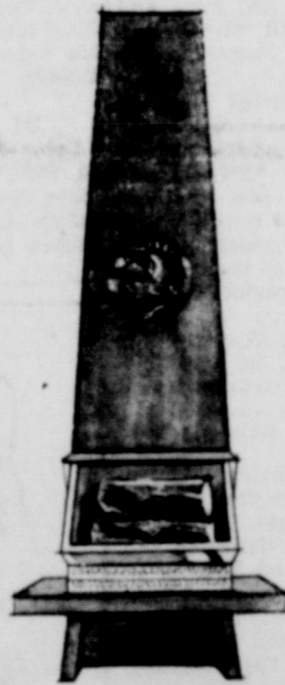

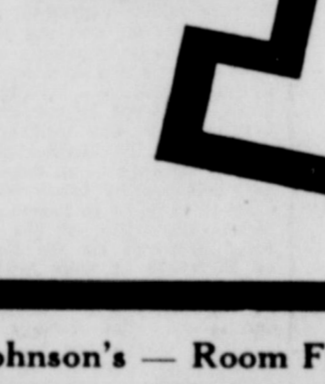

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to authorize state participation in programs financed with funds from private or federal sources and conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

authorized to render services to the handicapped from contracting with privately-owned facilities for necessary and essential services, subject to such conditions, standards, and procedures as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing assistance to the blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped, in the form of grants of public funds obtained from private or federal sources only, to local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations for establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 6. (a) No appropriation for private or individual purposes shall be made, unless authorized by this Constitution. A regular statement, under oath, and an account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published annually, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

"(b) State agencies charged with the responsibility of providing services to those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped may accept money from private or federal sources, designated by the private or federal source as money to be used in and establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, in rehabilitation, and restoring the handi-

caped, and in providing other services determined by the state agency to be essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped. Money accepted under this subsection is state money. State agencies may spend money accepted under this subsection and no other money, for specific programs and projects to be conducted by local level or other private, nonsectarian associations, groups, and nonprofit organizations, in establishing and equipping facilities for assisting those who are blind, crippled, or otherwise physically or mentally handicapped in becoming gainfully employed, for their rehabilitation or restoration, or for providing other services essential for the better care and treatment of the handicapped.

"The state agencies may deposit money accepted under this subsection either in the state treasury or in other secure depositories. The money may not be expended for any purpose other than the purpose for which it was given. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the state agencies may expend money accepted under this subsection without the necessity of an appropriation, unless the Legislature, by law, requires that the money be expended only on appropriation. The Legislature may prohibit state agencies from accepting money under this subsection or may regulate the amount of money accepted, the way the acceptance and expenditure of the money is administered, and the purposes for which the state agencies may expend the money. Money accepted under this subsection for a purpose prohibited by the Legislature shall be returned to the entity that gave the money."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority, said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, through eminent domain proceedings, existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, or either of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certificated airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body or bodies of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxing voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposed for the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxing voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority thereon, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxing voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation, if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for two or more county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority, said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value, and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or in any interest therein, to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and the cost of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or sold bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxing voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."

"FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 12, reading as follows: "Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of
