## Lions Advised to Spread Good Will

Now is the time for American business men to recognize that public good will must be cultivated for their company and their industry as well as for their products. Oral Jones, vice-president of the City National Bank of Wichita Falls, representing the Oil Industry Information Committee, told members of the Knox City Lions Club today at their regular weekly meeting.

Mr. Jones, speaking on the subject, "This Business of Making Friends", pointed out that, a generation or two ago, good will was measured mainly by the ring of the cash register, because the only public that business thought about was the one made up of its customers.

"Today," he continued, "most businesses are conscious of several publics in addition to their customers. These include employees, competitors, stockholders, suppliers, dealers, various units of government and, finally, that part of the public which may be none of these. This last group includes everyone who votes or who has an opinion about business."

To show how practically every business and business man in Knox City can better serve these various publics by keeping them informed, Mr. Jones drew upon his experience gained during his lifelong participation in the oil industry and his 45 years association with the City National Bank in Wichita Falls. Using examples familiar to his audience, such as Oil Progress Week observances and the participation of oil men in civic affairs, he showed what the oil industry has done to the past four years to conduct its business according to the Number One Public Relations principle: "Those who know you think well of you."

## Mass Blood Typing Set for Tonight

Free blood typing will be held tonight (Thursday) at the American Legion building beginning at 8:00 o'clock, it was announced Tuesday by Mrs. Ullie Lea. The blood typing is being held in cooperation with the National Defense program.

Mrs. Lea is Knox City chairman of the Red Cross first aid classes, which are also being held as a part of the National Defense Program.

Dr. D. C. Eiland and the technicians of the Knox City Clinic will do the typing. Each person typed will be mailed a card, billfold size, to be carried at all times in case of accidents. A card will also be filed in the "walking blood bank" at the clinic for reference in the event of a community disaster.

Mass blood typing was held at the courthouse in Benjamin Tuesday night, June 19. Approximately 75 persons were typed.

Dr. Eiland, County Civilian Defense chairman, urged that everyone over 14 years of age be at the Legion Hall tonight. He stressed that the blood typing will be free, painless, takes only a moment, and is beneficial to the individual as well as the community.

## Johnson's Aide to Seek Gossett's Post

Walter Jenkins this week announced he would be a candidate for Congress from the 13th District and told voters that his one—and only—promise is to be a Working Congressman.

At his home in Wichita Falls, the 33-year-old Jenkins said he had given up his position as administrative assistant to U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson to make the race for Congress from this district.

Jenkins mentioned Congressman Ed Gossett, who has resigned, as "one of the hardest-working men in Washington."

"To do the job right, you have to work hard," Jenkins said, "and that is what I intend to do. I don't promise to make a lot of speeches. I don't promise to turn Washington upside down overnight. I only promise to work hard—and to be on call 24 hours a day, to work, as best I can, for everybody in the district I have lived in all my life."

Jenkins has lived in Jolly, Decatur and Wichita Falls, where he was a reporter for the Wichita Falls Record News and an accountant for the State Highway Department. During World War II he served overseas in North Africa, Corsica and Italy for nearly two and a half years.

Jenkins announced that he would begin immediately to visit over the district on a "dawn to bedtime schedule," and that he would be ready to answer any and all questions on where he stands.

He is married and has four children, including twin sons who were born last election day, November 7.

## Mann Resigns O'Brien School Job

Milton Rowan, president of the O'Brien school board, said Wednesday that William L. Mann, principal of the O'Brien high school for the past three years, had resigned to be principal of the Crosbyton Elementary School.

Mann, who holds a Master's degree, is taking more work at Texas Tech this summer. He served as sponsor of the Junior class during the 1949-1950 term and as Senior sponsor last year. He coached his volleyball girls to the championship of District 12-B the past two years.

## Holcomb to Head Eldorado Schools

T. E. Holcomb, superintendent of the Knox City Schools for the past nine years, will assume a similar position as Eldorado, Texas, on July 1.

During Mr. Holcomb's tenure as superintendent, the Knox City school district was doubled in area, a fireproof colored school erected, a lighted football field with modern bleachers constructed, an eight-classroom elementary building, vocational agriculture department added, and eight additional credits affiliated with the State Department. The school increased from 13 teachers to 21 during Mr. Holcomb's administration.

The Eldorado school is located 45 miles south of San Angelo and is of the County Unit System (only school in county), employing 33 teachers and with an assessed valuation of near 10 million dollars. Mr. Holcomb said. The county has a new \$840,000.00 school plant and new equipment as of last year.

Mr. Holcomb has had 22 years teaching experience. He holds a Masters Degree and has done some work toward his Doctor's Degree.

Mr. Holcomb this week expressed his appreciation for the many courtesies shown him and his family by the patrons of the Knox City Schools during the past nine years.

## Roy Day Well Is Completed in Strawn Sand

The Sid Katz field, about 14 miles southwest of town, was in the limelight again last week when tests on the Skelly Oil Co. No. 1 Roy Day showed a potential that was unofficially estimated at more than 3,000 barrels a day.

The pay was found in two sections of the Strawn sand, which is developing into a major field in that area.

The discovery well in the field was drilled by Katz and Venable in December, for a potential of 700 barrels of 39-gravity oil daily. Since that time they have completed four wells east of the Brazos, near the spot where Knox, King, Haskell and Stonewall counties join. The wells are in the upper section of the Strawn.

T & P Coal and Oil Company, which owns the offset acreage to the south, found a second sand 45 feet below the first in which they have completed four wells, and in which Katz and his associates have completed two wells on acreage a mile south of the discovery.

T. D. Humphrey of Dallas drilled the No. 1 Mattie Davis, a mile and a quarter northwest of the discovery, which opened up still a third sand in the Strawn sand, 190 feet below the original sand.

Deep Rock Oil Co. has two wells completed in the top sand on acreage across the river from the Katz block and took in 27 feet of sand in their second well.

American Liberty Oil Co. is now drilling the No. 1 E. V. Hardwick in the field. Early this week they were coring at 4910 feet.

Skelly has staked location for its No. 2 Roy Day, 1,400 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of Section 3, Block 1, T&O Survey.

Katz & Venable are rigging up for their No. 1 Lewis.

Report on other wells in the Knox City area follows:

T & P Coal and Oil Co. No. 3-B McGregor, seven miles northwest of O'Brien, gauged 421 barrels of 42 gravity oil, flowing through 16-64 choke. The production is at 4879-89 feet. Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 S. D. Jones, in the North Knox City Palo Pinto Reef field, is drilling below 3900 feet.

Stanolind's location for its No. 3 Icelena Clonts, 1250 feet from the discovery well, is ready for rig.

Stanolind No. 1 Howell was gauged at 102 barrels of oil and 24 barrels of water in 24 hours, on pump.

Skelly Oil Co. No. 2 Howell, 10 miles west of Knox City, dry and abandoned below 6,000 feet. On a drillstem test at 5755-5806, with tool open 3 hours, recovery was 900 feet of oil cut mud, 4732 feet of salt water.

Oil Associates, Inc., failed in their attempts to complete their No. 1 Myrtle White, one mile northwest of town, for shallow production at 2360 feet. The hole was abandoned and there is no activity in that area at present.

Hewitt & Daugherty spudded in their No. 1 Davis on June 23, and set 10 inch casing at 693 feet. Drilling ahead.

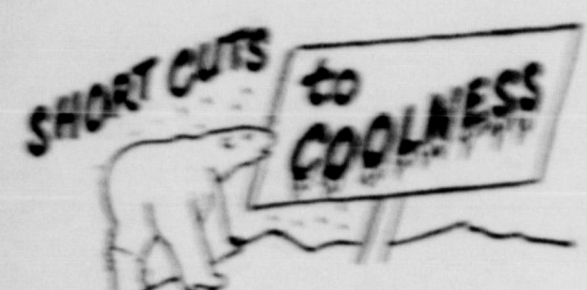

Below is a list of questions which have been asked most often, governing this election:

- Q. Will my present taxes be increased?
- A. NO. The tax will be paid to Knox County instead of the State of Texas.
- Q. Will my homestead be exempt?
- A. YES, up to a value of \$2,000.
- Q. What amount is exempt for homesteads now?
- A. The State at present allows \$2,000 homestead exemption.
- Q. What will the money be used for?
- A. To construct and maintain lateral farm roads.
- Q. Will the value of my property be raised?
- A. NO. This election will not change the values.
- Q. Who can vote in this election?
- A. Any qualified voter who owns property (real or personal) in Knox County.
- Q. What is a qualified voter?
- A. A person who paid his or her poll tax in January, 1951, or is entitled to a voting exemption. The person must also have resided either personal or real property in Knox County for valuation in 1950.

**WATERWAYS NEED CARE**  
 Where no provision is made to take care of the excess water, the terraces may increase the erosion hazard since it tends to concentrate the run-off to limited channels.  
 But if the excess water can be emptied from terraces to a heavily sodded waterway that continues to retard the flow, there is little danger of erosion. He said that generally such waterways are constructed so

that the grade and width assure protection when well sodded. Sometimes, checks have to be established in waterways to control the speed and volume of accumulated water.  
 McGee urges farmers of Knox County who need to establish sod waterways to check with PMA committeemen and Soil Conservation Service technicians on plans for their construction. The Agricultural Conservation Program provides assistance to farmers to aid in the establishing of effective sod waterways.
