Funeral Held Monday for W. R. Jones, 83

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church Monday afternoon for W. R. Jones, Knox City pioneer, who died Saturday, March 1.

Rev. E. V. Becker, pastor of the church, conducted the services, assisted by Stanley Shipp, minister of the Church of Christ. Burial was in Knox City Cemetery under direction of Warren Funeral Home.

Born Jan. 6, 1869, in Hopkins County, Mr. Jones came to Knox City in 1901, and for many years was in the meat market business here. He later farmed west of town, retiring several years ago.

Survivors include four sons, Fred, S. D. and Robert of Knox City, and Clay of Tyler; three daughters, Mrs. W. D. Loper of Rochester, Mrs. W. P. Hood of Tulsa, Okla.; and three stepchildren, Carl Chafin, Knox City, Floyd Chafin and Mrs. Bill Lewis, both of Amherst.

Red Cross Drive In County Underway

The Knox County chapter of the American Red Cross began its annual drive for funds on March 3 and will continue the drive through March 31.

Karel Desgrange, Knox county chairman for the 1952 fund campaign, has announced the community chairmen who will assist in the drive. In Munday Robert Green will be in charge, and will solicit helpers from various clubs.

J. H. McGee has been named chairman in the Knox City and Brock communities.

In Goree Rev. Smith, pastor of the Methodist Church, will be chairman. He will also be in charge of the drive in the Hefner community, and will select his co-workers from different clubs and other organizations.

The drive in Rhineland will be under the direction of Henry Claus.

Mrs. J. D. Redwine, Benjamin chairman, will solicit her help from different clubs, homes and the school.

In Truscott, Mrs. Jack Hickman will be the chairman, Gilliland will be under the direction of Mrs. Arthur Horn, and Mrs. J. J. Collier will supervise the drive in Vera.

Mr. Desgrange, in making his appeal, said, "We all know the work of the Red Cross from past experiences in our community and surrounding communities; so let's give all we can so that we will meet our quota as we always have in past years."

SUPERINTENDENT ATTENDS MEETING IN ST. LOUIS

Supt. Harold Barnett returned Friday from St. Louis, Mo., where he attended a school administrators meeting Feb. 23 to Feb. 27. More than 5,000 superintendents attended, with over 10 per cent of them from Texas.

Throughout the meeting, the speakers stressed the teaching of citizenship with the emphasis placed on moral and spiritual values. Howard A. Dawson of Washington, D. C., representing the National Education Association, said there are 13 million children in the United States who have never been to Sunday school.

"The teaching profession is no place for clock-watches, squawkers, divided loyalties, social indifference or fault-finding," Dawson said. "Teaching is a public service dealing with the very best that America has—children and youth."

Mr. Barnett was to give a report of the meeting before the Knox City Lions Club today.

Tom Bullington Is Candidate for County Attorney

Tom Bullington, well known Knox County attorney, has authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for the office of County Attorney of Knox County, subject to the action of the Democratic Primaries.

Mr. Bullington has been a resident of Munday since the summer of 1950, coming here soon after his graduation from the Baylor University Law School. Since January 1, 1951, he has been a member of the law firm of Billingsley and Bullington.

The 27-year-old attorney was reared in El Paso, where he graduated from high school. He did his pre-law work at the Texas College of Mines, then entered Baylor University to complete his law degree. While in the University, he was a member of Phi Delta Phi, international legal fraternity. He is also a member of the American Bar Association and Texas Bar Association.

In making his announcement, Mr. Bullington stated that he is seeking the office solely upon his merits and his ability as an attorney. "My purpose shall be to serve the people of Knox County honestly, efficiently and impartially," he said. "I solicit the vote and influence of all the people in this campaign, and I assure you this vote will be greatly appreciated."

Junior Reeves Seeks O'Brien Weigher Job

S. J. (Junior) Reeves of O'Brien this week authorized the Herald to announce his candidacy for the office of Public Weigher in Precinct No. 7, Haskell county.

Mr. Reeves believes his experience will enable him to render efficient, dependable service as public weigher. He was employed at the O'Brien cotton yards before entering the armed forces during World War II, and for several seasons since he was discharged.

The Cisco Junior College A Capella choir will be presented in a program at the Knox City school auditorium Friday night, March 14, it was announced this week.

Combining the appeal of folk music with the artistic perfection of the traditional music of the church, the choir has in its 1952 repertoire selections of wide interest. Organized in 1949, it has grown in size and musical achievement, gaining prestige for the college with every performance.

Included in the choir's repertoire are sacred selections by Bach, Purcell, Ingegneri, Kopolyoff, Brahms and Christiansen. Also of great appeal are such folk songs as "Skip to My Lou," "Cindy," "Lane County Bachelor," and the spirituals, "Rock Ma Soul" and "Sit Down Servant."

Included in the program will be selections by the Madrigal Singers and the Beauty Shop Quartet.

County 4-H Boys Bring Home \$1,588 From Fat Steer Show

Three Knox County 4-H boys were well pleased with the results of the Wichita Falls Fat Steer Show, which brought a total of \$1,588.50 for sale of their calves, in addition to \$175 in prize money.

Sifting of the calves was carried out in the morning of Feb. 27, and the Hereford calves exhibited by Gary Cure, Gilliland 4-H club, Bobby Miller, Gilliland 4-H club, and Donnie Ryder, Benjamin 4-H club, were all passed by the committee and allowed to remain in the show.

A Junior Steer Judging contest was held on the afternoon of the 27th, under the direction of J. A. Schofield, district agent, and assisted by Frank Martin and Bill Pallmeyer, Haskell and Knox county agents.

Thirty-four 4-H and FFA teams from Texas and Oklahoma took part in the contest, and winner of the contest was the Frederick, Okla., FFA team. Knox County 4-H members who were exhibiting steers formed the Knox 4-H team, and made a fine showing. Team score was 530 points with Miller high with 188 points, Ryder second with 172 and Cure third with 170. None of the boys are regular members of the Knox County Beef Cattle Judging team, and all the instruction they had received was a few minutes briefing before the contest. Their fine work indicated three more good members for the 4-H judging team in future contests.

All steers were judged on the 28th, and the 1,035 pound Hereford steer exhibited by Bobby Miller, and bred by the League Ranch of Benjamin, was graded prime by Judge John Burns of Ft. Worth. Prize money was \$79.00, and Lamar Fain of Wichita Falls purchased the calf for 70 cents per pound for a total of \$724.50.

The 880 pound Hereford exhibited by Gary Cure, and bred by the John Jones Ranch of Dayton, was graded choice. Prize money was \$37.00, and George Cooper of Wichita Falls purchased the calf for 55 cents for a total of \$448.00.

The Hereford calf exhibited by Donnie Ryder, and bred by the Beavers Ranch of Benjamin, was graded good. Prize money was \$39.00, and George Cooper and Everett McCullough of Wichita Falls purchased the calf for 50 cents per pound, a total of \$380.00.

SCHOOL BOARD RE-ELECTS PRINCIPALS, COACH

The Knox City School Board, at a regular meeting Tuesday night, extended for two years each the contracts of Perry K. Jones, high school principal, Mrs. E. F. Branton, elementary principal, and David Slaughter, coach, it was announced today. Superintendent Harold Barnett's contract was extended for two years at a previous meeting of the board.

The remainder of the teachers will be considered following the trustee election, which is scheduled for April 5.

Trustee Election Called for April 5

The election has been called for Saturday, April 5, and deadline for filing of candidates is March 27.

Lincoln Bolin Announces for Public Weigher

Lincoln Bolin announced this week that he will be a candidate for public weigher in this precinct of the

Knox City Field Gets 28th and 29th Wells

Producers No. 28 and 29 in the North Knox City Field are being completed by operators this week.

The Palo Pinto reef was topped at 4,137 feet—highest in the field so far—in the Skelly Oil Co. No. 3 Geo. Stubbs. Operators cut 78 feet of pay, and a test at that depth had gas to the surface in 6 minutes and oil in 35 minutes. Tool was open two hours, and the well flowed into tanks at the rate of 52 barrels per hour. Operators then drilled ahead, to a total depth of 4,290 feet, and are setting casing today for completion.

The reef was topped at 4,241 in the Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 J. J. Denton, a unit well. The well was then drilled to 4,365 ft. total depth, and a drill-stem test recovered 3,700 ft. of pipeline oil and 600 ft. of salt water. Casing has been set and operators are waiting on cement to harden.

Location is being prepared for Stanolind's No. 2 Florence Bowden, and the Lewis Drilling Co. rig will move from the Denton well to this site.

Location has been staked for the Fred Wimberly Drilling Co. No. 1 T. C. Carter, a half mile north of town, and operators are ready to move in as soon as permit is granted by the Railroad Commission. This wildcat will be on the Carter Estate's 1.3 acre tract just west of the Santa Fe right of way.

TWO IN RACE FOR CITY COMMISSION SEAT

Two candidates filed for the city commission seat that will be vacated by Allen Lowrey when his present term expires, according to Mayor Guy Glenn. Last to file was John Hansen, native of Brooklyn, N. Y., who now farms near Benjamin. Hansen has lived here since the end of World War II.

Filing previously was Jess Hitchecock, long-time resident of Knox City, now associated with Northern Star Seed Farms of O'Brien.

The city election will be held Tuesday, April 1.


