Four local women have recently been awarded the distinction of having been named for inclusion in the annual biographical compilation of Outstanding Young Women of America, a publication of which Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson serves as Honorary Chairman of the board of advisory editors.

The four Knox City women are Mrs. Martha Sue Clayton, Mrs. Julie Bellinghausen, Mrs. Sue Odon and Mrs. Dottie June Lowrey. KC SMAR'S HONORS TOO.

By this same token of distinction, Knox City has also been similarly distinguished by the achievement and recognition of these young women. It is a unique honor for a city to have four of its citizens named as Outstanding Young Women and is especially rare for a town the size of Knox City.

Women's clubs and organizations throughout the country submit nominations for the book each year. The publication lists women between the ages of 21 and 35 who have attained eminence in civic and professional activities.

Some are named because of their ability to combine career, homemaking and outside civic work or some because they have responded with courage during a personal crisis. Others have given generously of their time, energy, money and talents to civic and church work.

IN LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

The four local women have received certificates stating their inclusion in the Outstanding Young Women of America publication. The 1967 book is scheduled for release in March and will be placed in the permanent files in the Library of Congress and also in various colleges and universities and public libraries across the nation.

All four of the local women are active in civic affairs and contribute to the betterment of their community and the honor of selection in this national publication marks their keen perception of judgment.

MRS. PAUL CLAYTON

Mrs. Sue Clayton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Hob Smith, was born February 1, 1938 in Knox City. She was reared in Rochester and is a graduate of Rochester High School. She attended Baylor University in Waco.

Mrs. Clayton is past 2nd vice-president of the 1946 Study Club and currently serves as her study club's president.

In other activities, Mrs. Clayton is a member of the Knox County Cancer Unit Board and previously served this unit as county chairman.

She is a member of the First Baptist Church where she teaches a Sunday School class of 9 and 10 year old girls and is sponsor of high school girls' missionary organization.

Six Knox City residents were involved in a two-car collision in Stamford last Friday afternoon about 4:30 p. m.

Lois Quintana Palacio was the driver of the car from Knox City, and suffered a laceration on the left leg. Marvin Teeter, 70, of Stamford was driver of the other car. His wife, Mrs. Marvin Teeter, was dead on arrival at the Stamford Memorial Hospital following the accident. Extent of Mr. Teeter's injuries was unknown.

Others from Knox City injured in the wreck were Mrs. Nefro Gonzales, who underwent surgery and was still in serious condition Tuesday afternoon, according to members of the family; Mrs. Jessie (Tony Gonzales) Saucedo was reported improved; her son and daughter, Jessie Jr., 5, and Fay, 3, were not seriously injured, but her 6-year old daughter, Rosemary, died of her injuries Sunday night.

Cotton Program Signup 4 Weeks

Cotton farmers were reminded today that the signup for the 1967 upland cotton program will extend over the 4-week period for the February 6 through March 3. Signups will be held during the same period for the 1967 wheat and feed grain programs.

A. J. Navratil, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Knox County, Committee pointed out that the signup period for upland cotton farms represents a change from an announcement last November, which called for a somewhat longer signup period. Since filing an application to take part in the program

is the first step in qualifying for any cotton-program payments, it is important that farm operators keep the signup period in mind.

The 1967 upland cotton program offers participating growers price support payments, acreage diversion payments, and price-support loans on their crop. On all but small farms, a grower will take part in the program by reducing his cotton acreage by any amount between 12.5 and 35 percent of the farm's effective farm allotment. No acreage reduction is required on small farms to qualify for program payments. (Small farms are those with an allotment of not more than 10 acres or on which the projected production of the farm allotment is not more than 3900 pounds, and from which no acreage is released for re-portionment.)

The price support payment will be 11.53 cents per pound times the farm projected yield times the farm domestic allotment (or the acreage planted if that is less than 90 percent of the domestic allotment.) The diversion payment rate is 10.78 cents per pound times the farm projected yield times the acreage diverted from production into an approved conserving use. The price-support loan to growers participating in the program will be based on a national average loan rate of 20.25 cents per pound for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location.

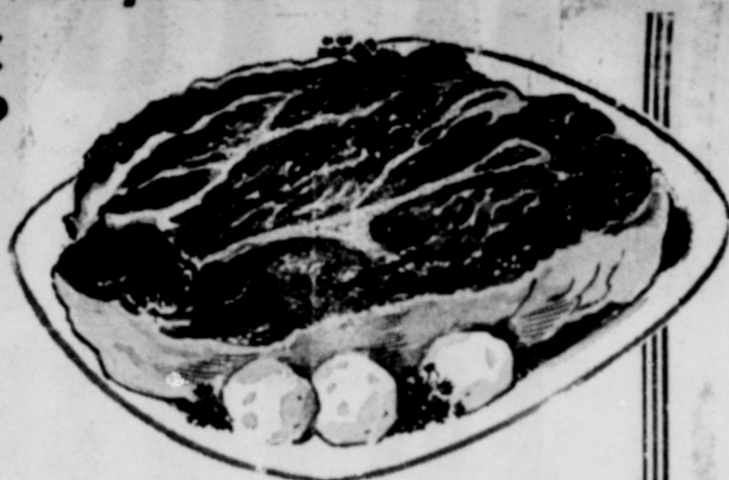

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Cotton Growers Make Progress

A smaler cotton supply and stronger export and domestic markets are putting cotton in "the best economic position it has enjoyed in years," says Knox Co. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Chairman A. J. Navratil.

Reviewing data on the crop now being marketed, and looking ahead to 1967, the chairman commented that exports are projected at some five million bales in 1966-67, an increase of more than 70 per cent over the 2.9 million in 1965-66.

Coupled with this, he added, is an expected U. S. mill usage of perhaps more than 9.5 million bales, for total consumption of at least 14.5 million. Since total upland cotton production in 1966 is estimated (Dec. Crop Report) at 9.6 million bales, large stocks now in storage should be reduced about 5.0 million bales, according to Chairman Navratil.

"This will strengthen the position of every cotton grower in the country," the chairman said. "Any farmer knows that when you have more of any commodity than the market will consume, you are in a position of weakness and this is where we have been too long in the case of cotton."

Success of the 1966 cotton program, with diversion from 12 to 35 percent on individual farms is credited in large measure with the trend. The Chair-

man added that, "The farmers themselves recently recognized this when, in the upland cotton referendum, they endorsed continuance of a similar program for 1967, with voters in every state approving the program by an average percentage of more than 91 percent."

Actually, more progress is being made this crop year in reducing surplus stocks than was expected. In addition to voluntary diversion by producers, extreme weather conditions and insect infestation in many areas of the cotton belt sharply reduced yields per acre. Fortunately for producers with reduced production or no production, the 1966 program provided payments which for thousands of farmers have averted financial disaster. Complaints have been mainly from persons in allied activities, not from cotton producers. For the most part the complaints about the program arise from its very success.

Market prices for the 1966 crop have been good, especially for cotton stapling 1-1-16-inch and longer. CCC sales have been heavy but the sales price has been at least one cent per pound above the loan rate and, therefore, such sales have served to make adequate supplies available at competition prices without impeding movement of the 1966 crop to market.

Another measure of the success of the cotton program is indicated by the fact that at the end of December, 1965, about 25 percent of the 1965 crop was

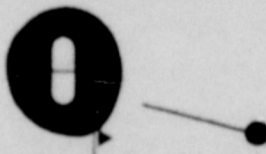

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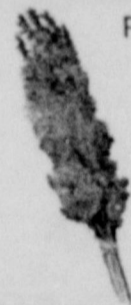


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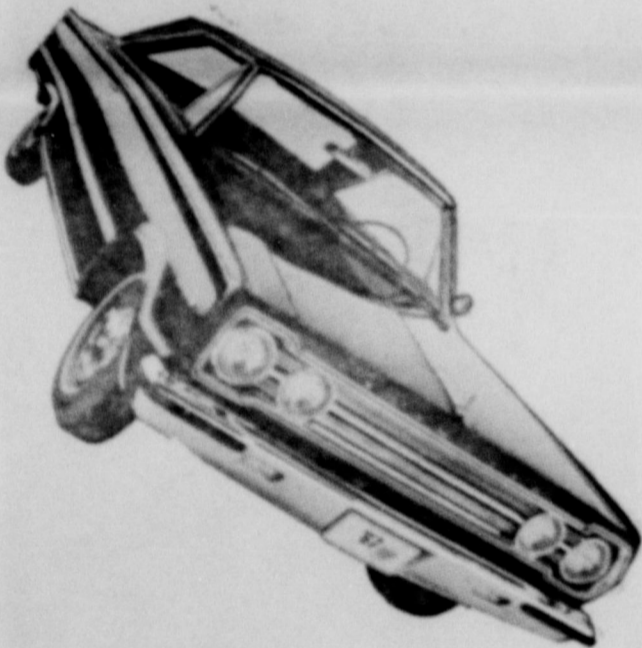
