Baker Opposes Change In Determining Tax

Superintendent of Schools W. R. Baker, a member of the "Committee of 18", a special interim Legislative group, was in Austin December 7 to convene with the committee which met to take a look at a statewide method for determining fair market value of property for school tax purposes. Mr. Baker and two West Texas law-

makers, Sen. W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland and Rep. Renal B. Rosson of Snyder, were in the minority which voted against using true market values instead of county evaluations in distributing local school district fund assignments for public school support.

Those who voted in the minority had expressed concern that the changes would put a heavier tax burden on rural districts.

The committee was authorized by the 61st Legislature. It was directed to prepare a specific formula or alternative methods for dividing financial responsibility between state and local school districts of Texas on "a fair and equitable basis".

Clonts To Attend 2-Day Workshop

County Judge Sam Clonts is one of 60 Texas County Judges invited to participate in a Regional, State and Federal government Institute on the Role and Responsibility of the County Judge in Promoting and Supporting Local Programs for the Mentally Retarded. He will attend a two-day workshop to be held in Wichita Falls December 10-11.

Mental retardation is a significant problem since it affects 350,000 Texans. Unless the mentally retarded person can be taught to be self-supporting, the cost to the community can be very great. Texas has, over the years, led the nation in programs aimed at the rehabilitation of the retarded.

Judge Clonts will join with 59 other County Judges and a group of key state and national authorities in this field. Also attending will be Dr. David Wade, Texas Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation; Dr. Phil Roos, Executive Director, National Association for Retarded Children; and Honorable Vernon McGee, from the Governor's staff.

Mr. and Mrs. Ulric Lea have made and contributed beautiful hand-made decorations for each room.

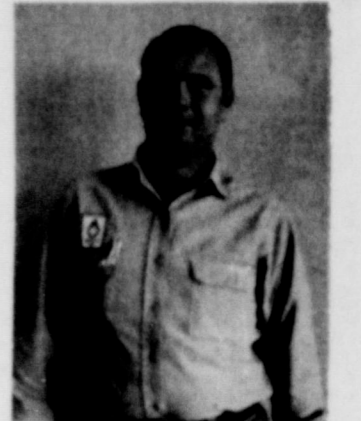
"Several churches and other groups have asked to participate in doing things for the residents for which we are all very grateful," Doyle Graham, administrator, said.

Committee To Aid Tech Scientists

Munday Man Named V-P Of Vegetable Research Committee

Lubbock - Texas Tech University agricultural scientists this week announced the organization of the West Texas Vegetable Research Advisory Committee to aid them in working toward solutions of problems facing that segment of agriculture.

Nineteen persons representing vegetable growers, packers, shippers, canners and other processors, suppliers and agri-businesses and services attended an organizational meeting.

The advisory committee will aid Tech agricultural scientists in "identifying, defining, evaluating and assigning priority to the many problems facing the vegetable industry" in the West Texas producing region.

Tech Vice President for Research Orlo E. Childs expressed appreciation for the aid such groups render in designing and evaluating the institution's research programs which he emphasized are "problem oriented."

Dr. William F. Bennett, interim assistant dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences, presided over the organizational meeting.

Charles Schlahe of route 2, Hereford, was named president of the committee. James Smith of route 2, Munday, vice president; Dr. John D. Downes of Tech's College of Agricultural Sciences, secretary, and Charles Flynn of Gateway Produce Company, Bovina, treasurer.

In reporting on the scope of vegetable research, Dr. Downes told the 13 projects devoted specifically to vegetable crops involving 15 staff members and 10 graduate students and technicians in five of the eight departments in the College of Agricultural Sciences.

Among those attending the organizational meeting were Boyd Meers of Goree; Lonnie Offutt, Clifton Patterson, James Smith, Garon B. Tidwell and Hugh Beatty of the Munday area; Donald W. Coaches' Comments

The Greyhounds with their two wins in the Munday tourney extended their record to 2 wins and 3 losses (two losses were by forfeit) so our record could easily be 4-1. Our first loss was to Crowell in our season opener. Since that time our boys have progressed a great deal and potentially are a strong district contender. Our squad is sprinkled quite liberally with youth this year with only two seniors on the squad. However our younger players have a lot of ability and we feel that every game we have played has shown a great deal of improvement on their part. Our two seniors this year are Rogers Lankford and Mike Newton, both starters for the Greyhounds. Lankford is 5'9", plays one of our wing positions, and is a good shooter and ball handler. Mike Newton is 6'2" and plays a post position. He jumps well, has good moves inside, and has lots of basketball knowledge along with Rogers. Greg Clonts, a soph. at 6' plays our other post position. Greg is a good jumper, goes to the bucket real well, and is improving everyday. Roland Marlon, another soph. plays our other wingman at 5'11". Roland possesses probably the best touch of anyone on the team with his soft left handed jumpshot. The remainder of the squad consists of Brent Rallsback, a junior pointman who is our 6th man; Victor Gonzales, who can play either the point or wing, is a junior; Alan Orr, another junior postman; Kenny Woodall, a junior postman; and Bobby Reeves, another promising soph. rounds out our varsity. Right now the thing we

are most concerned with is consistency. We feel when we can reduce our mistakes and turnovers and begin to play four tough quarters we can begin to compete.

This week we are entered in the Rule Tourney (originally the Haskell tourney) with both boys and girls' teams playing Weibert. The girls play Thursday at 1:00 and the boys follow at 2:30.

A promising young freshman player who was starting for us will be lost for the season because of eligibility. He is Stanley Newton at 5'11" and 185 pounds. He will be playing on our Junior Varsity team the remainder of the year.

I'd like to finish with a compliment to our student body and also our fans in general on the way they conduct themselves at the ball games. Such things as chanting and clapping during free throws and throwing paper on the playing floor along with excessive abuse of the game officials can be considered to be only - POOR SPORTSMANSHIP! Much improvement can be seen in our girls' team, compared to last year and with each game that we have played this season. We will enter our Tuesday game with Haskell, supporting a 6-0 record.

I think the most important improvement is the fact that we have beaten a strong Munday ball team three times with a total of twelve points. Second, I tell the girls to remember, "if you can smile, you can win."

ert H. Haas of the A&M Range Science Department estimates that 200 farmers, ranchers, researchers, aerial applicators and pesticide industry representatives will attend the discussions.

He said the conference will have two general sessions. The first deals with pesticides and the environment, and starts at 10 a.m. Tuesday with an address of welcome by Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of the A&M College of Agriculture.

Keynote speaker is Dr. Emil M. Mrak, Chancellor Emeritus of the University of California at Davis. His talk is titled "Pesticides - Agricultural Production and Environmental Quality."

Mrak also is chairman of the Commission on Pesticides and Their Relationship to Environmental Health for the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The second general session begins at 8:40 a.m. Wednesday and will cover chemical application techniques and implications. Specific topics include aerial application, slow evaporation herbicide carriers, uniform spray droplets, ground spraying equipment, and bird problems and human values.

In between and after the general sessions will be concurrent meetings to discuss agronomic weed control, cotton insect control, brush control, plant diseases, and data on the latest insect research.

The overall conference will be in the Memorial Student Center Ballroom.

Haas said special pre-conference activities are planned on Monday. One is a lecture, "Pesticides In The Modern World," by Mrak at 7:30 p.m. in the MSC Ballroom. The other is a golf tournament at 1 p.m. for conference participants.

In addition to A&M University, conference sponsors are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Science Dept. News

The students of Advanced Biology had a lab this Tuesday. The lab involved enzyme action and the factors that influence them.

The enzymes were tested in several different ways.

The first one was to test the salivary enzymes at various temperatures. A piece of cracker was crushed into small fragments and mixed with water. Then a drop of iodine was added. The result was a positive test for starch.

The experiment was repeated, only this time the solution was added. The result was a negative test for glucose.

Another one of the experiments was the chewing of bits of cracker for three minutes. The material was then deposited into a folded filter paper. Water was added. The result was the conversion of the amalyse to glucose.

Much saliva was necessary for the various tests. The solution for this was paraffin wax. The students chewed this material in order to speed up the production of saliva.

Other experiments the students performed were: (1) The speeding up of salivary enzyme action, (2) The effect of dilution on enzyme activity and, (3) The effects of an acid and a base on enzyme activity.

The significance of the lab was to see just one of the major chemical processes that occurs when food it taken into the mouth.

The conversion of solid ma-

terial into glucose takes anywhere between 20 to 30 minutes.

When we arrived, Mr. Harrison gave some of the machines background and got us acquainted with the purpose and parts of the device. He then showed us some of the many things that he has made with the machine and showed how to use several different colors of ink on the same item. Last of all he demonstrated the stencil machine by making each of us several copies of a Christmas greeting to hand out to friends and relatives.
