Area Citizens Hear Culberson Speak At Bateman Ranch

Olin Culberson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission, brought his candidacy for re-election to North Central Texas at a barbecue dinner at the Bateman Ranch in King County Tuesday.

More than 350 persons, including county and state officials, feasted at the barbecue, which was held in Culberson's honor.

Although politically unopposed, Culberson, in a short address, said he was glad to visit and that he was "disturbed that people are generally disinterested in their government." He urged that people exercise their vote and become concerned with the situation from the level of precincts to the national election.

Hailing his rancher-oilman host, Culberson said "what we need all over the world is more spirit and more men like Ed Bateman." He praised the area citizens in attendance for their "neighborliness and hospitality."

Members of the reception committee included Judge L. M. Williams and Roy Baker of Knox City; County Judge Virgil Morris, Guthrie; Mayor Byron Shotts, Paducah; former state representative Charles Conner of Haskell; former representative Claude Callaway of Crowell, and Jimmy Ballew of Vernon.

Among those attending were representatives of oil firms having leases in this section; county, area and state officials, and citizens of Knox, King, Haskell, Foard and other neighboring counties.

Also among the guests were two former All-America football players, Dick Todd of Crowell, now coach of the Washington Redskins, and John Kimbrough, Haskell rancher.

Mr. Culberson was accompanied by his wife.

CISCO LAWYER INDICTED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Fleming A. Waters, Cisco lawyer and candidate for judge of the 91st Judicial District, was indicted by an Eastland County grand jury last week on three counts charging embezzlement, theft by bailee and theft.

The charges grew out of the purchase of a home last year at Cisco by Wm. Griffith, 73, retired Knox City farmer and former county judge of Knox County, for a total consideration of \$7,000.

The golf course is still being improved. Benches have been put up and distance markers are being installed.

The club now has 66 members, and a concerted drive for more members is planned for the near future.

Funeral Held At Munday for County Pioneer

Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church in Munday Friday afternoon for Emmett Partridge, 69, well known Knox Countyman who had lived in Munday since 1889.

Mr. Partridge died in the Knox County Hospital Wednesday of last week.

The Rev. R. L. Butler, pastor of the church, officiated at the final rites.

Mr. Partridge was born Sept. 5, 1883, in Johnson county. He was married to Mattie Thompson on Dec. 13, 1903.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, Leon of Bowie, P. J. of Munday, Herbert of Munday and Donnie of La Feria; one daughter, Mrs. Myrtle Everett of Burnett; eight grandchildren; one great-grandchild; a brother, Roscoe Partridge of Munday, and a sister, Mrs. Ola McCarty of Munday.

Local Girls Win Volleyball Meet

The Knox City Girls Volleyball team took top honors in the Interscholastic League meet held at O'Brien last Thursday and Friday.

The girls won "best two out of three" from Goree Thursday night; Friday afternoon they won the first two games from Rochester, and that night took Woodson in the finals.

Mrs. E. R. Carpenter, coach, made no substitutions during the tournament; each of the girls played the full time in all of the games.

Members of the team are Carol Hitchcock and Margaret Chafin, co-captains; Tomye Woodward, Laquita Segó, Dorothy Paul, and Jo Denton. Wanda Denton is manager.

Runners-up in district play was Woodson, and the Rochester team took third place.

During the season, the local girls lost only one game—to O'Brien in the Rochester invitation tournament.

Barney Arnold, who has been serving as president of the local school board, was re-elected Saturday with 310 votes, the largest number received by any candidate on the ballot.

Knox City voters turned out 474 strong to elect seven local trustees and one county trustee-at-large.

While it is not known for sure, it is considered likely that the vote is a record for school board elections here.

Second high man in the field of fourteen was J. O. Warren of the Brock community, which was recently consolidated with the Knox City district. Mr. Warren received 280 votes.

Others elected were Eddie Shaver, Jr. (re-election), 279; Lloyd Waldrip, 255; R. B. Howell, 255; John Smith (re-election), 206, and Guy Robinson, 206.

Others on the ballot were Alton Fitzgerald, C. E. Williams, Otis Harbert, James Dutton, Allen Hester, Allen Lowrey and Sammy White.

Credited with drawing out the large vote, in Knox City and elsewhere over the county, was the race for county trustee-at-large, in which Jack Idol of Benjamin was opposed by J. Omar Cure.

The vote in this election will be officially canvassed by the commissioners court Monday, but unofficial returns give Mr. Idol a substantial lead over his opponent. The Knox City vote was Idol 457, Cure 17, while Munday voted Cure 469, Idol 46. At other boxes in the county the vote was unofficially reported as follows:

Benjamin: Idol 76, Cure 1; Goree: Idol 99, Cure 30; Rhine-land: Idol 12, Cure 8; and Gilliland, Idol 28, Cure 35.

This morning, the Vera box had not been turned in to the county judge, but it was unofficially reported that Mr. Idol carried the box about two to one.

Total of the unofficial returns, excluding Vera, gives Idol 718, Cure 560.

Woodley Petroleum Co. No. 1 Percy Jones Estate, 10 miles southwest of Knox City, has apparently extended the Katz field a quarter mile. Operators set casing at 5,186 feet and perforated at 5,124-28 feet. The well had shows in both sands which are producing in the Katz field proper.

The script, written by Director Wanda Dulaney, was taken directly from the Bible, but was prepared in modern language so that the smallest child can understand.

A cordial invitation is extended to the public in the area to attend this special sunrise Easter service. Admission is free.
