ture's action and adopted a plan of its own, which was appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court. The judgement of the lower Court in Dallas was reversed and instructions issued for the Court to adopt what is know as Plan B. which is neither the apportionment decided by the Texas Legislature nor the Federal Trial Court. Plan B was an alternate. arrangement to that adopted by the Dallas Court and varies from the legislative plan.

It is still possible the three judgeFederal Court in Dallas. which retains jurisdiction, could vet make some changes on its own, but it is not likely. The Supreme Court has, in effect, directed that Plan B be appro ved.





Jesus commanded it (Mark 16:16; Matt. 28:19-20), If refuse to obey Him, what will be the results? 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
