The homestead exemption at this time is being granted to elderly taxpayers by the school and is not mandatory at present, officials said. Another requirement for the homestead exemption is that a person must live on the place in order to claim it.

The homestead exemption must be applied for annually and should be done before April 30, either at the office of Oscar Mangis, Knox City School Tax Assessor or at the O'Brien Co-op Gin in O'Brien where Charlene Brothers, O'Brien Tax Assessor, has her office. Tax offices are open Monday through Friday.

The neavy snow that has paralyzed the East and Midwest of the Nation touched its white fingertips into the Knox County area Sunday morning, blanketing cars and crops alike.

Residents of this area who received social security benefits in 1976 must file a report of their 1976 carnings with the Social Security Administration if their earnings exceeded \$2,760.00. The deadline for filing this earnings report is April 15, 1977.






