School Is Granting Homestead Exemption

The Knox City O'Brien Consolidated School District is offering a \$3,000 homestead exemption to taxpayers who are 65 years of age or older. However, to be eligible, the taxpayer must have been 65 on or before January 1, 1977. The ruling still applies if the wife of the home is 65 and her husband is younger. Also, many wi-

dows have failed to apply because they did not know they were eligible, according to a spokesman.

The homestead exemption at this time is being granted to elderly taxpayers by the school and is not mandatory at present, officials said.

Another requirement for the homestead exemption is that a person must live on the place in order to claim it. One exception is that a taxpayer may claim his homestead even though it has become necessary for him to move to a nursing home.

The homestead exemption must be applied for annually and should be done before April 30, either at the office of Oscar Mangis, Knox City School Tax Assessor or at the O'Brien Co-op Gin in O'Brien where Charlene Brothers, O'Brien Tax Assessor, has her office. Tax offices are open Monday through Friday.

Funeral services for Leonard White Sr., 83, of Pine-land were held here Monday morning at 10:00 o'clock in the Chapel of the First Baptist Church. The Rev. John Gillispie, pastor, officiated. Burial followed in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. White died at 1:30 a.m. Friday in the Jasper Memorial Hospital in Jasper following a brief illness.

Born October 15, 1893 in Gadsten, Alabama, he married Clara Petties in February 1914 in Munday. He farmed and operated a grocery store between Knox City and Benjamin from 1910 to 1943. Mrs. White preceded her husband in death on May 13, 1933 in Knox City. Mr. White resided in Lubbock for 21 years before moving to Pine-land two and one-half years ago. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include six sons, Alto of Fort Worth, Roy of Pine-land, Kenneth of Lubbock, James Leonard of Delhi, California, and Jerry Lee and Charles, both of Fort Ord, California; one daughter, Mrs. Katherine Jinks of Indianapolis, Indiana; two step daughters, Mrs. Virginia Silva and Mrs. Allene Smith, both of Delhi, California; three sisters, Mrs. Della Scott of Glenwood, Arkansas, Mrs. Ella Franklin of Rule, and Mrs. Grace Cowan of Dallas; 24 grandchildren and 25 great-grandchildren.

USDA Releases Information And Technical Assistance Report

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 -- Information and technical assistance to rural communities increased again in fiscal year 1976 -- by 32 manyears over fiscal 1975 -- up nearly 73 percent from 1971, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reports.

In its seventh annual report

on information and technical assistance published today, USDA reviews accomplishments in 10 program areas. Programs range from community facilities and services to manpower development. The report is issued to Congress annually to comply with Title IX, Section 901(d) of the Agricultural Act of 1970.

The 1976 fiscal year report shows that USDA and the state cooperative extension services assisted more than 173,000 community projects during the year. In providing this assistance, department staff conducted workshops, conferences and meetings, and made surveys and feasibility studies relating to rural development. Many different publications and audio-visual presentations also were used to inform.

Environmental improvement and community organization and leadership development accounted for 47

percent of the 5,545 total manyears expended during the year. Other program areas cited are comprehensive planning, housing, health and welfare, recreation and tourism, economic, business and industrial development and rural cooperatives.

Single copies of the report are available from Information Staff, Rural Development Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Mrs. Smith was expected to return to the Knox County Hospital Wednesday of this week.

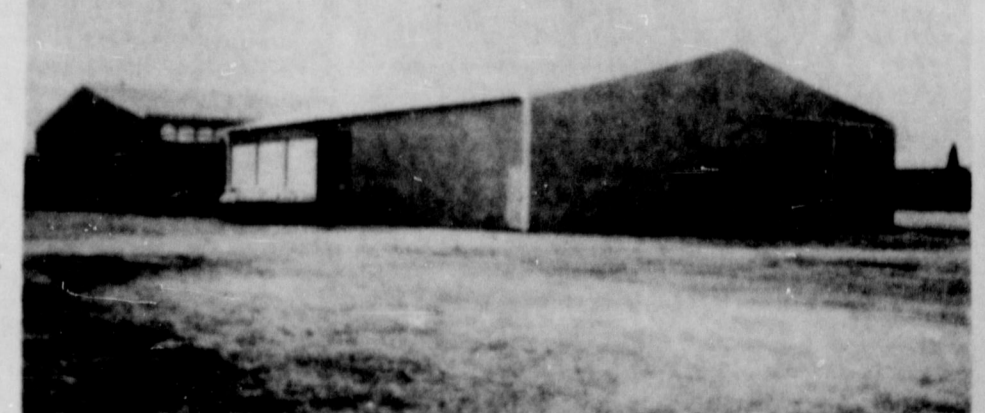
