Star Gas Conducts Study

Officials, including Kenneth Crowover, city secretary Faye Railsback, and city councilmen A.P. Denton, Joe N. Brown, and Norman Langham, met Monday afternoon to observe the installation of the gas company's underground pipe. According to Lone Star manager Lester Yates of Seymour, the gas rates are based on the fair value of all property within Knox City, and in the case of underground pipe facilities, the test holes are necessary to visually inspect the pipe's condition. Seventeen test holes were drilled Monday afternoon and one Tuesday morning. Three crews from Wichita Falls,

Vernon, and Seymour were here to do the work.

The Knox City Houndettes brought home the second place trophy from the Paducah tournament this past weekend, but the Greyhounds fell as they played for third place in their third game of the tournament.

In their first game, the Houndettes defeated Chillicothe 58-37. Jane Arledge led the Houndette scoring with 30 points, followed by Sheryll Guinn and Marylon Burt with 10, and Sarah McGaughey with 8.

The Houndettes took a 15-8 first quarter lead and also outscored Chillicothe in the remaining three quarters to increase the margin.

Friday, the Houndettes beat Crowell 38-33, although they got off to a slow start, scoring only one point in the initial period. Arledge scored 24 and Burt had 14.

The Houndettes met Paducah in the championship game Saturday night, falling to second place by a two point margin, 39-37. The Dragonettes won the tournament with this final victory. Burt led the Houndette scoring with 16, Arledge followed with 14, Guinn with 6, and McGaughey with 1.

The team members received individual medals and the team received a trophy for their second place finish.

Cotton Classing Report

Cotton prices to the growers strengthened considerably this week according to Sidney Ferrell, in charge of the Munday Classing Office. Trading was light as growers still are not offering freely. All grades with a 3.5-4.9 mike are in demand. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41, 32, and 42, staples 30 through 32, mostly 3.5-4.9 mike brought around 47 to 47.60 cents per pound.

Grade 32 was the predominant quality classed this week, accounting for 36 percent of classing compared to 25 percent last week. Grade 42 accounted for 23 percent; grade 41 was 18 percent and grade 31 was 16 percent. The amount of cotton reduced because of bark dropped to 27 percent from 41 percent last week.

Farabee Named To Committee

AUSTIN - Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby today announced his three appointments to the Texas Coordinating Commission for State Health and Welfare Services which was created by the 64th Legislature.

They are: Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, Senator Tati Santiastaban of El Paso, and Senator A.R. (Babe) Schwartz of Galveston.

Under provisions of House Bill 2164, the commission will review and comment on any state agency applications for federal grants for health purposes. The commission also is charged with making a continuing study and analysis of the services and programs of all health-related state agencies.

In addition to the three senators named by Hobby, the commission will include three members of the House of Representatives appointed by the speaker, three citizens named by the governor, and various state agency heads.

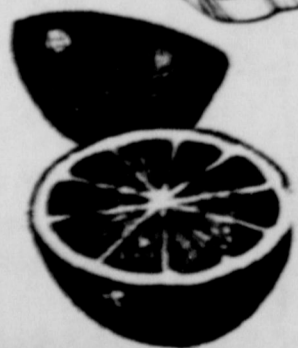

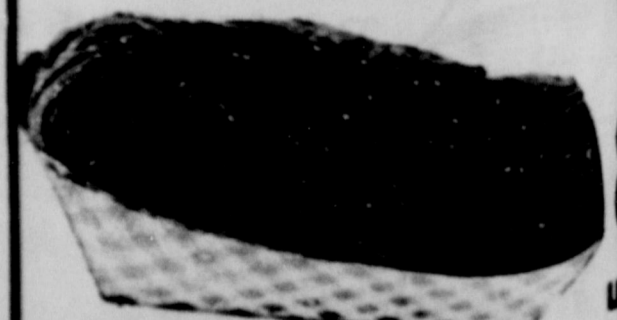

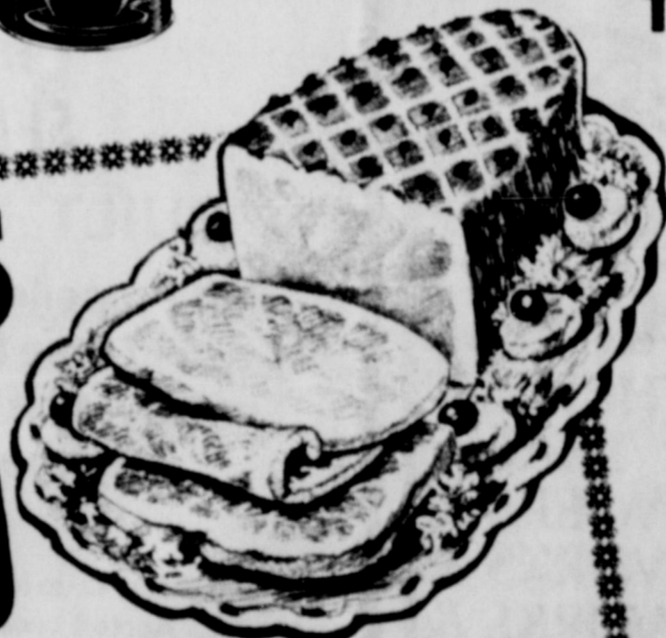
