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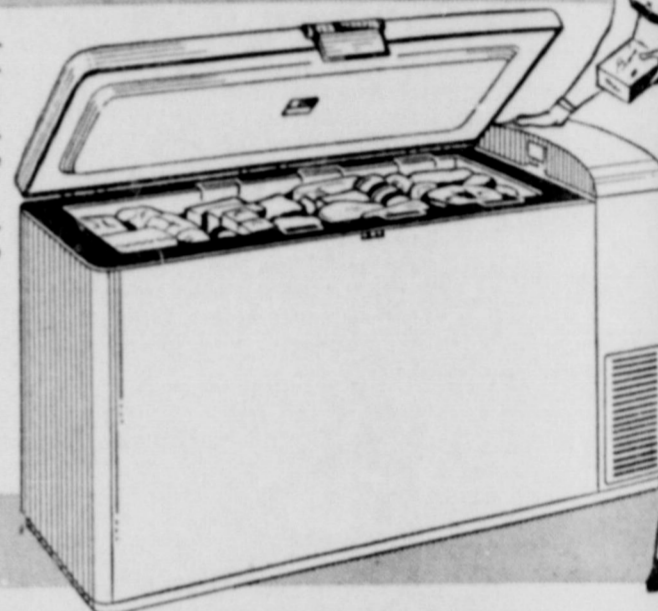

Extension Specialist Gives Training in Irrigation

County Agents and farmers from twelve counties met in the Veterans Building and Grade School building at Munday last week for a two-day irrigation training school, and were instructed in methods of irrigation and ways of management by Ed Bush, Irrigation Specialist from Texas A and M Extension Service.

The program was under the direction of J. A. Schofield of Vernon, district agent, and more than 100 men attended the last session of the meeting.

Among other things, Bush brought out the following points concerning irrigation:

Where at all possible, use the flooding system in preference to the sprinkler because of cost. Flood irrigation is cheaper, it

takes less labor and power, and is easier to apply and get correct water application. Its disadvantages are: It is relatively inefficient, is a user of water, requires some land preparation, and is not suited for all soils and topography. A sprinkler system has its advantages: Availability to use more supplies of water, may be used on rolling, uneven soils or soils with a high infiltration rate, is portable and needs no water-way. Its disadvantages are the high first cost, extra labor needed to operate, more power needed, high evaporation loss, and uneven penetration.

For flood irrigation, the row, border, contour ditch, corrugation and level bench system may be used. If borders are used, wide, flat borders that are 4 feet wide and 6 inches high are recommended because they may be seeded over, and eliminate a weed row. Where rows are used to run the water, the following falls generally hold true: .3 foot per 100 ft. in sandy soils and .05 to .1 ft. per 100 ft. in clay soils, and generally from 600 to 700 ft. is the maximum length of run. Water ditches may have up to .3 fall in sandy soils and for 1,000 gal.-min. a ditch that is 6 ft. wide, 18 inches deep and 18 inches wide at the bottom is recommended.

Bush also recommended that the farmer hire a driller of good standing to drill his well, and to obtain a test pump to prove the well, as the sand that is pumped out in developing can ruin a new pump in eight hours. This method also will give a true picture of the size of pump needed, which should be based on the amount of water available and the depth to pump. A pump which will handle more

water than is available is money wasted. For casing the well, 60 percent open space is needed, and uniform gravel of pea size has given the best results.

Pumping a lot of sand to form a reservoir is not recommended as it increases the possibilities of a cave-in, and only increases the amount of water to be pumped for a very short time.

A topography map of the place is very essential in proper irrigation management, and the quantity and quality of water should be known. Also the fertility level and type of crop to be grown must be considered to obtain maximum yields.

Some figures that are handy to remember, Bush said, are:

It costs 6 cents per acre ft. of

water times the total lift in feet of the water.

For proper crop growth, the following inches of moisture is needed: Cotton, 24-28; grain sorghums, 18-20; cane for forage, 22-24; permanent pasture, 36-38; castor beans, 24-28; alfalfa, 55-60; sudan, 30 inches. Average rainfall of the county is 25 inches.

1 acre ft. equals 28,000 gallons, and 450 gal.-min. will provide 1 acre inch of water per hour.

Tubes are recommended over cutting the ditch, because in time dirt to rebuild ditches will be hard to find, and less labor is needed.

For other information on irrigation, farmers are advised to contact their county agent.

VARIETY TEST INFO GIVEN 4-H MEMBERS
