Farmers Take Note Of May Vote!

Cotton farmers in Knox County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county.

Arnold J. Navratil, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. The referendum on the question will be conducted by mail during the period May 16 through May 25. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office. The only question to be de-


ecided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next three years to other farms outside the county which are owned or controlled by someone else. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the next three upland cotton crops, 1967-69.

A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers in last fall's vote.

The upcoming vote by mail marks a first in program administration, according to Mr. Navratil. Farmers previously have been able to vote by mail in annual ASC committeeman elections, but the method has never before been used in a commodity program referendum.

Mr. Navratil said, "It's easy to vote by mail, and we hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county."

The Chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote, is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office here.

Deputy Sheriffs Kenneth LaMascus and Doc Clark directed the contest.

The Knox County Riding Club had another successful playday Sunday at the Riding Club Arena in Benjamin. A total of 18 4-H members and 10 adults took part in the various contests. This was the second in a series of four playdays planned for the months of April and May.

Points are accumulated each playday with the highest total points in each contest being declared the winner. The next playday is scheduled for 2 p.m. Sunday, May 15.

Everybody is invited to come and watch the contests.

Knox County Beef Cattle producers are reminded that anytime from now until September 1, is recommended for treating cattle for grubs. The Livestock and Range Committee is urging all producers to treat their cattle for grubs this summer.

Since the adult heelfly only travels a short distance, treating cowherds this summer will lower the native fly population.

The big gain for ranchers will be in increased weight on their cattle, increased milk production from cows and no running of cattle next spring.

Methods of treatment include sprays, pour-on, feed, additives and mineral block additives. When cow herds are corralled for branding, weaning calves or other reasons, then this is an excellent time to spray or pour on the systemics to control the grubs in the animals body.

If the cattle are in pastures that are difficult to work, then the mineral block with the systemic included can be put out instead of the regular salt block. A minimum of 75 days is required for effective dosage.

Any of these treatments will also aid in controlling the horn flies.

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Facts Parents Should Know About Job Corps

The Job Corps is mostly for young men and women who are out of school and cannot find a job. In a Job Corps Center, these young people will receive basic education, job training, and the experience to develop good work habits. They will get room and board, clothing and spending money of \$30 a month. Also, when they leave they will get \$50 for each month of satisfactory service in the Job Corps.

If the Corpsman wants to send some of that money home instead of saving it he can send up to \$25 each month. The Job Corps will send the same amount. The Corpsman will still be saving \$25 and his family will be getting up to \$50 for each month he is in the Job Corps.

Any young man or woman between the ages of 17 and 21 can apply for the Job Corps. There are two kinds of Job Corps Centers where a young man can go. One kind is located on public land such as National Parks and Forests. At these centers, Corpsmen will do carpentry and forestry work, build roads and make trails. They will also learn to read and write better. They will learn how to handle employment interviews and other skills that will help them get a job later.

The other kind of Job Corps for young men will be located in or near large cities. At these centers they will receive more specialized job training.

Young women will go to Job Corps Centers in or near large cities. They will be trained to work in business offices, hospitals, stores, beauty shops, restaurants, nursery schools, or in other jobs that are available. They will also learn how to handle home and family responsibilities.

At all of these centers, movies, athletics, games, libraries, and various kinds of entertainment will be available.

A young man or woman may spend anywhere from a few months to two years in the Job Corps. The Job Corps will pay the cost of one visit home a year. Corpsmen can also visit home at their own expense. Parents may visit Corpsmen at the centers.

The Corps is entirely voluntary and any one can leave at any time. If he stays in the Job Corps and completes his training he will be better able to get a job, return to school or join the armed services.

The Job Corps uses the newest training methods. Each Corpsman will be able to learn at his own rate according to his

own abilities and interest. Each center will have qualified people available to every Corpsman for guidance and counseling.

The Job Corps will have every Corpsman get a job after grad-

uation from the Corps. This program is planned to give young people a better future.

AUSTIN — With a lackluster first Democratic primary behind, state political insiders are looking toward the big general election contest for the U. S. Senate — and even to a potentially exciting 1968.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, the Democratic Senate nominee, and Republican Sen. John G. Tower have their campaign machinery in gear. Both are ranging widely over the state.

ton Smith says it offers the greatest challenge in history to the presiding officer. One-third of the upper house membership now is from metropolitan counties.

House of Representatives, with a minimum of 54 newcomers, will remain moderate or conservative in tone, with Speaker Barnes retaining firm control of the gavel.

Carr boasts of drawing nearly 80 per cent of the May 7 vote in his race against John R. Wiloughby, carrying both liberal and conservative areas and rural and metropolitan counties by lopsided margins.

COURTS SPEAK — Striking down a 1965 Texas law, a three-judge federal court held a Vernon farm couple cannot be stopped by the state from selling water under their land to Altus, Okla.

He cites this as evidence the Democratic party will close ranks behind him in the rough race against Tower next November.

Supreme Court heard lengthy arguments in sulphur company suits to force Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to file their claims in Pecos County. State attorneys called companies "trespassers." Firms charged Sadler reversed the land office policy in refusing their applications.

Speculation already has started on potential candidates for governor in 1968 if Gov. John Connally steps aside. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith admittedly plans to run for the top job when it opens up. House Speaker Ben Barnes is giving it some thought. Among liberal prospects are U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Sen. Franklin Spears who made the attorney general's run off against Crawford Martin.

Jack Ruby's lawyers, seeking to disqualify trial Judge Joe B. Brown, told the Court of Criminal Appeals that Brown performed four judicial acts concerning the convicted slayer of Lee Harvey Oswald after contracting to write a book about the case. If the court disqualifies Brown, Ruby will get a new trial for murder of the presidential assassin. If Brown is found qualified, Ruby will get a sanity hearing in Dallas.

Gov. Connally scored a clean sweep victory in the May 7 primary and conventions. Not only was he nominated to a third term with 75 per cent of the total vote cast in his race, but his supporters apparently scored overwhelming victory over liberal forces in party conventions.

Third Court of Civil Appeals, reversing the lower courts, held that State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has authority to collect franchise taxes on dividends and interest paid to Texas corporations from out-of-state sources.

Only one incumbent was upset. Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald lost to John F. Onion, San Antonio district judge.

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

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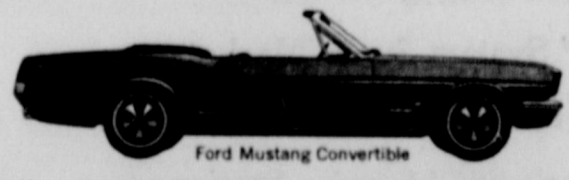

Dr. A. C. Sharp to Study Club Installs Work on Research Project at Iowa State New Officers

Dr. A. C. Sharp, Jr., son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Waldrip, will do research this summer at Iowa Park University under a college teacher participation program supported by the National Science Foundation.

Sharp will be at Ames, Iowa, from June 6 to August 12 working on a research project being conducted at Iowa State by Dr. A. V. Pohm, professor of electrical engineering. Dr. Pohm's major interest is in computer components and in the development of thin magnetic film devices. Sharp will be working in the electrical engineering department.

The NSF program will be worth \$1600 to Sharp. It includes a dependency allowance, and his family will go with him.

This is the second teacher participation program for Sharp. He attended one in 1961 at Texas A&M, working that year in polymer physics. The Iowa State program provides an opportunity for predictorial and postdoctoral college teachers to obtain stimulation from research, and it is conducted for teachers with limited opportunity for research during the academic year. The Iowa State program is conducted in biology, biochemistry, chemistry, economics, engineering, physics and psychology.

Sharp received the B. S. and M. S. degrees from Texas A&M College and in August of 1961 received the Ph.D. from Texas A&M.

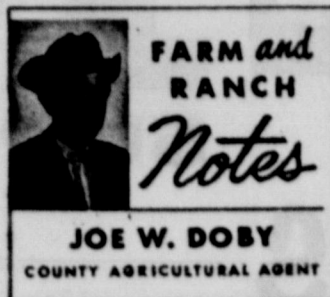
All amateurs in this area are eligible to enter, and \$100 in prizes will be awarded the winners. As interest increases, this is expected to be a highlight of this year's event.

The only way to produce large high-quality fruit is to thin the fruit now. Peaches should be thinned to have a space of six inches between fruit.

Plums can be carried with a closer spacing. A peach or plum tree will only produce so many pounds of fruit. It is up to the producer whether he has a lot of little peaches or fewer larger, more desirable fruit.

Farmers To Vote On Sale or Lease Cotton Allotments

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during period May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties within same state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Where approved by at least two thirds of growers voting in county; transfer of allotments to other counties for period 1967, 1968, and 1969 will be permitted. Transfer of allotments authorized in Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First vote on transfer of allotments held on Nov. 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland producing counties voted to permit transfers. There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in U. S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote this month.

The May 16-25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers of record in counties holding referendum this month. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at their polling places, particularly during busy season. USDA officials hope for good turn out in voting and will regard it as sign growers approve mail method of holding referendum. To be counted, all votes should be in office of the county ASC committee before office closing time May 25, 1966.
