
crops, 1967-69. A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers in last fall's vote.

The upcoming vote by mail marks a first in program administration, according to Mr. Navratil. Farmers previously have been able to vote by mail in annual ASC committeeman elections, but the method has never before been used in a commodity program referendum.

Mr. Navratil said, "It's easy to vote by mail, and we hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county.

The Chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with informtaion describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote, is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office here.

Knox County Beef Cattle producers are reminded that anytime from now until September 1, is recommended for treating cattle for grubs. The Livestock and Range Committee is urging all producers to treat their catfor grubs this summer.

Since the adult heelfly only travels a short distance, treating cowherds this summer will armed services. lower the native fly popula-

The big gain for ranchers will be in increased weight on their cattle, increased milk production from cows and no running of cattle next spring.

Methods of treatment include sprays, pour-on, feed, additives and mineral block additives. When cow herds are corralled for branding, weaning calves or other reasons, then this is an excellent time to spray or pour on the systemics to control the grubs in the animals body.

If the cattle are in pastures that are difficult to work, then the mineral block with the systemic included can be put out instead of the regular salt block. A minimum of 75 days is requir ed for effective dosage.

Any of these treatments will also aid in controlling the horn

Facts Parents Should Know **About Job Corps**

The Job Corps is mostly for young men and women who are out of school and cannot find a job. In a Job Corps Center, these young people will receive basic education, job training, and the experience to develop good work habits. They will get room and board, clothing and spending money of \$30 a month. Also, when they leave they will get \$50 for each month of satisfactory service in the Job Corps.

If the Corpsman wants to send some of that money home instead of saving it he can send up to \$25 each month. The Job Corps will send the same amount. The Corpsman will still be saving \$25 and his family will be getting up to \$50 for each month he is in the Job Corps.

Any young man or woman beween the ages of 17 and 21 can The Knox County Riding Club apply for the Job Corps. There are two kinds of Job Corps Centers where a young man can go. One kind is located on public land such as National Parks and Forests. At these centers, Corpsmen will do carpentry and forestry work, build roads and make trails. They will also learn to read and write better. They will learn how to handle employment interviews and other skills that will help them get a job later.

The other kind of Job Corps for young men will be located in or near large cities. At these centers they will receive more specialized job training.

Young women will go to Job Corps Centers in or near large cities. They will be trained to work in business offices, hospitals, stores, beauty shops, restaurants, nursery schools, or in other jobs that are available. They will also learn how to handle home and family responsibil-

At all of these centers, movies, athletics, games, libraries, and various kinds of entertainment will be available.

A young man or woman may spend anywhere from a few months to two years in the Job Corps. The Job Corps will pay the cost of one visit home a year. Corpsmen can also visit home at their own expense. Parents may visit Corpsmen at the centers.

Fruit set is very heavy and soil moisture conditions are good. The only way to produce large high-quality fruit is to thin the fruit now. Peaches should be thinned to have a space of six inches between fruit.

Plums can be carried with a closer spacing. A peach or plum tree will only produce so many pounds of fruit. It is up to the producer whether he has a lot of little peaches or fewer larger, more deisirable fruit.
