It was October 21, 1971, that the first issue of the News was published, the beginning of another hometown newspaper born of necessity as the Knox County Herald, 66-year-old publication, was closed on Wednesday, October 13, 1971.

By that Wednesday afternoon, local groceryman Bob Harrison along with Buddy and Billy Bess Angle, who had served as editor for the former publication, were in Stamford talking with publisher Roy Craig about the possibilities of having the Knox City paper printed there. Thursday afternoon, right after lunch, Chamber of Commerce secretary-manager Doris Crowner called a meeting of all interested persons regarding the beginning of another newspaper. With the interest and determination that Knox City is noted for, the

new venture was begun with literally nothing to work with except a borrowed typewriter, tables, and chairs, and the use of a building donated rent free by Myrtle White for three months. Composition was done in Stamford until December when we acquired our Justo-writers and Headliner. Our publishing is now the only part of our paper that is done in Stamford.

We're proud of our paper, not for what we may or may not have accomplished, but for what you, the advertisers and readers actually make it. It is your interest and support that keeps a local hometown paper. We are so grateful in all of you for your suggestions and help.

We are planning to hold open house on Friday, November 10, and invite all of you to come in and see how our paper is put together each week.

Purcell Visits Knox City

Congressman Graham Purcell visited Knox City Wednesday, Oct. 11 for a face-to-face talk with voters on what he considers our Nation's most crucial needs—welfare reform, inflation control, law and order, more jobs, and an honorable end to the Vietnam War.

Purcell, who earned a reputation as a tough, no-nonsense District Judge in Northwest Texas before his election to Congress 10 years ago, is seeking his sixth term in the U. S. House of Representatives.

His visit to Knox City was part of his extensive travels through the newly-changed 11th Congressional District, which now embraces 35 counties in Northwest Texas and the Panhandle.

"There's no substitute for getting out and talking to people frankly and honestly about our national problems and policies," Congressman Purcell said.

The veteran Democratic lawmaker said his talks with voters so far have revealed that people are sick and tired of the welfare mess and it must be cleaned up.

"A working man who has to crawl out of bed at 5 o'clock in the morning and labor hard all day is doggedly sure entitled to a better life than some fellow who spends his time just lying under a shade tree and drawing welfare," Congressman Purcell said.

"In all my talks with the people of our District, I haven't found a single one who objects to providing the necessities of life for people who are really crippled or sick or elderly," he declared. "But rank-and-file citizens are completely fed up with the idea of doling out money to able-bodied men and women who won't work because it's easier just to drive down town and pick up a welfare check."

On Vietnam, Congressman Purcell said he thinks President Nixon has done a good job of withdrawing American combat forces and that he supports the President's continued efforts to establish an honorable peace.

Another crucial issue that the next Congress will have to face is the control of inflation, Purcell said.

"This is really important, because inflation hurts worst those who can afford it least—our retired people who must get along on their Social Security or other fixed incomes," he said. Purcell said he believes a firmer system of price controls may be the answer to curbing inflation.

As a former District Judge in Wichita Falls, Purcell recalled that he fought for many years for the cause of law and order with not just words, but deeds.

"Lately some of our courts have been more concerned with the rights of criminals than with the rights of the public," Purcell said. "We must redouble our efforts to pass laws and adopt national policies whose first priority is protecting our society from the thugs who commit one crime and are immediately turned loose to go

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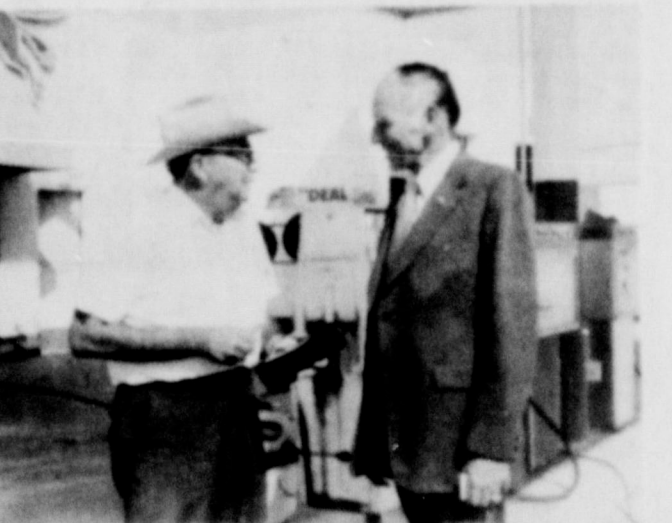

Northwest Texas and the Panhandle.

"In Knox County alone," Purcell said, "the Federal Government spent \$8,129,204 dollars in fiscal 1971. This represents the total outlay in this county for all programs, and I like to think this investment contributed to a sounder economy for this area."
