Knox County Hospital To Meet Requirements

Knox County Hospital is to spend about \$45,000 in the next six months in order to meet requirements of the recently adopted Life Safety Code. The code essentially has to do with fire and safety programs, established by the Department of Health, Education and the Texas State Department, Division of Health Licensing.

Patronage of the local hospital has made the renovation on a strictly cash basis possible. In these days of higher prices, greater costs, and tighter and more restrictive government rules and regulations, the spokesman said that it would not be necessary to tap the taxpayers' pocketbooks to make the improvements and that, not only would the doors of the local hospital remain open, but that the type of personal care patients have been accustomed to will continue.

Renovations planned include the installation of a complete new electrical system to prevent the possibility of shock to

patients and personnel in the operating room, the obstetrical delivery room, and the newborn nursery.

The system will consist of complete ungrounded circuitry with Isolation Transformers with visual indicators that tell immediately whether there is a dangerous grounded wire not functioning, or that an appliance or some medical equipment is not properly wired before use. This system also will prevent the possibility of explosion from anesthetic gases.

Two wings of the hospital will have automatic fire detection and alarm systems. All hallways, closets, patient rooms, and bath rooms will have fire detectors in them. In the event of fire, an alarm will go off at the nurses station and office, and also at the Knox City fire station. Whenever smoke is detected by the alarm system, the fire doors separating each wing and the second floor automatically close and seal off each wing to prevent spread of the fire.

New fire resistant doors will be installed in all key areas throughout the entire hospital. All draperies and curtains will be replaced with fire proof materials, and carpet that has been approved as fire retardant will be installed in all hallways on the ground floor.

A new exit at the west end of the hospital on the second floor will be made and a wider fire escape will be constructed. A much larger emergency electrical generator will be installed. This generator will be capable of operating all the electrical systems in the hospital when an outside power failure occurs. The generator will automatically start when the voltage goes off and will continue to run until power is back on.

Many other smaller items will have to be either repaired, updated, or replaced. The spokesman said that the line can be held in medical costs and the Knox County Hospital hopes to be able to set a good example of just such a fact.

Band Contest Set Next Wednesday

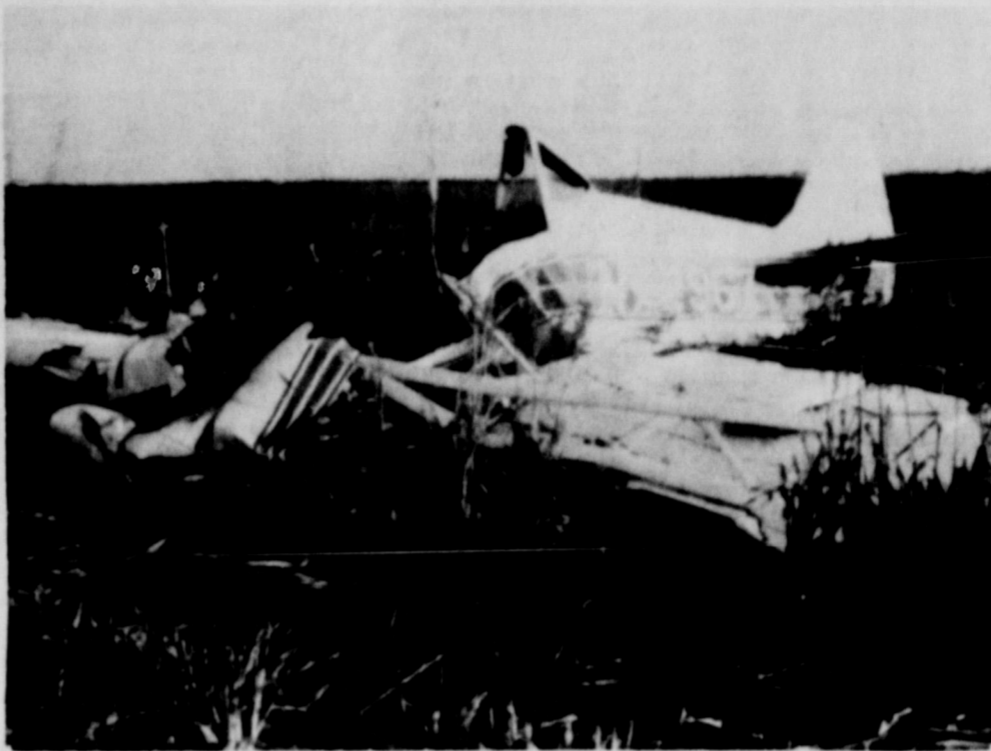
Knox City High School Band, under the field of senior drum majors, will be competing in the Interscholastic Marching Band and Bands Contest for Region II next Wednesday.

Boys Ranch Directors Are Chosen

Approximately 45 persons were present at the organizational meeting of the Texas Boys Ranch of Benjamin at the Courthouse in Benjamin last Thursday night. Benjamin School Superintendent Kenneth Roberts, chairman of the interim Steering Committee, introduced Texas Boys Ranch Administrator Johnny Moffitt of Lubbock who explained ranch policies to interested persons from nine area towns. Those towns represented were Seymour, Munday, Aspermont, Benjamin, Rochester, Gilliland, Wichita Falls, Knox City, and Lubbock.

Moffitt explained that each Boys Ranch will be governed by its local board of directors, under the policies of the state board. The local administrator, who must meet high standards in education and experience, will be hired by the local board, and will in turn hire the other ranch personnel including cottage parents for each cottage on the ranch. Initially, there will be one cottage housing 10 boys and the cottage parents. The house father should have some ranching skills and will be required to take part in regular ranch work, as will the boys. Various projects will be available in which the boys can participate. This is the chief reason why a ranch-type setting was chosen, as troubled children can be reached through their affection for animals when they cannot be reached any other way. Pilot Killed In Crash Near Rochester

A Rochester crop duster, Harry LaVerne Kumlin, 35, was killed last Thursday afternoon about 5:30 when his plane crashed into a field about one and one-half miles north of Rochester.

Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett said that according to Kumlin's partner, Gerald Cuntton, who was flying another plane nearby, Kumlin's plane went into a spin and plunged to the ground on the W.H. Patterson farm.

Kumlin was pronounced dead at the scene by Haskell County Judge B.O. Roberson. The Federal Aviation Agency, which investigates all air crashes, has not completed its investigation into the cause of the accident, as yet. Born August 24, 1938, in Wisconsin, Kumlin had moved from Hale Center to Rochester about five months ago where he was employed by Buck's Dus-

ting Service. He married his wife, Jacqueline, in January, 1959, in Waukon, Iowa. He was a captain in the Air Force during the Vietnam war. Survivors are his wife; five children, Kurt, Korry, Kris, Kelly, and Kraig, all of the home; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Kumlin of Minneapolis, Minnesota. Funeral services for Kumlin were conducted in the Faith Lutheran Church in Sagerton Saturday at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Joe Aalbu, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Rochester Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Drug Raid Staged In Neighboring Baylor Co.

Six months of undercover work by state narcotics agents led to the seizure of ten pounds of packaged marijuana, thousands of pills, two dozen growing marijuana plants, and a number of weapons in a series of raids that began in Seymour last Wednesday night, and ended at dawn Thursday.

Eleven persons, nine men and two women, have been indicted as a result of the raids by some 25 state and local officers under the leadership of Baylor County Sheriff Don Mooney. Among those indicted on drug charges by the grand jury were Billy Watson, Thomas Ray Latham, Gary L. Loftin, Luther Williams Jr., Charles Watson, Charles Cockrell, Claiborne Gooding, Ava Loftin, and Pat Gooding. Sheriff Mooney said more arrests were expected, and the number of arrests could run as high as 36. So far no juveniles have been arrested, although a number of teenage users were known.

To Play Munday This Week Dragons Slip By Hounds

The Paducah Dragons got rolling in their clash with the Knox City Greyhounds last Friday night in Greyhound Stadium when they edged the Hounds 26-20. Knox City got off to a good start when the Hounds put two TDs on their side of the board during the first quarter. Hound back Dale Bloxham racked up the first Knox City TD on a 48 yard run to paydirt. Bloxham was also the ball carrier for the second KC touchdown, when he plowed over the goal line from one yard

out. Joey Swain kicked the extra point, and the quarter ended Knox City 13 - Paducah 0. The second quarter saw Paducah's Carl Wright snag a Hound pass and return it for a Dragon TD. The Dragons' conversion was good, and it was Knox City 13 - Paducah 8. Knox City added six points to their side of the board when Donald Swearer nabbed a 30 yard pass from Swain. The extra point kick by Swain was no good, bringing up KC 20 - Paducah 8. The Dragons lost no time in getting back on the board as James McGruder scampered 28 yards to paydirt for Paducah. The extra point try failed, and the half-time board read Hounds 20 - Dragons 14. The second half brought up a scoreless third quarter. In the fourth quarter, the Dragons slapped another six on the board on a 25 yard run by Danny Garrett. The extra point try failed.

Special Election Slated Tuesday, November 6

Nine amendments are to be voted on at the special election set for Tuesday, November 6. Each eligible voter has the privilege, as well as the responsibility, of voting and is urged to do so.

Both Precinct 9 and 9A, Knox City's two precincts, will vote at the Community Center, rather than at City Hall or American Legion Hall as they have done in the past, according to Election Judge G.W. (Jack) Coats. Also, this year Sunset will join Knox City voters. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. A summary of the Amend-

ments is found elsewhere in the News, and voters are urged to study the summary before going to the polls.

In addition to the change in the location of the Knox City and Sunset polling places, Rhineland will vote in Munday this year.

Polling places in the county for this election include Knox City-Sunset, Knox City Community Center; Benjamin, Courthouse; Munday-Rhineland, Munday Community Center; Goree, Community Center; Vera, Methodist Church; Truscott, Community Center; and Gilliland, school building.

Amendment 6 Approval Could Cost Taxpayers

A number of officials say they see little need for passage of Amendment 6 in next Tuesday's constitutional amendment election, and in the event it is passed, it could prove more costly to taxpayers. At present, district courts in Texas have no original jurisdiction over the probate of wills, but hear such cases only after they have been appealed from county courts.

In a conversation with Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts, he reported that about 50 to 75 probate cases originate in county court each year that that they are handled without delay. Should Amendment 6 be approved, the district court would have concurrent jurisdiction with the county court, and with the additional cases of all the other counties in the district, the added responsibility on the district court would be so much greater than more personnel would be required to handle it, thus costing the taxpayers much more to achieve what the county courts are able to take care of as

the docket comes up. Judge Clonts noted that the County Judges and Commissioners Assn. of Texas recently passed a resolution opposing passage of Amendment 6 because it feels that much responsibility is being moved from the county judges' offices.

Judge Clonts was in Amarillo the first part of the week as one of four panelists discussing the pros and cons of the constitutional amendments. The program was taped and will be televised Sunday by the Amarillo television station. He was in Abilene Wednesday of this week for a similar discussion of the proposed changes for the news media.

County Joins State In Observance

November Designated As Food And Fiber Appreciation Month

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, we as citizens of this great Nation, State, and County are blessed with an abundance, variety, and a quality of food and fiber,

WHEREAS, we need only five per cent of our nation's population to provide this resource, with one farm worker producing enough for 51 people, or three times as many as 20 years ago, and

WHEREAS, no nation on earth provides its people with so much for so little with an average family in the United States spending less than one-fifth of its income on food, and

WHEREAS, much of this abundance is produced by the agricultural industry of Texas,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County of Knox proclaims November to be Food and Fiber Appreciation Month, and urges all of its citizens to observe this important occasion.

Modern agriculture is vital to the U.S. and world economy. Although recent supply and demand conditions have resulted in increased food prices, today's wholesome foods are still a bargain compared to most other items.

Agriculture today is much more than farming and ranching. It includes production, of course, but it also includes supply and service industries that aid producers with fertilizers, seed, machinery, and information. And marketing and distribution are other phases of the complex system required to move goods from producers to consumers.

Texas consumers spent about \$6.4 billion last year at food stores and eating and drinking establishments for wholesale and nutritious foods. In the U.S., food retailing last year topped the nation's retail industry. Marketing, processing, and distribution costs of food have also increased in recent months, and some shortages of food items are evident.

Yet, consumers around the world would gladly exchange life styles and living standards with most Americans, who are still the envy of those in other nations. No where else do consumers have nearly 8,000 food items to select from at the supermarket.

To satisfy our nation's food and fiber needs—as well as to meet overseas commitments—will require strengthened agricultural leadership.

Thus the Land-Grant University system—with its agricultural research, teaching and informal education—has served consum-

ers well, but the greatest challenge lies in the years ahead.

It is appropriate that during November, consumers pause to count their blessings and express appreciation for quality food and fiber products.

Summary of Amendments Given

NUMBER ONE

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the

proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court, concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction

of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who served after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the land selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

"The constitutional amendment to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative."

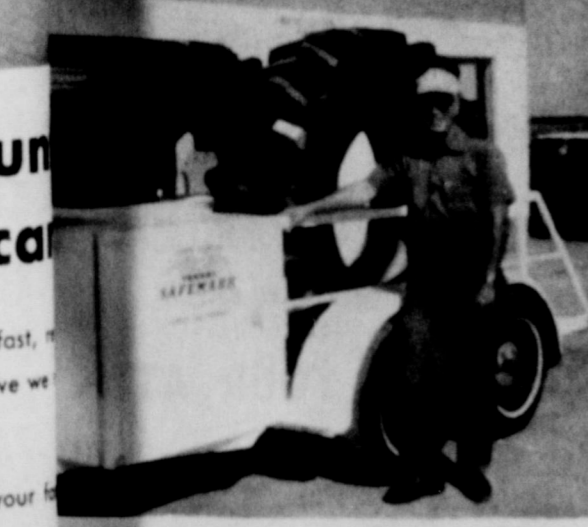

This would overburden the local school system in which they will be enrolled.

Regularly attending the church of their choice is also required, though Texas Boys Ranch is non-denominational.

The boys must earn the right to date and to drive a car.

Patrol Division Captain Charles Trainham of the Wichita Falls Police Department, formerly with the Juvenile Division there, told the group that it was very important that the entire community get behind the project. He also pointed out that the community must understand that the boys who will be at the Boys Ranch have problems, not of a criminal nature, but of an emotional and behavioral nature, because these children are homeless and neglected pre-delinquents.

Bill Longley of Stamford, a prominent Lions Club official, expressed a desire to have a place other than the Gatesville Reformatory to send troubled children.

The financing of the project, which was founded in Lubbock last year, was also discussed by Moffitt, who said that the large donations of land and buildings were more easily acquired than were the smaller donations which would finance salaries for the staff and operation of the ranch. Each of the five ranches, which the Texas Boys Ranch proposes to build, must have land and buildings financed and funds for one year's operation on hand before a license is issued.

The first 100 persons who contribute \$1,000 will be named as members of the Founders Program. Those who contribute \$100 are members of the Century Ranchers Club.

Moffitt said he thought Benjamin had an excellent chance to have the second of the five proposed ranches. Construction will begin shortly on the ranch at Lubbock.

Ranches for troubled girls may be considered at a later time, Moffitt said.
