WELCOME TO HOMECOMING

★ Uniform Weevil Control Dates Set For July 1st-9th

Mr. Wilbur Gruben, entomologist with the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association, and Sammy B. White, spokesman for the local committee, advised the Herald to issue the following statement to all cotton growers of the area:

Mr. Gruben talked with Dr. J. C. Gaines, head entomologist of the Texas University and the Extension Service at Texas A&M by phone this week, and Dr. Gaines stated that if weevils are present in the area, they are out of hibernation and in the cotton. Field reports this week verify this statement to be correct as fields with one-third grown squares are showing numerous signs of weevil grubs.

After checking in the area on Tuesday, the executive committee unanimously agreed to set a uniform spraying date ranging from July 1st to the 9th.

According to these men, if spray and a ground rig is used, the cotton should receive one pint of heptachlor per acre. If dust is used, one should use about 10 to 12 pounds of heptachlor, or two and one-half heptachlor—40 per cent sulphur. The men are working very hard in order to have planes available and sufficient ground rigs to do the job. They also said that this control program would do double duty, as it would kill the flea-hopper infestation as well as the weevil.

Knox County Hospital OK'd For Medicare, Miss Sanders Reports

Miss Beulah Sanders, administrator of the Knox County Hospital, was notified in a letter dated June 20, that the Knox County Hospital agreed for participation as a hospital under the Health Insurance Benefit program for the aged (Title XVIII of the Social Security Act) had been accepted by the Social Security Administration.

Local arrangements for the beginning of Medicare are just about completed. Edwin S. Draughon, Social Security district manager, who has been keeping track of progress in getting the new program of health insurance for the aged into operation, said today that all steps possible have been taken to insure the program's smooth start.

Hospitals in the area are ready for some increase in the number of over-65 patients, but a great increase is not expected.

It appears all hospitals in the five-county area serviced by the Vernon Social Security office will be certified eligible to participate in the Medicare program. They have been surveyed by the Texas State Agency and found to meet the standards for participation in Medicare. They have also been found by the Public Health Service to be in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

All participating Medicare hospitals have been sent copies of Hospital Manual with the admission and billing procedures under Medicare. Admitting a Medicare beneficiary will be like admitting a patient covered by Blue Cross or a private health insurance policy, Mr. Draughon said. The patient will be asked to show the health insurance identification card sent to him in the mail.

The Blue Cross organization which has been selected to receive and pay bills under the hospital insurance part of Medicare, will then check with the Social Security Administration and notify the hospital as to: 1. the patient's eligibility; 2. the number of hospital days he has remaining of the 90 days covered in each spell of illness; and 3. whether or not he has met the \$40 deductible that is payable by the patient toward the hospital bills for each spell of illness. This check of Social Security's central records will ordinarily take no more than 48 hours. For older people who are in

the hospital between June 30 and the end of the year, Medicare will pay hospital costs over and above the first \$40 of services provided July 1, or later.

Costs over the \$40 deductible are covered for a stay of 60 days or less. If the older person stays in the hospital for more than 60 days, Medicare will pay all but \$10 a day for an additional 30 days.

Both the basic hospital insurance part of Medicare and the voluntary program of medical insurance go into effect on Friday, July 1, 1966, Mr. Draughon said. However, payment for post-hospital extended care in skilled nursing homes will not become payable until January 1, 1967.

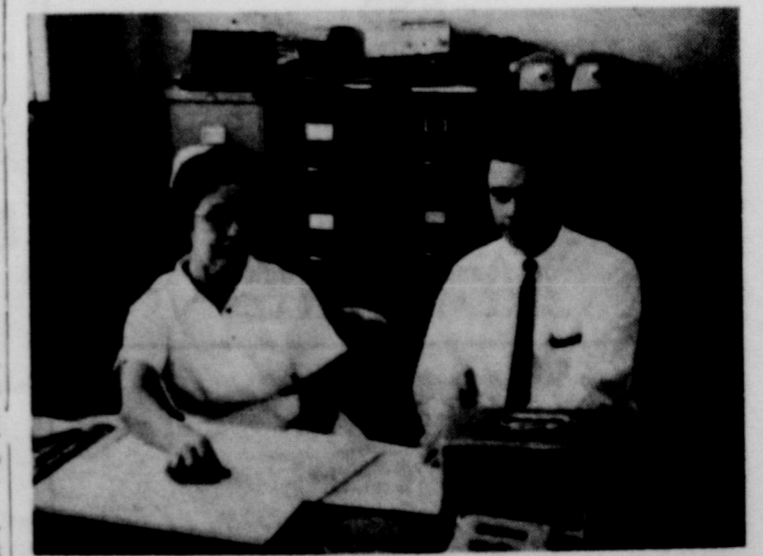
