

**S State Senate Pays Tribute To Paul Rios Jr.**

The Senate of the Texas paid tribute to Paul Rios Jr., February 17, 1971, in memory of Specialist Paul Rios, Jr., of the Texas National Guard. The honor was paid in resolution number 100, introduced by Senator Charles W. Vernon, who stated that the soldier had lost his life serving in Vietnam, 1968. Specialist Rios "His life in noble cause, the concepts and ideals he held dear to his fellow Americans and Texans."

Paul Rios, Jr., had been a lifelong citizen of Knox City and had attended school in the community. He had been a lifelong member of the Catholic Church. The resolution which eulogized Specialist Rios as "a valiant Texan" expressed sincere sorrow to his family, and was presented "as a symbol of the respect and admiration of the Senate of Texas".



## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJ)

Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

Section 2. The proposed amendment submitted to a qualified electorate at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, where the ballots shall be provided for voting against the proposed constitutional amendment, that the Governor shall receive a name

of the number of votes cast at said election, against said amendment, if more than one-half the number of votes cast for and against them; and if it did not receive a name

of the number of votes cast for and against them, the said amendment shall be rejected.

Section 3. The proposed amendment shall be rejected if it does not receive a name






