

News Interviews Rogers On Location

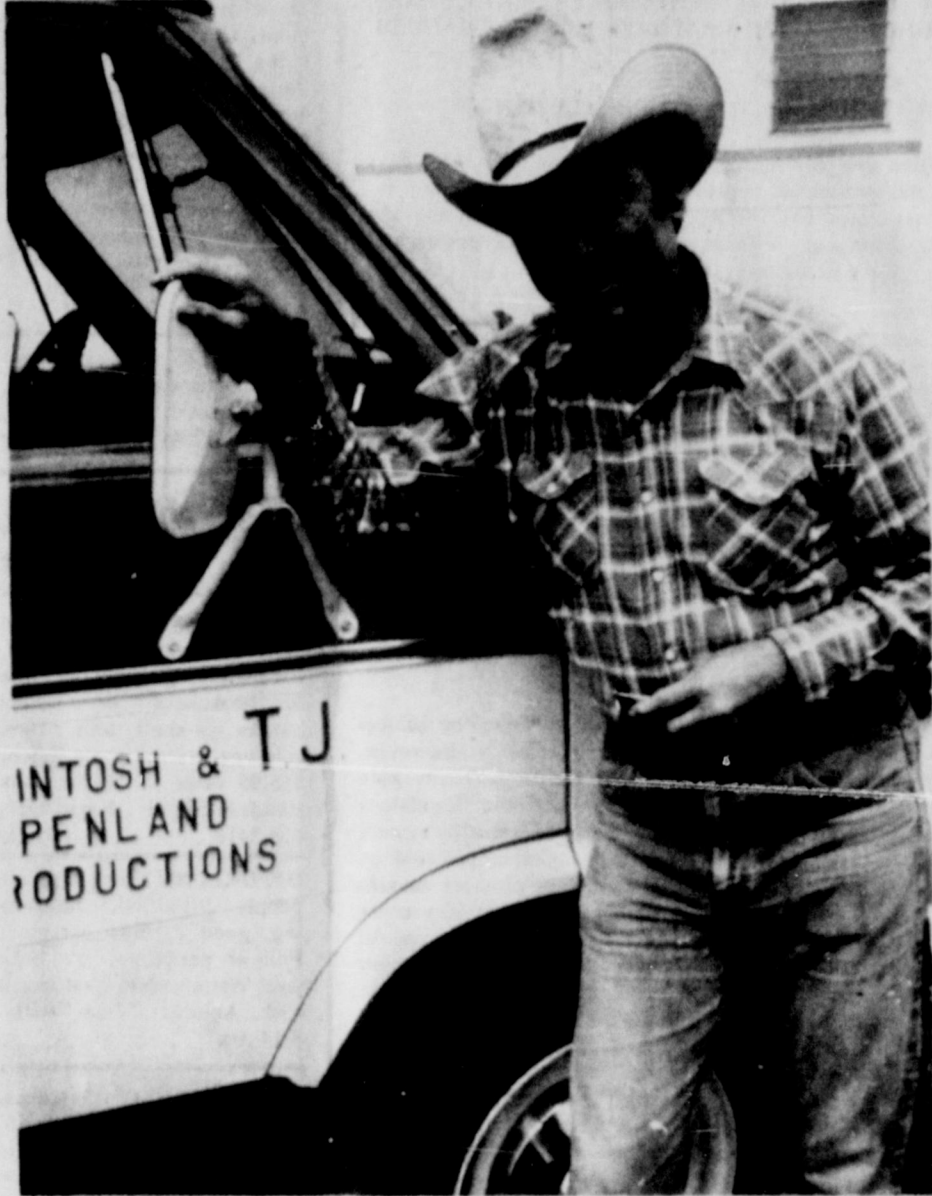
Being longtime fans of Roy Rogers and his wife, Dale Evans, we were very excited several months ago to read that the movie was to be filmed on the famed 6666 Ranch at Guthrie and the also famous Pitchfork Ranch between Guthrie and Dickens.

We had hoped that sometime before the filming was complete that we would be able to visit the star who once reigned as "King of the Cowboys" and the cast on location and get pictures and interviews.

Last Tuesday night, after 6666 Ranch manager J.J. Gibson told us that he could arrange for the pictures and interviews, we came back to the office and worked several hours in order that we could take off for the 6666 Ranch early Wednesday morning. Mr. Gibson said that the crew would begin arriving about 9:00 a.m. but filming would not begin until 10:00. That particular morning, the filming was to take place about five and one-half miles south and two miles east of Guthrie.

As we approached the highway junction, we saw several vehicles, associated with the production, go by so we followed them to the pasture gate. Here we presented our credentials and were told to wait for the chartered bus carrying the cast members and crew from Lubbock. They came along shortly, and we made our way behind the bus over the narrow winding road through the pasture until we came to the location. We stopped at a water tank and a windmill with corrals nearby. The terrain sloped gradually all around the water tank and formed a perfect backdrop for the 500 head of white face cattle that were waiting to appear in the scene they were preparing to shoot.

It was suggested that we park near the white van, as this was the first stop for the actors. We soon found that the huge, white van housed five dressing rooms, the makeup room, and rest rooms. Driver of the van, friendly Bill Gibson of North Hollywood, California, explained that the paneled, carpeted dressing rooms were quite "plush" for the location. The van is private equipment, leased to the company, and sometimes Mr. Gibson is away on location from one to three months at a time. He has been in the business 11 years and has worked with many of the actors before. He told us that Fox is fixing to begin filming "The Buddy Holly Story" in Lubbock within a few weeks and that it is

Schools To Begin Friday

Summer vacation is coming to a halt for area school children with classes scheduled to begin Friday in Benjamin, O'Brien, and Knox City.

The fall school term for students and teachers in the Knox City Independent Schools begins Friday morning (tomorrow) at 8:25 and will dismiss at 3:50 p.m., according to W.R. (Bill) Baker, superintendent.

Students in grades K through 8 will not pre-register but high school students will register Thursday afternoon at the following time: 1:00-1:45, Seniors; 1:45-2:30, Juniors; 2:30-3:15, Sophomores; 3:15-4:00, Freshmen.

Friday will be a regular school day with buses running, lunch served (no breakfast served the first day only), desks assigned, and books passed out.

Children enrolling in Kindergarten need to bring their birth certificate, an immunization record from the family doctor, and be accompanied by one parent or adult guardian.

Lunch prices will remain the same as last year: 70 cents for adults, 50 cents for grades

5-12, and 45 cents for K-4. Breakfast will be 30 cents for adults and 20 cents for students.

Carney Independent School District will begin classes Friday morning at 8:30 o'clock, according to Ed Whitely, superintendent. The buses will run their usual routes and the cafeteria will be in operation.

On Thursday (today) at 9:00 o'clock all students will register and Mr. Whitely stated it was very important that all students be there.

Students enrolling for the first time in O'Brien are asked to bring a copy of their birth certificate and immunization record, Mr. Whitely said.

Buses To Lubbock For Graham Crusade

Persons in the community who are interested in riding a chartered bus to Lubbock for the Billy Graham Crusade, scheduled in Jones Stadium August 31 through September 7, should contact the Rev. Paul Anderson or call the First Baptist Church office no later than Monday, August 25.

There is no charge for stadium seats, but those who would like to sit as a delegation from Knox City need to contact the church office for advance tickets assuring them of more desirable seats. Mr. Anderson explained. Also groups of twenty persons will be seated together and need to be there 30 minutes before the service begins.

A minimum of 38 persons is needed to charter a bus, but the buses will accommodate as many as 47 passengers. If there should be more than 47 who desire to ride the bus, another will be secured if the demand arises, he said. However, as the transportation charges will be equally divided, it will not be known what they will cost until they know how many persons are going to go by bus.

Mr. Anderson emphasized that the entire community is invited to ride the chartered bus and it is not limited to Baptists.

Next, we met the very personable Bob Westmoreland of Los Angeles who is makeup man for the production and incidentally also plays the role of the sheriff in the movie. Westmoreland hails from North Hollywood, also, and has been in the

After working with that for two years, he was typed, he said, as a serviceman and it was then that he decided to go into makeup. Water Recorder In Operation In Area

Two recorders to measure groundwater levels are in operation in Knox and Haskell Counties according to Ridge Kaiser, a hydrologist with the Rollin W. Harden consulting firm of Austin.

The instruments are used to record changes continuously in the underground water table, and have been installed as a part of an overall investigation of the waters in the Seymour Formation in those two counties. The project is sponsored by the Texas Water Quality Board and the recorders, which will be in operation for up to two years, were provided and installed by the Texas Water Development Board.

One is located 2 1/2 miles northeast of Munday on the Helen McClure property, farmed by Clarence Brown. The other is 1/2 mile east of Rochester on the Speck property farmed by Earl Alvis.

Information provided by the recorders to date show that the water table at the Munday site is unchanged over the past six weeks, while the water table at Rochester has risen more than 3 1/2 feet.

Hydrologists will use the recorders to determine seasonal fluctuations, help estimate recharge and measure effects of pumping from the underground aquifer.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF O'BRIEN, HASKELL COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'BRIEN:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of O'Brien by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

- First 1000 Cu. Ft. or Fraction Thereof \$3.1277 Gross; \$2.8149 Net.
- Next 3 000 Cu. Ft. at \$1.9388 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.7449 Per Mcf Net.
- Next 6 000 Cu. Ft. at \$1.8166 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.6349 Per Mcf Net.
- Next 15 000 Cu. Ft. at \$1.7277 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.5549 Per Mcf Net.
- Next 75 000 Cu. Ft. at \$1.6610 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4949 Per Mcf Net.
- Over 100 000 Cu. Ft. at \$1.6277 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4649 Per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period, except that where customer's only use for gas service is in an outdoor grill and/or a fireplace starter, the amount shown for the first consumption block shall constitute a minimum monthly bill.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the \$1.0399 per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1975, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given.

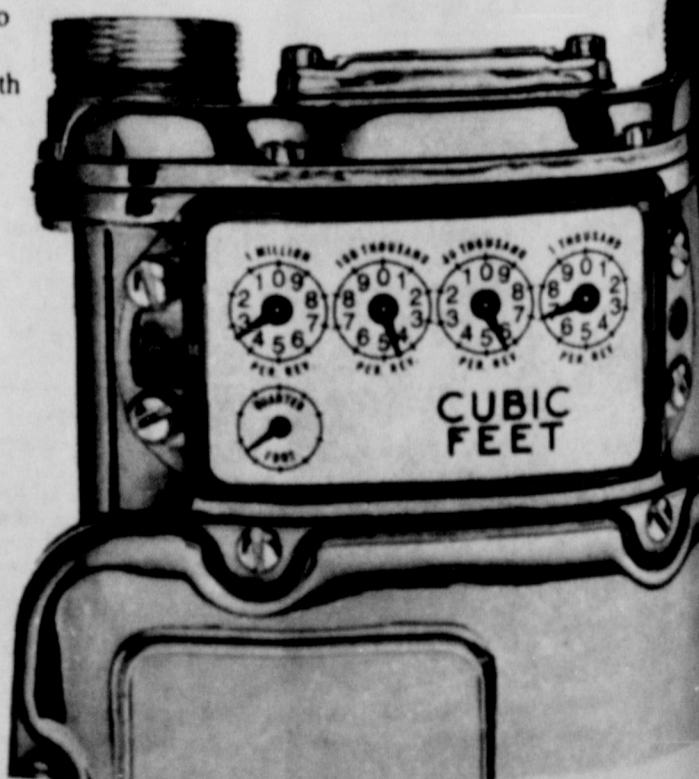

After all, this is the first opportunity we have had such as this, and we hope that in our attempt at putting all this together, we have shared a part of the pleasure we had.

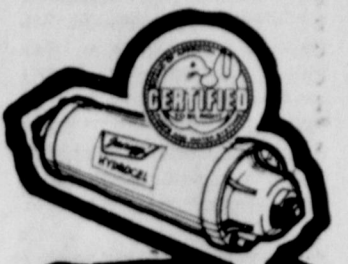

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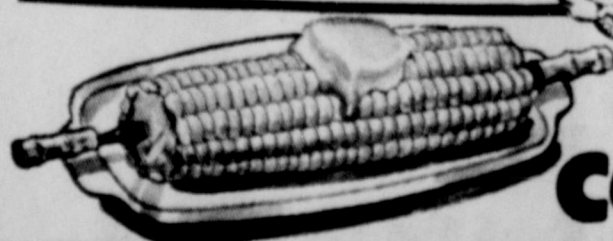


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
