There are more than three hundred Thousand cripples in the United States, according to a census carefully made by the Warm Springs Foundation. Of these, more than half, or above 150,000, are victims of the disease which doctors calf "anterior poliomyclitis" but which is popularly termed infantile paralysis.

The way toward health which President Rooseveltt found at Warm Springs, Georgia, can be opened to every infantile paralysis in America, if the plan of the Warm Springs Foundation is successful. This month, on January 30th, Mr. Roosevelt's birthday, there are to be held in 5,000 communities parties or dances to which an admission fee will be charged, the proceeds to be used to establish centers miliar to that at Warm Springs, where treatmnt and training can be given, free of cost to those who cannot pay to every sufferer from this disease. At the same time, the fund so raised will help toward finding ways to prevent the spread of infantile

We cannot think of a more noble charity. We hope that our own community will participate in this "Birthday Ball for the President. Will Knox City do her part for such a noble cause? We hope so

> "The size of my hotbed was determined by a large window glass that we had on hand and wanted to use as a cover for the bed. This glass is 4 by 8 feet. The frame for the bed is made of new lumber." "We we just as well use good material." stated Mrs. Warren who believes that the \$3.00 or less that is invested in the lumber will make it possible to raise all the plants they need and then have fresh green vegetables during the winter months.

In sowing the seed in the hotbed it is best to sow them in rows b cause a better stand is usually obtained. Rows are spaced 2 or 3 inos apart and seed planted 4 to 5 to the inch and covered with onefourth inch of soil after which the entire bed is lightly sprinkled with warm water. Before any planting is done, however, an even temperature as nearly uniform as possible should be obtained. For plants such as cabbage, lettuce and onions a day temperature of 50 to 70 degrees is best, whereas for later vegetables, as tomates or pepper the day temperature should b 60 to 75 degrees.
