## Water Authority Advertising For Bids

As will be noted in this week's News, the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority's advertisements for bids were let on the scheduled date of March 22, and the advertisements for bids for five contracts appear elsewhere in this issue.

Contract III is for the construction of water supply lines.

Contract IV is for the pump station construction.

Contract V is for furnishing vertical turbine pumping units, and

Contract VI is for furnishing and erecting steel ground storage tanks.

Pete Boecher, general manager for the Authority, explained that contract II for the filter plant is now being finalized by the Authority's engineers and the Texas Water Quality Board.

## Local Men Attend COG Housing Study

Jim Ross, a director in the West Central Texas Council of Governments Housing Committee, accompanied by Mayor Buddy Angle, were in Abilene last Thursday to attend the second meeting of the housing committee has held since it was formed.

Committee chairman Wayne Austin presided and Mrs. Jon Shamburger, executive director of the Colorado City Community Action program, was elected vice chairman.

Larry Crumpton of the housing section of the Texas Department of Community Affairs, said both the COG staff and members of the housing committee have shown great enthusiasm in developing a housing program. He was impressed by the number attending Thursday's meeting.

The proposed study will be done in each region of the state to determine the housing needs of each area before the state moves into an overall housing program. However, before funds are made available for all regional studies, one region will be chosen to implement a study so that state and federal officials can determine how the program will work.

The West Central Texas Region has a good chance of being selected for a pilot regional housing study, officials said.

## Houndettes Will Host Track Relays Friday

The Houndettes will be hosting the Knox City Girls' Relays here this Friday, March 24, with prelims beginning at 9:30 a.m. and finals starting at 1:30 p.m.

Coach T.R. Stillabower stated that there will be twenty-one schools competing in the meet with some of the schools coming as far as Cisco and Newark, which is near Fort Worth.

There will be a coaches' meeting in the field house beginning at 8:30 a.m. for all team coaches.

All junior high events will immediately follow the high school events.

Preliminary running events will begin at 9:30 with the 440 yard relay, followed by the 60 yard dash beginning at 9:45 a.m. The next running event will be the 80 yard hurdles at 10:00 a.m., then the 100 yard dash at 10:20, and the 220 yard dash will begin at 11:00 a.m. Lunch break will be from 11:20 a.m. until the finals start at 1:30 p.m.

The 440 yard relay is scheduled at 2:00, 440 yd. dash at 2:10, 220 yd. dash at 2:20 the 60 yd. dash at 2:30, and the 80 yard hurdles at 2:40.

The 880 yd. relay will begin at 3:50, the 880 yd. dash at 3:10 and the mile relay will wind things up at 3:20.

Field events will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the shot put, followed by the discus, high jump, broad jump and triple jump.

Coach Stillabower said that he would like to invite everyone to the girls' track meet and to ask anyone who would like to help with the meet to come on down to the field as all help would be greatly appreciated.

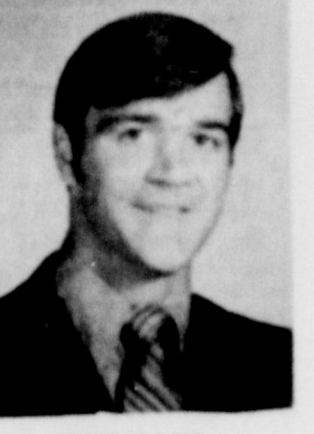

Knox City welcomes these new residents.

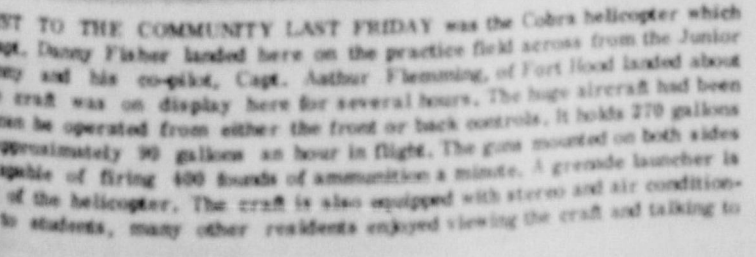
## Cancer Crusade Plans Are Made

FIRST TO THE COMMUNITY LAST FRIDAY was the Cobra helicopter which Capt. Danny Fisher landed here on the practice field across from the Junior High School. Capt. Fisher and his co-pilot, Capt. Arthur Flemming, of Fort Hood landed about the craft was on display here for several hours. The huge aircraft had been built and can be operated from either the front or back controls. It holds 270 gallons of fuel and approximately 90 gallons an hour in flight. The guns mounted on both sides are capable of firing 400 rounds of ammunition a minute. ## Grass Essential To Livestock Industry

Just as food crops are essential to the world's human population, grass is essential to the Texas livestock industry, to its wildlife, and to the entire Texas economy. It has been estimated that grass furnishes over eighty per cent of all cattle feed in the state. Many of the cattle in Knox County will be raised and sold as stockers or feeders and will have been grown almost entirely on our grasslands.

We can readily see the importance of good sound grassland management programs which may consist of weed and brush control, fertilization (for improved pastures), and proper grazing use is perhaps the most abused phase of grassland management in the state.

In defining proper use we find that it is the amount of grazing that a plant can stand without

If we were to analyze a sample of soil we would find minerals such as nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and several others. These elements are "raw materials". When water is available and temperatures are favorable, the plant absorbs these minerals and water through its roots. It then moves them up into its leaves where, with energy furnished by the sun, these raw materials are combined with air and manufactured into food. Actually, about 95 per cent of the total plant growth comes from carbon and other elements which the plant take from the air. The above ground, or green part of the plant, then is the "food factory". This being the only place where food for plant growth is actually manufactured.

What happens to the food manufactured in the plant leaves? A part of it goes back into the roots, here it feeds the roots so they can grow larger. Much of the food is used and perennial grass plants replace about half their roots each year. Part of the manufactured food is used for growing more leaves to increase the size of the "food factory". Part is used to produce stems and seed in order for the plant to reproduce itself. In addition, a part of the food manufactured is returned to the plant roots in the form of stored food.

The stored food in the roots is used to keep the plant alive during winter, or other non-growing periods. This is also the food the plant uses to start growth in the spring. At this time, there is no "food factory" or green leaves in order

## Texas Highway Program Includes Work in County

The Texas Highway Commission on March 1, 1972, approved a \$240 million, two-year program for the development of almost two thousand miles of Texas highways.

The 1973-74 Consolidated Highway Program calls for construction of 1,186 miles of highway facilities and the state's portion of right of way costs on 810 miles.

The program includes both new work and additional finance for work previously authorized.

V.J. McGee, district engineer of Highways, announced that way Program is a project on St. Highway 283 in Knox County, extending from F.M. Road 1756 near Truscott, south 4.2 miles at an estimated state cost of \$350,000, for construction and \$10,000, for right of way.


Also included in this program are state funds in the amount of \$11,000, to cover the purchase of right of way and relocation assistance on State Highway 283, extending from the Ford County line, south to F.M. 1756 near Truscott, Knox County.

These right of way funds will permit the Highway Department to prepare right of way maps and preliminary plans for the reconstruction of this section of State Highway 283. Construction funds for this section will be approved on some future highway program.

Additional funds in the amount of \$160,000 were also approved for the reconstruction of State Highway 283 from Benjamin north 7.6 miles. \$700,000 had previously been programmed on the 1971 State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for this construction. Work on these projects will be under the supervision of George R. Wall, supervising resident engineer Monday.

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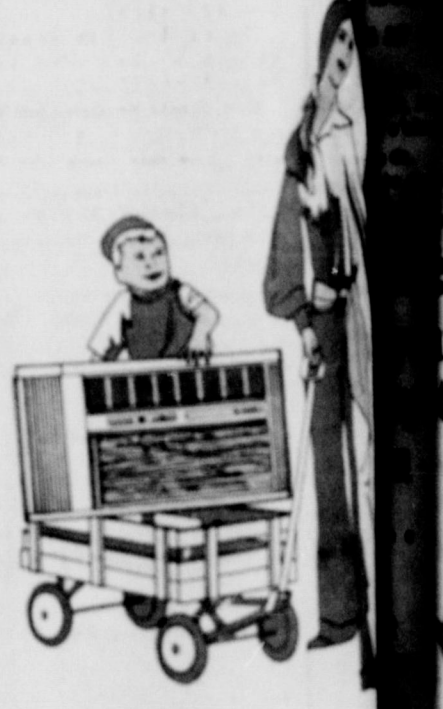

# Lighting Fixtures Can Be Jewelry For Your Home

"Lighting fixtures and lamps can be jewelry for your home," said Mrs. Elaine Carmichael, Extension County Home Demonstration Agent. She added that lighting can give a feeling of elegance to a room, as well as be functional.

"With the almost array of lighting fixtures and systems, it's possible to capture almost any mood with illumination," Mrs. Carmichael declared.

According to her, consumers may choose from two broad classes of fixtures—the decorative and the functional. "Many may be classified as both. A purely functional light draws little attention to itself. Its major use is to provide light for a particular purpose. Generally, it adds little or nothing to a decorative scheme except the light itself."

"The fashion fixture's major purpose, however, may be to add to a room's decor. The fixture and the light it produces will add a flourish and a sparkle to your furnishings, but will give little or no functional light. The average homemaker must recognize this feature and realize it won't serve a purpose for which it was not designed," Mrs. Carmichael said that people too often forget the main function of a lighting fixture is to provide useful light. "Some allow themselves to be carried away with decorative appeal, or cut corners in cost," she claimed. "They sometimes wind up with a distracting glare."

"Cost is important," the agent said. "Manufacturers realize that and make large selections of fixtures in all price ranges. So homemakers have little excuse for buying poor lighting fixtures."

Besides cost, Mrs. Carmichael said that the consumer should consider four factors when shopping for lighting fixtures:

1. Make sure the fixture will provide enough light where it's needed. It should be free from distracting glare or gleam.
2. Consider its suitability for room decor. It should harmonize with other furnishings.
3. See that it's easy to clean and maintain. Dirt and dust can cut light by as much as 50 per cent.
4. Make sure it carries the Underwriters Laboratory seal. The seal insures that the fixture has been manufactured in compliance with the National safety.

Mrs. Carmichael reminded homemakers to select lighting fixtures according to their functional, as well as aesthetic, values.

A simple rule to keep in mind as you shop for table lamps: table height plus lamp base height to the lower edge of shade should equal the height of the person using the lamp.

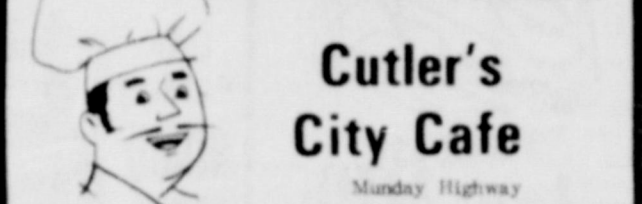

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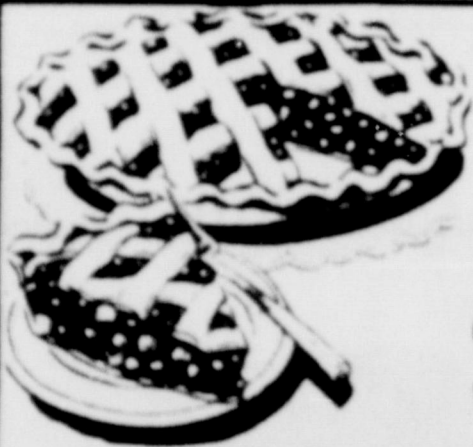

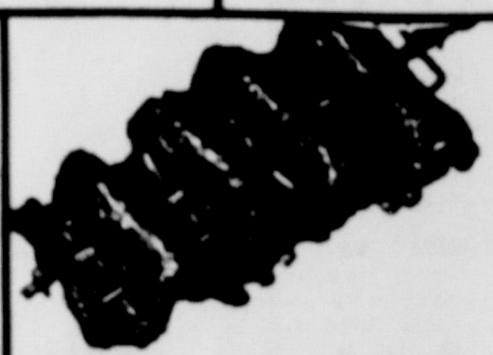

# Farm and Ranch News

PLAN FERTILIZER NEEDS

Fertilizer should be ordered early to insure having the correct type and amount.

The fertilizer supply for the 1972 crop year looks good at the moment, however, demand for it is at an all time high. Although the supply is good, difficulty arises in getting the fertilizer to the farmer when he needs it.

Contact should be made to take advantage of discounts on early ordered supplies. Bulk fertilizer should be ordered early, even though delivery is usually made to the field at the time of its use.

When storing early-ordered fertilizer, be sure to give it room to breathe. Leave air space between each stack of bags.

Always store fertilizers in a dry place. Don't lay bags on a concrete floor because they'll pick up moisture, get lumpy and cake up. It's a good idea not to stack fertilizer more than eight bags high.

Keep fertilizer and animals separated. Fertilizer is food for plants; to animals it would be disastrous.

It's just good business to figure how much fertilizer

you'll need for the coming crop season and to order it all right away.

Soil tests are important for finding out the proper types and amounts of fertilizer needed. Soil mailing boxes and information sheets may be obtained without cost from the county Extension agent's office in Benjamin. Soil test samples may also be carried to the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory in Seymour instead of mailing.

SMALL GRAIN INSECTS

Greenbug and winter grain aphid numbers in wheat fields have been increasing in some fields the last two to three weeks. A few control applications have been made during this time.

The insect numbers have had a wide variation being moderate in some places and heavy in other locations. Producers are encouraged to make regular observations of individual fields to decide if control applications should be made.

Copies of MP-399, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghums and Small Grains are available at the county Extension office in Benjamin.

TREATMENT FOR NEMATODES IN GARDENS

Home gardeners complain each year about root knot nematodes in their tomatoes,okra, beans, and other vegetable crops. These microscopic worms may be the reason for stinky plants that do not respond to fertilizer or water. Nematode presence can be recognized by balls and knots on plant roots.

If nematodes have been a problem in the past, treat your garden this spring before planting.

The most widely used chemical for nematode control contains dibromochloropropane (DBCP). It is available at nurseries and farm supply stores.

No special equipment is necessary for treating home gardens. Liquid materials can be applied with a quart fruit jar with a ten-penny nail hole punched on each side of the lid—one to pour from and the other to let air into the jar so the liquid will pour evenly. This jar can be used to pour the proper amount of fumigant diluted with water, kerosene, or fuel oil into each 100 feet of open furrow at least six inches deep.

Granular DBCP can be sprinkled by hand, using rubber gloves—into the open furrow. In either case, cover the treated furrow immediately to prevent chemical vapors from escaping into the air.

Row treatment is made by placing the fumigant in a six-inch deep furrow directly under seed rows or transplant rows.

Broadcast treatment can be made by opening a six-inch deep furrow using a hoe, spade or other implement. Furrows should be no more than twelve inches apart from center to center. A broadcast treatment is much more effective than row treatment; however, more fumigant and expense is involved.
