Col. Fisher explained that the benefits from any dam built by the Corps for flood control must equal or exceed the cost of the dam over a period of fifty years. He indicated that since there are no large cities involved in Brazos for flood control might not be ap proved.

Harry Burleigh, who has done extensive survey work in this area for what was known as the Bob Baskin Dam project, explained that a dam built by the Bureau of Reclamation for irrigation purposes must be paid for over a period of 40 or 50 years. money, he said, must actually be paid back by those using the water, which is not the case in a flood control project. The Bob Baskin project, which would cost approximately 26 million dollars, is not considered feasible by this

The possibility of including both flood control and irrigation features in a dam was discussed, and it was agreed that such a combined project might be feasible.






