The Knox City Greyhounds went scoreless for three periods, but broke loose in the final period to defeat the Moran Bulldogs Friday night 22-0.

The victory left Knox City with five wins against no losses so far this season, a record second only to Lueders in District 7-B. Lueders has won six with no losses and no ties. Defending champion Rochester has won four and lost one; Aspermont has a record of three wins, two losses and one tie; and Rule has won one and lost four.

This week the district season will be opened by Rochester and Aspermont at Rochester, and by Lueders and Rule at Rule. Lueders has an open date, while the Greyhounds will be hosts to the Strawn Greyhounds in a non-district game.

The Strawn boys have won two and lost two this season. Last week they lost to Woodson 0-19, and the previous week they suffered a 0-49 defeat at the hands of South Taylor. The Knox City-Strawn game will begin at 7:30 p.m. tomorrow (Friday) night on the local field.

In last Friday night's game Fullback Cecil Beauchamp crashed through from the ten, ending a 40-yard scoring drive. Quarterback Don Corley passed to End Ross Lankford for the extra point. Minutes later, Corley got a touchdown

New Plymouths On Display Friday

The 1956 Plymouth will go on display at Egenbacher Motors tomorrow (Friday) according to Erwin Egenbacher, owner.

The new Plymouth will feature substantial style changes, higher power output and an inch longer overall length, Egenbacher said. Its completely new engine will be the powerful H-Fire V-8 with a polysphere combustion chamber design, a 277 inch displacement and an eight to one compression ratio.

The new model will have upswept rear fenders. New features include safety door latches and redesigned instrument panels with ammeter and oil gauges replaced by red flasher lights.

Optional equipment includes the Chrysler-developed push-button gearshift for automatic transmissions.

WTCC Holding Meetings to Protest Cotton Acreage Cut

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is holding a series of meetings this week to discuss the proposed 260,000 acre slash in the area's 1956 cotton acreage allotment, Loyal Walker, manager of the agriculture and livestock department, announced.

The first meeting was held in Haskell at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, and the second was to be held at 10:30 today (Thursday) in Plainview. Another meeting will be held tomorrow (Friday) morning in Big Spring.

At each meeting Walker and Fred Husbands, WTCC executive vice president, were to present facts about the proposed program to farmers, ginners and other interested persons. They were to outline the loss each county will sustain under the program now under study by the State Agricultural Stabilization Committee.

The proposed program is based upon an estimate of a reduction in the state allotment of 200,000 acres in 1956.

Walker said if the program is not changed, it will mean the entire 1956 cut will be made in West Texas and Southwest Texas counties, plus a further cut of about 100,000 acres.

This is being done, he said, to give East Texas and Central Texas counties an increase of approximately 110,000 acres more than allotments made to them in 1956.

Plans for Dam on Brazos River Discussed at Meeting Wednesday

Plans for a dam on the Brazos River—long sought by many area civic leaders—were revived at a meeting in the American Legion Hall here Wednesday, attended by law makers, water officials and 90 representatives of about twenty area towns. Those present included the county judges of nine counties.

Prior to the meeting which was arranged by B. B. Campbell, local banker, and W. L. Collins, Board of Commerce secretary, a tour of several farms damaged recently by Brazos River floods was made by a group including Congressman Frank Ikard, Congressman George Mahon of the 19th district, Col. Harry O. Fisher, Ft. Worth, dis-

trict engineer for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, and Harry Burleigh, engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation.

At the meeting, Mr. Campbell introduced Congressman Ikard, who served as moderator for the round-table discussion.

Col. Fisher told the group that any work done by the Corps of Engineers would have to be initiated by local citizens. A preliminary survey must be ordered by Congress, and funds for the survey appropriated by Congress. Such a survey, he said, might take two or three years.

Congressmen Ikard and Mahon said they would try to secure approval and funds for the survey

during the next session of Congress.

Col. Fisher explained that the benefits from any dam built by the Corps for flood control must equal or exceed the cost of the dam over a period of fifty years. He indicated that since there are no large cities involved in Brazos floods in this area, a dam solely for flood control might not be approved.

Harry Burleigh, who has done extensive survey work in this area for what was known as the Bob Baskin Dam project, explained that a dam built by the Bureau of Reclamation for irrigation purposes must be paid for over a period of 40 or 50 years. This money, he said, must actually be paid back by those using the water, which is not the case in a flood control project. The Bob Baskin project, which would cost approximately 26 million dollars, is not considered feasible by this bureau, he said.

The possibility of including both flood control and irrigation features in a dam was discussed, and it was agreed that such a combined project might be feasible.

Burleigh explained that the Bob Baskin dam site would not be suitable for a project including flood control, and that another location would have to be found. Present plans tentatively place the dam seven miles southwest of Rochester, or about 14 miles southwest of Knox City.

Ikard and Mahon, as well as State Senator George Moffett, urged the group to keep working for a dam, explaining that it might be years before their hopes were realized.

A committee headed by S. N. Reed, was named to continue work on the project. Members named Wednesday were Tom Craddock, Seymour; L. B. Patterson, Munday; Byrd Thorp, Throckmorton; Henry Smith, Weinert; N. E. Springer, Aspermont; Courtney Hunt, Haskell; B. B. Campbell, Knox City; Orb Coffman, Goree; and Felix Mullino, Rochester. Representatives of other area towns will be named later.

W. L. Collins is secretary of the committee.

Following the meeting regarding the dam, the county judges present and other representatives of nine area counties met with E. V. Hardwick of Dallas, special consultant for the Civil Defense Administration.

The group discussed the availability of funds for relief of flood damage to tax-supported institutions, and planned a survey of the damage along the Brazos.

The committee is organized to provide immediate assistance to those in need of emergency aid. There is no red tape, no waiting. All cases are handled on the local level, and all funds are expended through the local treasurer. Committee members serve without any pay other than the satisfaction of carrying on a humanitarian program.

Mr. White states that a campaign is being conducted today and Friday to help support the work of the Salvation Army both at home and throughout Texas. He asks for the generosity of the people in Knox County during this campaign for funds. This will be the only time during the year that our people will be called on to support the Salvation Army as there will be no tamborine solicitation made here in the future.

All money received in the campaign launched today will be turned over to the local treasurer to be prorated for local and statewide use. The state agencies of the Salvation Army which receive a portion of the funds, offer services which the local committee may use at any time they are needed. These agencies include Disaster Relief Work, a home for unmarried mothers, evangeline homes, men's social service centers, and a summer camp for boys. The experienced counsel and advice of Salvation Army Officers and Field Representatives of local problems is always available.

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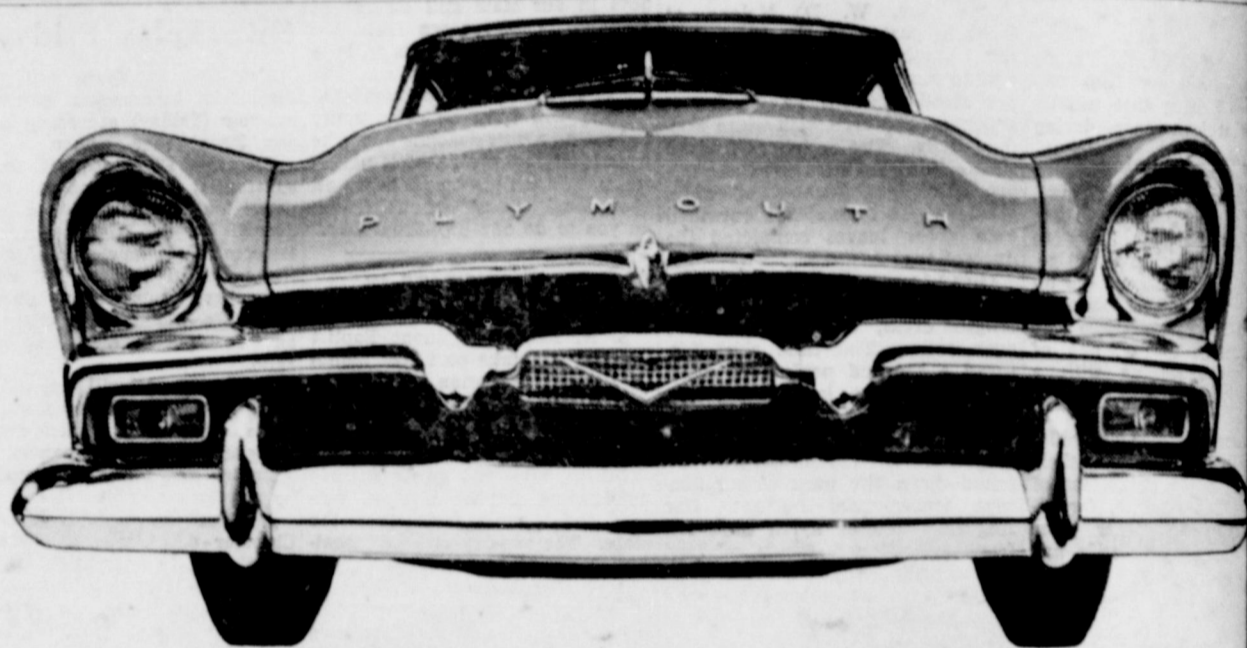
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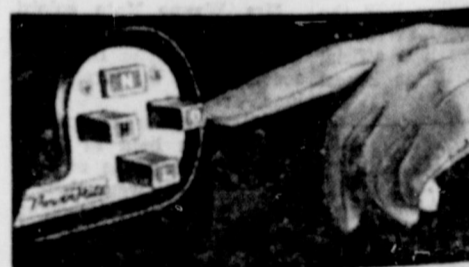

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Farm and Ranch Notes

W. J. BRYAN, County Agent

This year for the first time in many years cotton burrs are being put back on the soil in some parts of the county and with the ASC payment I think farmers who are not carrying their burrs back are missing a very good soil improvement program. Each bale of cotton will produce about 500 pounds of waste, on this basis will produce something like two thousand tons of burrs which would be worth about \$14,000, plus the additional production from organic matter and mulch and water penetration which should amount to at least \$539,000 additional money

for fertilizer expense saved and increased production. This would be about \$674 for each farm in Knox County.

The people in town don't like the burr smoke from the burners, but I think the burrs are too valuable for us to waste. Following are some of their value:

1. Cotton burrs are about equal to a 1-1-1 ration for fertilizer. At present values this is about \$7.00 worth of fertilizer in a ton. To this you can add the value as organic matter and the benefits obtained from moisture-holding capacity being increased in the soil, which is probably more valuable to us than the fertilizer value.
2. Tests at Lubbock have proven that cotton burrs are more valuable to farm land than barn manure.
3. Farmers on the Plains report a 10 per cent increase the first year in lint cotton yields when burrs are applied at 4 tons per acre.
4. The Spur Experiment Station reports a doubling of moisture penetration. When they applied 4 tons of burrs per acre the moisture penetration was 29 inches and on similar soil nearby where no burrs were applied the moisture penetration was only 15 inches.
5. The Spur station also shows an increase of lint cotton per acre of from 13 to 59 pounds per acre.
6. Cotton burrs have almost as much value for cattle feed as cotton seed hulls when fed along with other good quality roughage and meal.

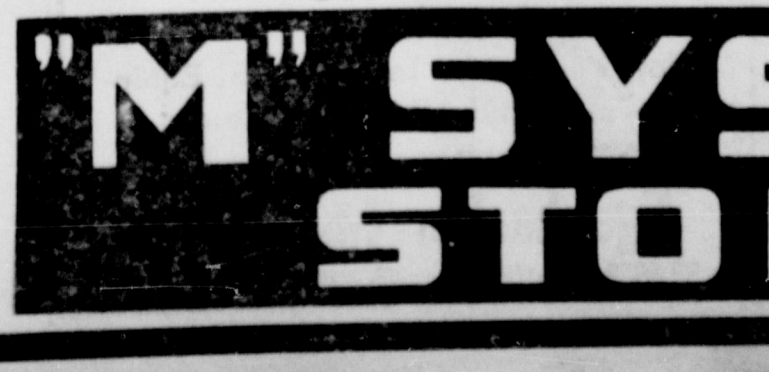

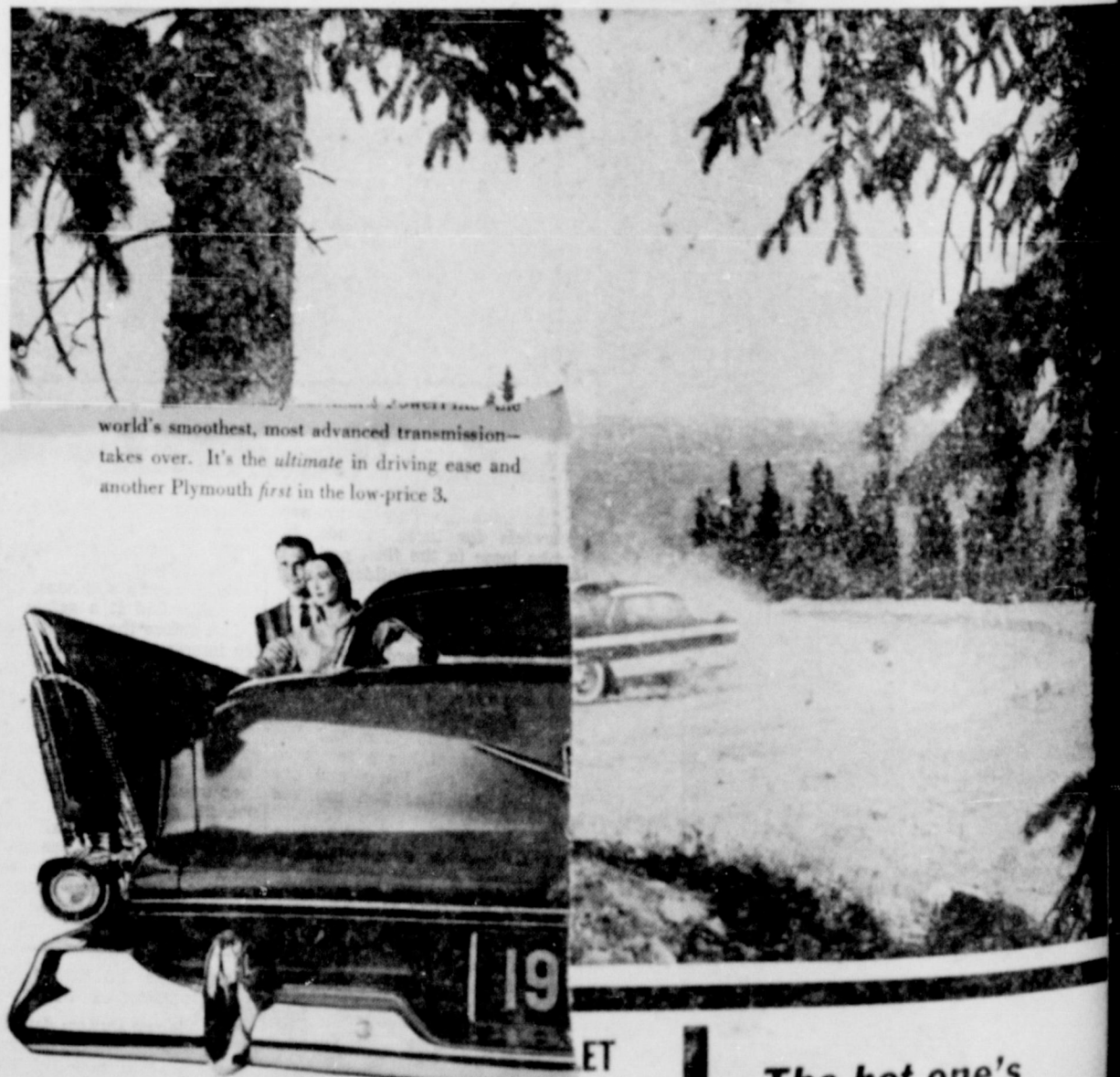
