Perry Browning for State Senator.



Perry Browning, popular County Sheriff, today announced that the majority of the people in his district would support him in the Senate Chamber as the official Representative of the 13rd Senatorial District following the Democratic primary in July.

Browning was elected Sheriff of Knox County for two successive terms with a landslide vote, a record which he has made an announcement to his campaign that business principles govern a public servant.

"No pot laws to be enacted," Browning said, and in this same line I have at no time during my represented any interests which have a bearing upon any kind of proposed legislation which will benefit the detriment of many people and which is opposed by me, and which is a kind of general legislation which will benefit a majority and be to the State as a whole will be of support.

Mr. Isbell was 46 years of age, a bachelor. He was a native of Knox county, being born and reared here. He was an outstanding business man of the county being vice president of the First National Bank in Munday and vice president of the four county, Haskell, Knox, Baylor and Throckmorton counties, bankers association. His passing will be a distinct loss to the county.

Mr. Isbell is survived by two sisters Miss Maude and Miss Fannie Isbell both of Munday, and a numberless crowd of friends. Many Knox City people attended the funeral service of the deceased.

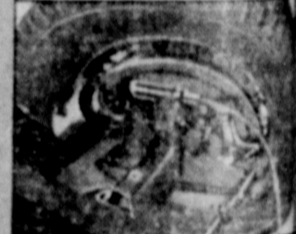
