Seriously disabled people who used to work in employment or self employment covered by social security should get in touch with the social security office by June 30, Erton Tate, social security district manager, announced this week.

Tate pointed out that people who have been totally disabled for 6 months or longer, and who worked in employment or selfemployment covered by the social security law for as many as five years out of the 10 years before they were disabled should get fur-

If the disabled person dies after June 30, the disability freeze can protect his family's rights to survivors payments but only if he had applied for it before death.
