Knight was a popular county commissioner from this precinct for eight years. He did not seek re-election in 1954.

Force, who has shown remarkable improvement in recent weeks, had never cleared more than 11-6 before, according to his coach, Elvin Mathis.

Weinert's speedy Jimmy Reeves won the Class B mile run, setting a new conference record. His time was 4:27.5. Reeves is a junior, and this was his third straight year to win the mile run. He also set the previous record, 4:29.1, in 1954.

Work on Knox City's paving and drainage project has been slowed several days because of the rain, but Bill Ross, partner in Peecos Valley Construction Co., contractors, says paving of residential streets will proceed as soon as the ground is dry enough.

The company has already finished the big drainage ditches north of town, and some curbing, gutter and grading has been done on Austin and Waco streets.

Ross says paving of 5th Street will begin right away, as all property owners on 5th from Central to Brooklyn have signed contracts or indicated that they would sign. Paving on 5th, as well as on several other streets, has been changed from 30 feet to 40 feet at the request of property owners.

Most property owners on 7th St. from Central to midway between Park and Houston have either signed or indicated that they will sign, Ross said.

"Signing of the contracts is the big hold-up," Ross said. "We must eliminate the skips before we can begin on any block, and the work will progress fast when property owners sign the necessary forms."

He urged property owners to visit the firm's office, next door to Hamm's Service Station, rather than waiting to be contacted.

## Social Security Directors Explains Disability Freeze

Seriously disabled people who used to work in employment or self employment covered by social security should get in touch with the social security office by June 30, Erton Tate, social security district manager, announced this week.

Tate pointed out that people who have been totally disabled for 6 months or longer, and who worked in employment or self-employment covered by the social security law for as many as five years out of the 10 years before they were disabled should get further information about this law.

Active military service and employment in the railroad industry may count toward the needed amount of work. By applying to have their social security earnings records frozen, disabled people may prevent loss or reduction of future benefits.

Some people now receiving old age insurance payments or who will become eligible for old age payments in July were disabled for long periods before they reached age 65 and are still disabled. They may start getting larger payments as of July and will get them more promptly if they file an application for a "disability freeze" by June 30. If the disabled person dies after June 30, the disability freeze can protect his family's rights to survivors payments but only if he had applied for it before death. For this reason, it is important for every person who meets the requirements for the "freeze" to apply for it by June 30.

Tate emphasized that the law protects the social security rights of a worker who is suffering from prolonged total disability but does not pay cash benefits to him before he is 65.

The address of the Wichita Falls social security office is 425 Post Office Bldg. If a disabled person is unable to call at the office, he may telephone or someone else may call for him, Tate said.
