



In Texas . . . NEEDY DISABLED MAY NOW BECEIVE STATE AID

Until recently Texas made no provision for taking dare of the needy physically disabled per-sons, other than the needy blind. But now, under a bill passed by the Regular Session of the Fifty-fifth Legislature (HB 78) other disabled persons may obtain pub-lic welfare assistance. To become eligible for assis-

To become eligible for assi-ting the must be disabled through the and for must he need through the must be disabled through the and net at impairment. His condition must be net likely to change, or be

and mental impairment. His condition must be not likely to change, or be progress-ive and not responsive to treat-ment, or require treatment that is continuous, extremely hazar-dous or of questionable benefit. The condition must make him an invalid or necessitate con ider-able help from others in getting about. about.

about. Persons who meet the above requirements are considered to be permanently and totally dis-abled. The same holds true if a person's physical and mental impairment is such that he re-quires close and constant super-vision or personal care by others, or if he is rôt a likely subject for vocational rehabilitation. Needy persons who can thus prove themselves permanently and totally disabled are eligible to receive Public Welfare assis-tance under the following cir-cumstances:

If such applicant is not at the time of receiving assistance an inmate in a public institution (except as a patient in a med-ical institution or is not a pat-lent in an institution for tuber-culosis or mental disease, or has not been diagnosed as having tuberculosis or psychosis and is a patient in a medical institu-tion as a result thereof. 4.
