Survivors include her husband, Jesse; a son, Billy of Bedford; a grandson, David Gilpin of Bedford; and a sister, Mrs. Mildred Dyess of Tyler.

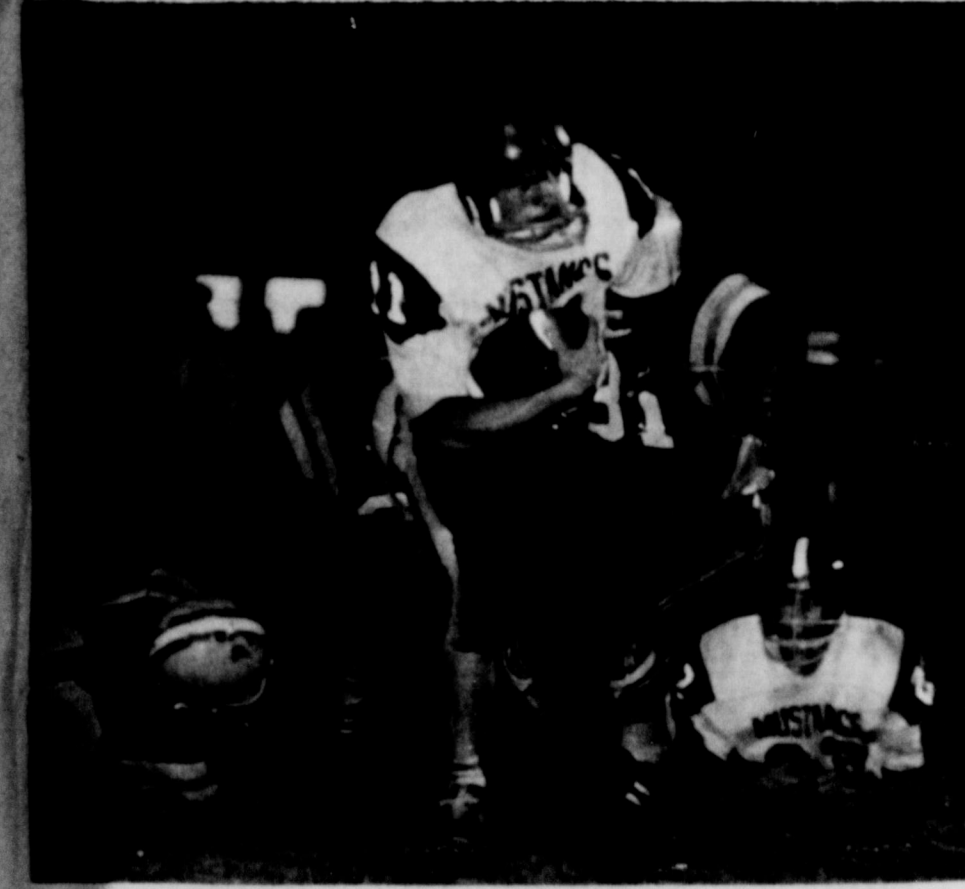

## Mustangs Overcome Bulldogs 70-66

Benjamin Mustangs took more step toward the championship by defeating O'Brien Bulldogs last night. Homecoming defeat was set for the Bulldogs, the reigning state champions. It was a first defeat O'Brien had in two years. Opening quarter found Mustangs trailing the Bulldogs in front 8-0 by 17. Then adding the Mustangs then went against the Bulldog Bryan Bumpas broke a left end for a touchdown play. The joint attempt failed. O'Brien's Keith Conn scored the TD on runs of 17 and 6. Both PATs were good. Bryan Bumpas then on a 26 yard run up the field. Jimmie Pierce added T. Lalo Garcia scored

O'Brien's last touchdown of the quarter on a 45-yard pass from Louis Conn. The PAT failed and the Mustangs found themselves trailing 30-14 at the end of the first quarter. The second quarter found the Mustangs playing a fast game of catch-up football. Keith Conner passed to Ricky Stamps for a 35-yard TD, and Bryan Bumpas swept around right end for a 44-yard score. Jimmie Pierce added both PATs. O'Brien's final score before half came when Louis Conn ran it into the endzone from 1-yard out. Conn also added the extra two. Benjamin began driving the ball toward O'Brien's goal line. The drive was climaxed by an 8-yard pass from Conner to Stamps. Then shortly before half Keith Conner broke loose for a 44-yard run. The PAT failed. However, at half time the Mustangs found themselves in the lead 42-38. The second half was a tight see-saw battle. The Mustangs quickly scored, after a strong

drive down to the Bulldog's 4-yard line. Conner ran it in and Pierce added the PAT. Conn then placed O'Brien back on the score board by making a TD from 14-yards out and by adding the PAT. Benjamin came back strong with Conner breaking loose again for 70 yards. Shortly before the end of the third quarter Bert Gutierrez scored on a 45-yard pass from Conn. The PAT by Conn was blocked. Benjamin continued to work against the O'Brien defense the fourth quarter. Stamps latched onto a 40-yard pass from Bumpas for the Mustangs' ninth TD. Pierce added the two. O'Brien came back to score when Conn ran in from the 14 yard line of Benjamin, but the PAT failed. When the Mustangs gained possession of the ball they marched it down to the 5 of O'Brien and then Conner swept left end for Benjamin's final score. O'Brien scored once

## KC Rural Carrier Wins Safety Award

Chad Wilson, Knox City Rural mail carrier, has been named Driver of the Month in a recently initiated program by the Abilene Sectional Center of the U.S. Postal Service.

Wilson's name was submitted to Clyde E. Grant, Abilene Sectional Center Manager by Knox City Postmaster Jeff Graham.

The program, which hopes to aid in reducing the number of costly vehicle accidents, awards \$25.00 to each carrier who receives the Driver of the Month Award.

A Driver of the Year will be chosen from among the 12 driver of the Month Award winners. Five hundred dollars will be awarded the Driver of

the Year. Wilson began his postal career as a clerk and substitute mail carrier in 1936, when his father, the late J.A. Wilson, was postmaster.

In July, 1941, Wilson became the regular mail carrier on Route 2, driving 43 miles each day until about twelve years ago when the routes were consolidated as Route 1. He now drives 93 miles daily.

Wilson and his wife, the former Mabel Clonts, are parents of a son, Jerry, of Carrollton. Jerry and his wife, "Dink" have three children.

The Wilsons are members of the First United Methodist Church in Knox City.



## Farm And Ranch News

### ARMYWORMS

Thousands of acres of Knox County wheat and oats have been treated for armyworm control and producers are reminded to check very closely for this pest.

Methyl Parathion (4lb), Parathion (4 lb.) at the rate of 3/4 to 1 pint per acre or Trichlorfon (Dylox) (80% SP) at the rate of 1.25 lb. per acre are some of the recommended chemicals for controlling armyworms in small grain.

FACTS CITED FOR FRUIT TREE FAILURE

Many homeowners may be wondering why their fruit trees failed to bear this year. The failure can be the result of several different factors.

The first step in fruit production is to keep the tree healthy by proper watering, fertilization, pruning and insect and disease control. A soil test can determine the proper nutrient requirements for a particular species of fruit in that soil. All-purpose fruit sprays can prevent foliage and fruit damage from insects and diseases.

Most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold weather to break their winter rest period and to promote spring growth. When winters are too mild, spring is delayed, irregular and slow as occurred in 1971 and 1972. Trees grown in climates warmer than their native one often bear poorly because of insufficient cold. Before planting a fruit tree, check its adaptation to your area.

Late winter frosts will kill open fruit blossoms, as experienced across the state this past spring. If temperatures are predicted to drop below 28 degrees after blossoms are open, trees should be covered or some type of artificial heat should be provided.

Another frequent problem is pollination. Some fruits such as apples, pears, and plums require cross-pollination to insure fruitfulness. Therefore, two or more varieties of each fruit type should always be planted together. These fruit types are described as "self-unfruitful". On the other hand, all peach varieties recommended for Texas are self-fruitful, and trees of a single variety may be planted.

Occasionally, fruit trees will bear heavily one year and sparsely the next, which is known as biennial bearing.

Most trees set more fruit than can be maintained, putting stress on the trees to mature such a large number of fruit. Thinning the fruit annually and especially in heavy years will relieve some of the stress and hopefully keep the tree from falling into biennial bearing pattern. After thinning, the fruit should be larger and tastier.

## College Guidance Program Information Is Available

A major change has occurred in the college admissions scene. In the past, students were competing for colleges; in contrast, colleges are now competing for students. This puts students in the unique position of selecting a college that will best fit their needs. In order to assist the students of Knox City and Benjamin schools to find the colleges that will best meet these needs, the COLLEGE GUIDANCE PROGRAM has been adopted, it was announced today by Mrs. LaRue Reeves, director of guidance.

At the heart of the program is a systematic process of exploring, through the use of a College Planning Notebook, what the student wants from a college and which college offers him the most. In addition to providing college-selection guidelines for the student, the Notebook contains vital information for parents on how to meet rising college costs. Many parents are unaware of the many sources of financial aid available today.

The COLLEGE GUIDANCE PROGRAM includes a 2 1/4-hour test that will yield predictive scores on the two major college entrance exams--ACT and SAT--and the Kuder Interest Survey, which will highlight student interests. "Students will greatly benefit from this program," Mrs. Reeves went on to say. "The college-relevant information given by this one instrument is invaluable to guidance counselors." It is anticipated that all college-bound eleventh-graders will want to participate in the program.

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### S. S. Reports

The social security beneficiary who receives his red, white and blue Medicare card by mail need take no further action, according to Henry Chustz, Social Security manager in Vernon. The beneficiary will be entitled to both the hospital and medical insurance part of Medicare. He should cut out the card and put it in a safe place, Chustz said.

When a beneficiary reaches 65 or receives disability payments for 2 years, he is automatically entitled to the hospital part of Medicare. Under a recent change in the law, this individual is now also automatically enrolled in the medical insurance program. This is the part that helps with payment of doctors' bills among other medical services.

There is at present a \$6.30 monthly premium for the medical insurance coverage. The beneficiary still may refuse this part of Medicare. In this event, he should complete the back of the card and drop the entire form in the mail. Another card will be sent showing hospital insurance only.

This change in the law was brought about by the fact that most beneficiaries were enrolling in the supplementary medical insurance at the first opportunity. The automatic enrollment insures that the person does not lose this valuable protection because he failed to make a "yes" response through misunderstanding or oversight.

Anyone who has questions about his Medicare card or coverage should contact the social security office or see the representative when he visits your area.

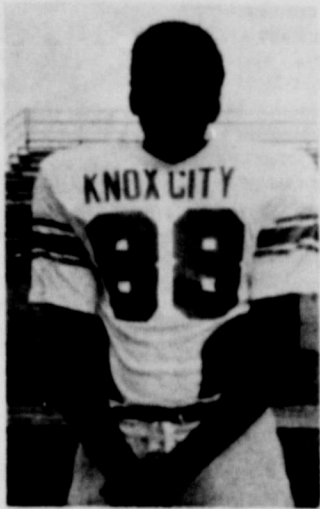

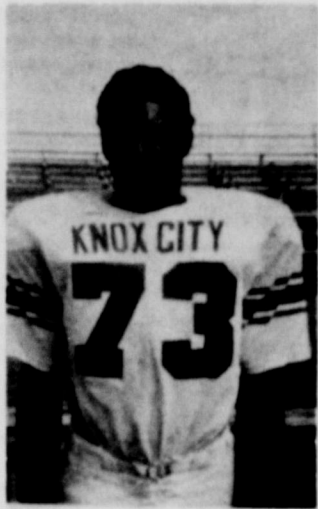

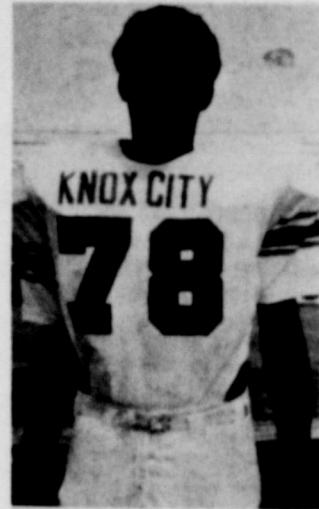
