# Driving Course Set Oct. 23-24

Mrs. Ulric Lea, Coordinator of Driver Improvement Programs for the Knox County Retired Teachers Association, reminds all those who are interested that the defensive driving course, sponsored by the Retired Teachers Association and the American Association of Retired Persons, will be conducted October 23 and 24 at the Community Center in Knox City. Only members of these sponsoring organizations are cligible to take the course, with the entire cost of the course being only \$3.00.







#### FACTS CITED FOR FRUIT TREE FAILURE

Many homeowners may be wondering why their fruit trees failed to bear this year. The failure can be the result of several different factors.

The first step in fruit production is to keep the tree healthy by proper watering, fertilization, pruning and insect and disease control. A soil test can determine the proper nutrient requirements for a particular species of fruit in that soil. Allpurpose fruit sprays can prevent foliage and fruit damage from insects and diseases.

Most hardy fruit trees need a certain amount of cold weather to break their winter rest period and to promote spring growth. When winters are too mild, spring is delayed, irregular and as occurred in 1971 and 1972. Trees grown in climates

# S. S. Reports

The social security beneficiary who receives his red, white and blue Medicare card by mail need take no further action. according to Henry Chustz, Social Security manager in Vernon. The beneficiary will be entitled to both the hospital and medical insurance part of Medicare. He should cut out the card and put it in a safe place, Chustz

When a beneficiary reaches 65 or receives disability payments for 2 years, he is automatically entitled to the hospital part of Medicare. Under a recent change in the law, this individual is now also automatically enrolled in the medical insurance program. This is the part that helps with payment of doctors' bills among other medical services.

There is at present a \$6.30 monthly premium for the medical insurance coverage. The beneficiary still may refuse this part of Medicare. In this event, he should complete the back of the card and drop the entire form in the mail. Another card will be sent showing hospital insurance only.

This change in the law was brought about by the fact that most beneficiaries were enrolling in the supplementary medical insurance at the first opportunity. The automatic enrollment insures that the person does not lose this valuable protection because he failed to make a "yes" response through misunderstanding or oversight.

Anyone who has questions about his Medicare card or coverage should contact the social security office or see the representative when he visits your area.
